SUBSTITUTES FOR THE WONDER DRUGS CORTISONE AND ACTH

We are all familiar with the saying that imitation is the sincerest form of flattery, and it might well be said that substitution is likewise the sincerest form of flattery, but when it is applied to drugs or medicines, it can be a serious, a dangerous matter.

There is no question but that the medical profession throughout the entire world is watching the mounting evidence that in the new wonder drug, ACTH and cortisone, medicine has at last found something that will control rheumatism and arthritis, and, likely, many other diseases once these drugs become generally available.

When a valuable discovery is made, many imitations soon appear on the market, claiming to have merits equal to the real thing.

In an editorial in the Journal of the American Medical Association we read, "Rapid and dramatic removal of signs and symptoms of rheumatoid arthritis (the commonest form of rheumatism) by cortisone and ACTH has given the medical profession a new standard of comparison for valuing the drugs or methods in treatment of these two drugs (hormones or gland extracts), it was inevitable that certain substitutes should be named as 'nearly as good'."

The editorial then gives the names of several of these substitutes, some of which have received favorable mention in newspapers and naturally the public is inquiring for or about them.

"This situation is unfortunate for none of these products has produced results comparable with those obtained with cortisone and ACTH. This does not mean that these new products are without merit but none is beyond the experimental stage."

The editorial then states that until additional convincing evidence is produced, the medical profession must advise its patients that these new substitute remedies cannot be put in general use.

It seems a long time for patients and physicians to wait for sufficient quantities of cortisone and ACTH to be produced but, like all good things, they are worth waiting for.

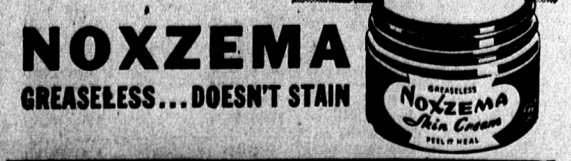
