Local and Other Items.

BOATING ACCIDENT.—During a storm last Tuesday a boating party at Dunbar, Wis., was capsized and four adults and two children were drowned.

A TERRIBLE ACCIDENT.—Elias Yaeger 17 years old, a switch tender in the New York Central yards, Buffalo, caught his foot in a frog and could not release himself before an engine backed down on him. He was terribly crushed and died in a few moments.

VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—The North Sydney Herald says: A valuable deposit of nickel is reported to have been discovered in the mountain north of St. Ann's by a Nova Scotia prospector, who has been prospecting in Victoria County since the spring. The deposit, it is stated, is a large one, and the nickel is of very rich quality.

KLONDIKE GOLD.—A telegram from Skagway notes the arrival there of large numbers of Klondikers, with much gold. Says the despatch: No 17 Eldorado, it is said, will prove to be the richest claim in the whole Klondike. Mr. Peacock, of Quebec, who owns a half interest, and thirty-seven men at work on it all winter, and the cleanup will be in the neighborhood of from \$1,200,000 to \$1,500,000.

NECESSITY FOR SANITATION.—The deaths in Havana from June 1st to June 15th 1898 numbered 2,160; from the 1st to the 15th of the present month 318. This shows the necessity of proper sanitation in cities and the danger of its neglect. To a much larger extent than was supposed a generation ago men carry their lives in their own hands. Disease is not sent into the world as a scourge and destroyer, but comes because it is invited to a field already prepared for its operations. In a physical aspect man is very largely the master of his fate.

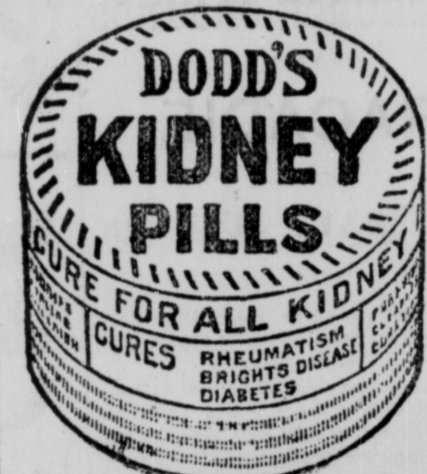

FAITH CURE VICTIMS

An Entire Family Driven Hopelessly Insane.

ELGIN, Ill., June 23.—The funeral of Mrs. Ellen L. Green will be held at Blue Island. Her death is a most dramatic ending of one who was made mad by faith cure. Mrs. Gilson died on Friday in the Illinois northern hospital for the insane in this city. Her daughter Gertrude is an inmate of the institution in which she died. Her brother, Elmer E. Day, occupies another ward in the same institution. Both are hopelessly insane. All of them were persons of keen mind, but there was no trace of madness until they took up the study of Christian Science. The family tree shows no limbs tainted with madness. Mrs. Gilson was a large property owner in Blue Island, her daughter was a kindergarten teacher in the public schools in Chicago. Day was a druggist in Elgin with a large business. He too was well to do. He was at one time an alderman of Elgin. It was in 1897 that Mrs. Gilson and her daughter became interested in Christian Science. They attended meetings called by the Rev. J. C. F. Crumaine, then of Chicago, but now of Syracuse, and soon they were ardent believers in his teachings. Then Mrs. Gilson got her brother interested, and soon Mr. Day began to undermine his own business by advising customers when they came to him not to buy medicines but have faith in Jesus. In June, 1898, Mr. Day was suddenly seized with acute mania, developing both suicidal and homicidal tendencies. Mrs. Gilson and her daughter were not long in following him behind the doors of the hospital for the insane. There they preached Christian Science to the inmates. Day's case and that of his niece were pronounced hopeless.
