

Calgary Golfer Forecasts Canada In Top 5 Of Cup

TOKYO (CP) — One of the players involved believes Canada will finish among the top five countries competing in the Canada Cup golf tournament here.

Frank Fowler of Calgary, a few hours before the first golfers stepped up to the first tee, said he based his prediction on the good pre-tournament play of George Knudson of Toronto.

Fowler, 34, came up through the Alberta junior ranks and worked as head professional at Red Deer before moving to Calgary in the late 1950s to take over at Canyon Meadows.

He has had limited success until this season when he began to move into more major tournaments. He finished sec-

ond this year in the CPGA tournament at Willow Park in Calgary.

Fowler was fifth in the Alberta open and won the Saskatchewan open. He finished out of the money in the Canadian open, but was third lowest Canadian. He has picked up \$5,000 in seven tournaments this year.

Knudson, 30, Winnipeg-born caddy who climbed to the top in Canadian golf, won \$47,000 last year on the pro circuit but tapered off this year to spend more time with his family.

The Canada Cup, four rounds of medal play, was scheduled to begin at 9 a.m. today Tokyo time—7 p.m. EST Wednesday.

MUST BE SHARP

For Canada to finish in the top five as Fowler predicts, he and Knudson may have to shoot exceptional golf. People who know Yomiuri course expect the course record of 65 to be broken this week.

Already Jack Nicklaus of the United States has shot a 30-38-68 in practice. Nicklaus and his partner, Arnold Palmer, won the cup for the U.S. in 1963 and 1964. South Africa won it last year.

At a meeting last night at Montgomery Hall of the Provincial Co-ordinating Committee for the first Canadian Winter Games, progress reports were heard from each of the sports indicating that plans were progressing on schedule. The volleyball team has been selected and the Saint Dunstan's hockey team has already begun practicing. A Provincial curling team will be held in early December and the Provincial Curling Team eliminations will be on the 27 and 28 of the same month. On the 27 of November the shooting team tryouts will be held. The gymnastics and synchronized swimming teams have been working out for several weeks now along with the women's basketball club. It was decided a continued effort should be made to attempt to field a men's team. The committee agreed to standardize dress in accordance to national dress regulations. The individual clubs are to nominate team managers and women and men's chaperones by November 20.

Bruins Rally To Tie 3-3; Leafs Defeat Canadiens

NEW YORK (AP) — Wayne Connelly scored a goal with 34 seconds left in the game as Boston Bruins rallied with two late goals to tie the New York Rangers 3-3 in a National Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The Rangers led 3-1 through the third period until Connelly set up Ron Murphy's second goal of the season at 18:31.

The Bruins then stormed into the Ranger zone and thought they had the tying goal when Johnny Bucyk put one behind Ranger goalie Ed Giacomin at 19:06, but the play was ruled offside.

Just 20 seconds later, Connelly pounced on a loose puck 10 feet in front of Giacomin and beat him cleanly for the tying goal.

MONTREAL (CP) — Jim Pappin's powerplay goal mid-way through the third period earned Toronto Maple Leafs a 3-2 win over Montreal Canadiens Wednesday night and moved the Leafs into sole possession of second place in the National Hockey League.

The win moved the Leafs to within a point of first-place Chicago Black Hawks. The loss left Canadiens with nine points, two back of Toronto, but Montreal has a game in hand.

Other Toronto scorers were rookie Brian Conacher in the first and Leafs' captain George Armstrong in the second.

For Montreal, Yvan Cournoyer scored a powerplay goal in the first and Dave Balon added another in the final period.

TERRY GREAT

Terry Sawchuk, in the Toronto nets, was a standout as he had a total of 34 shots. Charlie Hodge at the other end of the rink handled 25.

Montreal and Toronto both were penalized in the opening period for having too many men on the ice.

Bobby Rousseau, Jean Beliveau and Cournoyer all buzzed about the Toronto nets seconds after the Toronto penalty, but it was not until 3:15 that Cournoyer was able to penetrate Sawchuk's defence.

JUMPED AHEAD EARLY

The Rangers struck for two goals in less than three minutes mid-way through the opening period. Reg Fleming scored on a scramble in front of the Boston net after Bruins goalie Gerry Cheevers had lost his stick.

Rob Nevin made it 2-0 on a powerplay 33 seconds after Bob Dillabough had been sent off for tripping. Nevin's third goal of the season came on a rebound off Rod Gilbert's shot and caught the inside right post.

Boston scored less than two minutes later with Ron Stewart getting credit for the goal. The puck bounced in off Ranger defenceman Harry Howell.

Howell got that back on a powerplay at 8:05 of the second period with Phil Goyette and Nevin assisting. It was Howell's third goal of the season—all of them against Boston—and one less than he had all of last season. Goyette set up the goal when he drew Boston's defence to the right side and shovelled a centring pass to Howell.

