6,000,000 Men Are Still Under Arms

WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—Active armies of the fourteen most important nations of the world today include approximately 6,000,000 men, according to figures obtained here and regarded as reasonably correct. With the inclusion of land armaments in the agenda of the forthcoming conference on limitation of armaments, there are the figures with which it is expected to deal. China stands first among the nations in this summary of soldiers actually under arms about September 1 last, being credited with 3,700,000 active troops. France is far ahead among nations not distressed by civil strife, in the number of men with the colors. The French army strength is placed at 1,034,000 men, the British Empire standing next with 740,500, according to this estimate. Other nations are given as follows: Russia, 538,000; Poland, 450,000; Italy, 350,000; Japan, 300,000; Greece, 255,000; Spain, 253,000; Switzerland, 170,000; Turkey, 152,000; Czechoslovakia, 150,000; United States 149,000; Germany, 100,000.

JURY'S VERDICT IN AIRSHIP DISASTER

HULL, England, October 4.—The catastrophe to the giant airship ZR-2, over the Humber River on August 24, in which more than 40 persons lost their lives, was due to accident, according to the verdict reached by the County Jury at the resumed inquest here today. There is no evidence as to the actual cause of the disaster, the verdict says. This verdict was rendered in the case of Lieut. Commander Chas. G. Little, of the United States Navy, who was the first to be considered by the County Jury. A similar verdict was rendered in each of the remaining cases.

ARRESTED FOR A \$255,000 FRAUD

TULSA, Okla., Oct. 4.—Charles P. Starr, president of the Starr-Kane Oil Company, of Tulsa, was arrested today on a fugitive warrant from Philadelphia charging him with obtaining \$255,000 fraudulently in an oil stock deal. Starr was arraigned and released in \$5,000 bond. His attorneys declared the arrest was the result of a "frame-up" by certain Philadelphians to force him to complete a transaction, their part of which they failed to uphold.

ABOUT \$3,000,000 WORTH

NEW YORK, October 6.—Approximately \$3,000,000 worth of liquor, of good and of questionable quality seized by the police in raids under the Mullan-Gage state prohibition law will be emptied into the harbor unless the owners satisfy the Supreme Court on October 20 next that the liquor was being used for non-beverage purposes. The liquor was seized in bottles, demijohns, flasks, jugs, kegs and barrels, which contained beer, whiskey, champagne, gin, rum, cocktails, vermouth and other concoctions of more than one-half of one per cent of alcoholic content for making "fancy" drinks.

TO RELEASE FRENCH

PARIS, October 6.—Eight hundred French soldiers and ten officers captured by the Turkish Nationalists in last year's campaign will be immediately released under an agreement between France and the Ankara Government, it is announced at the Foreign Office. One hundred men who were ill were liberated last month. The release of the remaining prisoners was part of the French peace treaty with the Nationalists, negotiated at London, which the Ankara Government rejected, but M. Franklin Bouillon, when he went recently to Ankara, renewed the negotiations for the liberation of the captured men.

FIVE MEN TO STAND TRIAL

LUNenburg, Oct. 4.—On the afternoon of the day of the fishermen's picnic, several men, who were eating at the New York Cafe conducted by Chinamen, started a row and severely injured one of the Chinamen cutting his head and breaking his leg. The Chinamen attempted to defend themselves, but of course were outnumbered and overpowered. After the attacking party were got out of the restaurant and the door locked, one of the number Robert Hinmleman came back broke open the door and demolished whatever was unbroken in the place. All the furniture and fixtures were smashed up, and the interior would have done credit to the war zone. The trial before Judge Chesley lasted for several days, and five of the men were sent up to the Supreme Court for trial. It is regretted that this blot should be placed on the fair name of our community as it is generally supposed that under the Union Jack a person's property and life are safe. If this had occurred in China and one of our subjects molested there would have been loud protests.

Notes on the Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest, for the 48th Week of the Contest, Ending October 2nd, 1921. There was a falling off of 55 eggs during the past week in the contest; quite a number of additional birds have moulted. The Experimental Station's pen of Barred Rocks, No. 24, leads the contest with 35 eggs; Mrs. J. D. McLellan's White Wyandottes are 2nd, with 33 eggs; Mr. J. B. Millman's pen of Barred Rocks are 3rd, with 29 eggs; Mrs. R. G. McLaren's pen of Barred Rocks are 5th, with 27 eggs; Mrs. C. McLellan's White Wyandottes tied with Mr. Wallace McKay's Barred Rocks for 6th place, with 24 eggs; Mrs. J. J. McLellan's White Wyandottes tied with the Experimental Station's pen of White Leghorns, No. 21, for 6th place, with 22 eggs; the Experimental Station's pen of Barred Rocks No. 22 was 7th with 20 eggs for the week.

BEGGAR'S "PICKINGS"

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Forty dollars an hour is only "average pickings" for a first class beggar on the corner of 43rd street and Broadway—or so said William Campbell, one armed Brooklynite, to a judge in Westside court last night. A search of the mendicant's pockets had revealed \$19.92. He waved his surviving hand deprecatingly. "That's nothin'," said William Campbell, explaining that his 35 minutes of work before running about the law had been less than ordinarily productive. Women and children, he said, were sympathetic over his story of losing the arm in the war. He admitted to the judge, however, that that member was actually a western strike riot casualty.
