Indiscriminate Hunting May End Geese Flights

The first snowfall of the season dumped an approximate six to seven inches of snow on the province yesterday. It made for tricky driving conditions and motorists reported seventeen ditched cars between St. Peter's and Charlottetown. No noticeable damage was observed. As one motorist reported: "The highway appeared to swing across in front of my car and I was in the ditch almost before I knew it." It was undamaged and that was a help.

Veteran goose hunters have expressed disappointment over the goose hunting this season. At season's beginning there was some good goose hunting in southern Queens and Kings counties for a week or so and then it appeared to peter out. Geese didn't take the punishment this year like they did a year ago and showed an inclination to "pull up stakes" and move to a "better ole" as the immortal last Great War "Herbie" put it.

Blooming Point Ponds supplied the most consistent goose hunting. A flock of an approximate one hundred in number made their headquarters in Tracadie Bay and, in the deepening dusk of late evening moved into the ponds for fresh water. Old time goose hunters have expressed wonderment at the number of wildgeese our biologists have reported seeing. As one "Wag" remarked: "If I had the right medicine on my hip I'd probably see a lot more than geese!" This columnist is sticking to his guns in the estimate of a sixty per cent shortage in the goose flight this fall. West Prince is reported to have harboured more geese than Queens and Kings counties combined. An approximate 20 geese were shot at Blooming Point Pond this fall according to a goose hunter who hunted there regularly. In former years wildgeese had a flight-way from the East River to Hillsboro Bay. They followed a line across Fullerton's Marsh and over Alexandra. A farmer living in their line of flight told me a few days ago that he never saw a single wildgoose use this flight-way this fall. In past fall seasons it was nothing to witness long flight lines of geese crossing from the East River. ALMOST EXTINCT

Recently I talked to a former duck hunter from the Pisiquid Pond area. He told me that not over three hundred ducks, patronized this night resting spot this year. A few years ago they were there in thousands. Sergeant Doug Heath and myself estimated over eleven thousand black ducks dropped in to this pond in less than one half hour one evening a few days before the opening morning. It was just a continuous wave after wave... like long dark windrows of grey airbourne... of ducks streaming in at tree top level. Where are they today? Gone the way of shot and shell to the near extermination point? This columnist may be going out on a limb with the following prediction but here goes... unless more restraint is exercised by the hunting fraternity our wildgeese will follow our black ducks on the road to nearby extinction. No thought is given to daily, or seasonal bag limits... they might as well be non-existent. I was told a few days ago about hunters who pay no attention to bag limits. They shoot as long as there are targets to shoot at or they run out of ammunition. A few days ago I was told about two goose hunters in West Prince who shot 21 geese in two hours. Their daily total was not known. That's the usual procedure among an approximate 90 per cent of the hunting fraternity... shoot while the shooting is good.

Last Place Habs Could Use Punch They Traded

By THE CANADIAN PRESS Don't blame coach Toe Blake of Montreal Canadiens for looking wistfully at New York Rangers this week. The Canadiens, defending Stanley Cup champions, are in last place in the National Hockey League while the Rangers, who finished in the cellar last season, are tied for second. The Rangers have four players among the top 10 scorers and all four are from Quebec, normally the Habs' source of talent. Rod Gilbert, third in scoring with 14 points, is a native of Montreal; Phil Goyette, fourth with 13 points, is from Lachine; Bernie Geoffrion, from Montreal, and Don Marshall, from Verdun, are tied for seventh with 11 points each. And all but Gilbert are former Canadiens. Marshall and Goyette were traded to the Rangers in a six-player deal in 1963 which saw Dave Balon, Lorne (Gump) Worsley, Leon Rochefort and Len Ronson go to Montreal. The only Montreal player among the top 10 scorers is Bobby Rousseau, whose 13 points leaves him tied with Goyette for fourth spot. Everybody gets a double dose of action this weekend with New York at Boston Bruins, Montreal at Toronto Maple Leafs and Detroit Red Wings at Chicago Black Hawks tonight. Montreal is at New York, Toronto at Chicago and Detroit at Boston Sunday night.

Dolan Is Key To X's Chances In Bowl

TORONTO (CP) — St. Francis Xavier X-Men tackle Waterloo Lutheran Golden Hawks today in the second annual Canadian College Bowl and their chances will be riding with an 18-year-old second-string quarterback. Terry Dolan, a native of Montreal who lives in Calgary, inherited the job when regular Dick Pandolfo injured a knee. Dolan came in early in the game last Saturday and calmly directed the X-Men to a 27-15 triumph over St. Mary's University Huskies in the final for the Bluecross Conference title in Halifax. The X-Men, undefeated in 47 consecutive games between 1958 and 1964 and undefeated in conference play this season, normally boast a strong running game. But Dolan is a good passer and Waterloo Lutheran, winner of the Ontario Intercollegiate Football Conference title with a 7-0 record, may have to contend with an aerial attack in addition. Fullback Paul Brule is the X-Men's top ground gainer. He counted 20 touchdowns in six games for 120 points this season, a Bluecross Conference record. Quarterback Dave McKay of Waterloo Lutheran may be passing more than usual. The Hawks normally stay on the ground but coach Dave Knight said he may try passing to overcome the X-Men's tough defence that has yielded only 27 points this season. St. FX has scored 272 points. Proceeds of the game, for which more than 13,000 tickets have been sold, go to the Canadian Save the Children Fund. The teams will be playing for the Vanier Cup. The two teams worked out Friday afternoon at Variety Stadium, site of the game which starts at 8 p.m. EST, then attended a civic reception, and dinner. Selection of a College Bowl queen from among 15 candidates representing schools across Canada highlighted the College Bowl Ball Friday night.

Koufax Asks To Retire

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Arthritis-stricken Sandy Koufax, singing a swan song at the peak of his fabled pitching career, said Friday he has asked Los Angeles Dodgers to retire him. "The man many consider the finest pitcher of all time told a news conference he had had "a few too many shots and too many pills." Koufax, who has been pitching in pain since 1964 while setting an amazing series of baseball records, opened the session by saying he didn't want to talk much. Then he said: "A few minutes ago I wired (Dodger general manager) Buzzie Bavasi asking that he place me on the voluntary retired list. The announcement made official what intimates had known for some time — that Koufax was in such agony on the mound he felt he simply couldn't go another season and that he might permanently harm himself. The arthritis, which has plagued him since 1964, centres in his elbow and he has taken elaborate treatment and medication to try to ease the pain.