Bombers Have History On Their Side In WFC Final

REGINA (CP) — Winnipeg Blue Bombers have history on their side as they prepare to meet Saskatchewan Roughriders Sunday in the first game of the 1966 Western Football Conference final.

The Bombers have won nine of 10 playoff series since Bud Grant became head coach in 1957. They defeated the Roughriders 15-9 in a sudden-death semi-final last season in the only playoff meeting between the two clubs in Grant's reign.

Winnipeg's only playoff defeat since 1957 occurred in 1960, when Edmonton Eskimos stole a 4-2 verdict in the deciding game of the final.

The Bombers reached the Grey Cup final last season and bowed to Hamilton Tiger-Cats. It was Winnipeg's first trip to the final since 1962, when Hamilton was beaten 22-27 in a game spread over two days because of fog in Toronto.

Winnipeg has won seven Grey Cup victories and Saskatchewan none. The clubs have met once in the Western final and Winnipeg won the series 2-1 in games in 1941.

The Roughriders last reached the Canadian final in 1951, when they bowed to Ottawa Rough Riders. Saskatchewan has not reached the Western final since

1963, when British Columbia won the deciding game easily.

Grant said Wednesday he will use the same lineup that beat Edmonton 16-8 in the WFC semi-final. The Bombers reported no injuries after the game.

The Bombers worked out in chilly conditions Tuesday and Grant said they would work out again Friday and Saturday afternoon before they leave for Regina.

He expects the Riders to be sharp for the opener despite a 18-day layoff since the regular season ended. Saskatchewan earned the respite by finishing first.

"I don't think it will be a factor at all," he said. "I've never felt layoffs of this nature hurt you, although it's been a long time (1963) since we finished first."

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Island League Proposed

SUMMERSIDE — One Charlottetown team with all games played in Summerside was proposed by Sandy Frizzell as a basis for starting discussions between Charlottetown and Summerside on an Island Hockey League, when Frizzell and Angie Carroll were talking to Civic Stadium manager Charles Hogan here yesterday, said Mr. Hogan.

In an attempt to equalize competition, Frizzell suggested that each team (hopefully including two from Summerside and one from Borden) would submit a roster. If the majority agreed that one team was too powerful, that team would have to drop players.

Mr. Hogan emphasized that Frizzell made it a proposal, not an ultimatum, and that the idea was to get a league going.

Previously Mr. Hogan had said that there was a strong possibility of a Prince County Hockey League being formed, including the local Legion Juniors and a Borden team, with a Summerside team or teams.

Ticats Look For Passing From Riders' Russ Jackson

HAMILTON (CP) — If the weather's right, look for lots of passes Sunday when Hamilton Tiger-Cats and Ottawa Rough Riders open their Eastern Football Conference final.

Hamilton coach Ralph Sazio expects Russ Jackson, Ottawa's star quarterback, to go to the air.

The Hamilton coach said his club probably will do the same, noting that it's necessary to gamble in a short series.

Sunday's game starts at 3 p.m. EST and will be televised nationally by the CTV network. The return contest in the two-game, total-point series is the

following Saturday in Montreal. The Rough Riders, unable to use their home field because Ottawa's Lansdowne Park is being rebuilt, will play at the Expo 67 Stadium.

CAN RUN TOO

Sazio isn't forgetting that Ottawa has a strong ground attack, too.

"They'll have a good running game: Jim Dillard, for instance, is an excellent runner at full-back. But he's a good pass receiver, too, and that makes it tough."

Jackson, also a strong runner, can roll to the right or left and pass or run from there.

Jackson didn't use the roll-out

much in the final game of the schedule two weeks ago when Ottawa lost 1-0 to Montreal Alouettes. There was little need for him to expose himself to injury since the Riders already had clinched first place in the standings.

But Sazio expects he'll roll out Sunday.

"We've always played him as a roll-out quarterback and we'll do the same thing this time."

The Rough Riders are rated the best offensive team in the east while Hamilton is reputed to have the strongest defence. Sazio, however, isn't ready to concede the Riders have a big offensive edge even though the Tiger-Cats' attack was unimpressive in the semi-final against Montreal, won by the Ticats 24-14.

"Everybody is saying the Ottawa offence is the best in the country. In 14 games the Ottawa club got 278 points. Our team finished with 268. The difference works out to a single point a game the way I figure it."

The Ticats ran through intensive drills Tuesday and Wednesday, giving Sazio a chance to assess his club's health.

"We're okay. That bruise on (Gene) Ceppetelli's leg is hurting him a little bit, but it isn't holding him up. He'll play."

Sazio said he plans to major lineup changes against Ottawa and will likely sit out halfback Art Baker as the extra import.

The Tiger-Cats have been installed as 1 1/2-point favorites to win Sunday's opener, but no odds have been set on the series.
