SUPREME COURT.—In the case of the Queen at the prosecution of Ellen McGee vs. Thomas Cameron for assault with intent to rape, the jury, yesterday, returned a verdict of "not guilty." The case of Patrick Cox vs. Pierce Gaul, an action to recover charges for surveying, is now before the Court.

\* The *Mail* says that while false accusations are being daily made by the Reform press against the Dominion Government for discharging officials for political reasons, the Ontario Grit Government is commencing a series of changes of officials, the sole object being to provide positions for clamorous supporters. The Reform organs should cease to make this charge against the Conservative Administration, as their own friends are the chief offenders. "We know officials who personally insulted Sir John McDonald the last time he was in the city," says the *Kingston News*, "yet not one of those blatant Grits has been interfered with in any way."

SIGNS OF THE TIMES.—On to-day, the 3rd inst., a farm of one hundred acres of good dry land was sold at Sheriff's sale, at the Court House, for the small sum of \$40. This farm is in Lot 57, Queen's County, and only five miles from Crapaud. At the same time and place, another farm of one hundred acres was sold for \$50. This farm lies in the vicinity of Tryon Road.—Such sales as the above should be sufficient to prevent mortgagees and others from forcing lands into the market during such depressed times.

The Conference of the Methodist Church, it is expected, will close its work to-day. The appointments to Charlottetown are Rev. H. P. Cowperthwaite and Rev. G. M. Campbell. Rev. G. Steele, of the Upper Prince Street Church, goes to an important charge at Newcastle, N. B. Rev. J. Lathern leaves for England by the "Moravian" from Rimouski, on Saturday. The Brick Church on Sunday will be supplied by Rev. Wm. Evans in the morning, and in the evening by Rev. C. Stewart, D. D., Professor of Theology at Sackville. A resolution of thanks to the friends in Charlottetown for their generous hospitality was cordially and unanimously passed by the Conference last evening.

**Drowning Accident.**

A SON of Mr. James Brown, C. E., was drowned at North River yesterday evening. Mr. Brown has been engaged for the past few days repairing the North River Bridge. His son accompanied him to the work yesterday, and, in the evening, asked leave to go fishing around the shore. Permission was granted, but from that time nothing was heard of the boy. His hat was found floating in the river at the north side of the bridge. An immediate but unsuccessful search was made for his body. In the evening all hopes of his recovery were despaired of. The river was dragged to-day, but the body was not recovered. The drowned boy was about fourteen years of age.

**Crowded Goals in Russia.**

A statement has just been published at St. Petersburg showing something of the present overcrowded condition of the Russian goals. It appears that besides the establishment in connection with the mines in Siberia, there are altogether eleven convict prisons in the empire. That at Irkutsk, which according to the regulations should only contain 1,500, is now occupied by 2,000. Two prisons the Charkoff Government constructed, one for 450 and the others for 475 prisoners, contain respectively 600 and 500 unfortunate convicts. In spite of this overcrowding it is stated that 500 miserable beings are lying in the ordinary town goals awaiting vacancies in the central establishments.

**The Latest Halifax Sensation.**

QUITE a little excitement occurred in Halifax club circles on Dominion Day, by Mr. James Duffus, one of the managing committee, ordering flags floating over the Halifax Club to be hauled down. His action is strongly condemned by members on both sides of politics.

MARRIED AT NINETY-EIGHT.—George Lessard called upon Mr. Desnoyers at Montreal on Wednesday morning, to claim his pension due him for his service in the war of 1812. He is 99 years of age, and hale and hearty. Four times has he been married; with his first wife he lived 33 years, when she died; he married his second wife, who died within a year; his third marriage was more fortunate, and, after 31 years of happiness, she also departed this life. Last year, for the fourth time, the old veteran entered the matrimonial state, and he appears perfectly contented with life.
