Obituary.

The announcement of the death of Mr. James L. Mellish, last week, was a painful surprise to his many friends here. Only a short time before, he had left the Island to visit the members of his family settled in the adjoining provinces, as had been his custom for many years. When at the residence of his son, Mr. Henry Pope Mellish, at Stewiacke, N. S., his strength rapidly failed; care and medical skill availed nothing; and on the 14th inst. he peacefully breathed his last. The remains of the deceased were brought to the city by the steamer St. Lawrence, on Friday, in charge of his sons, Messrs. John T. and Humphrey Mellish, and were taken to the house of the former, which of late had been his home. The funeral took place on Saturday afternoon. After service at the house, conducted by the Rev. F. W. Moore, the procession started at 2 o'clock for Pownal Churchyard, and was joined on the way by a great number of the relatives and friends of the deceased from the surrounding country. Mr. Moore also performed the service at the grave, and in a most appropriate address, referred to the virtuous and exemplary life of the venerable friend departed. Mr. Mellish was born in Pownal in 1807, and lived there on his farm until 1882. He leaves five sons and five daughters and twenty-three grandchildren. Energy, strength and integrity were united in Mr. Mellish's character. From his youth up he had been a devoted and active member of the Methodist Church. Respected and esteemed by all who knew him he has been gathered to his fathers in a good old age, leaving behind him the record of a blameless life.

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Canadian Socialists.

OTTAWA, June 24. For some time past detectives have been looking up a nest of Socialists, who were said to have their headquarters in Full, just across the river from here, and last night they succeeded in finding a lodge with about fifty members. They were all of the Herr Most stripe, and were principally laborers engaged in lumber mills. On the walls of their room were the following and similar mottoes: "Down with Church, State, and other villainies," "Liberty or Death," "Long live the Socialists," "We shall and will conquer." So far no one has been arrested, but the detectives have all the information necessary to do so when they like.

King's College Encenia.

WINDSOR, N. S., June 24. At the encenia of King's College, held to-day, the President of the College, Rev. Isaac Brock, made a very touching reference to the loss sustained by the College, the Diocese and the Church in the death of the Rev. George W. Hodgson. The degrees of D. C. L. were conferred upon the Right Rev. Bishop Perry, of Iowa, U. S., and Mr. George Stewart, editor of the Quebec Chronicle.

A Mass of Requiem.

HALIFAX, June 24. His Grace, Archbishop O'Brien, offered a solemn requiem mass for the repose of the soul of Mother St. Hardy, the remarkable assistant Superior of the order of the Sacred Heart, who established that organization in Halifax and other parts of Canada, and the United States, and who died in Paris on Thursday last.

Murder on the High Seas.

NEW YORK, June 24. While on a voyage from Vignes to this port, Mate Lewis, of the brig Mary C. Marvier, treated the crew in a very brutal manner, and during a quarrel with a sailor named Pakelton, on the 16th, Lewis was stabbed to death. Pakelton was arrested on the arrival of the vessel at New York yesterday.

Expulsion of the Princes.

PARIS, June 24. The French Government has promulgated a decree expelling the French Princes from the Republic. They took their departure last night. The Moderate Republicans regard this expulsion as a great mistake, and the Royalists say it is the forerunner of the downfall of the Republic.

LONDON, June 24. The Times calls attention to the marked absence of men of intellectual, social and professional distinction from Gladstone's meetings, and says that his Glasgow speech bristled with mis-statements of fact and perversion of argument.

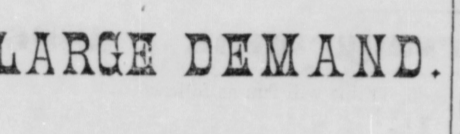
