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## Kenyatta Wins Vote In Kenya

**NAIROBI (AP)—**John Kenyatta's Kenya African National Union party Monday night became the party which will form the government to take Kenya to independence.

With one-third of the results of the general election for Kenya's 11-member House of Representatives still to come in, it was announced that Kariakoo Oginga, an overall majority because of the boycotting of three seats by the Somalis in the northeast.

In a triumphant message, Kenyatta said: "On this great day in the history of our nation, I pledge that the Kenyan government which is about to take office will be guided in its task by the principles of democratic African socialism."

"There are no privileges for any minority. Equally, we shall see that no member of any group undergoes discrimination or oppression at the hands of the majority."

## Two Captured After Robbery

**COOKSVILLE, Ont. (CP)—**Two men were captured by police Monday, minutes after two gunmen robbed a bank of \$10,000 and escaped with two hostages.

The bank with its \$10,000 was in a nine-mile-an-hour chase which ended when police detective Douglas Burrows in a commandeered private car crept to a halt in front of the stolen cruiser.

Police sergeant Bernard Baker, 45, was wounded twice in the arm when the gunmen fired at him as they stepped out of the bank with the hostages in front of them and ordered the sergeant and a constable to lay down their arms.

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"And with crampers on, that's no fun."

## Pope's Condition Shows Improvement

**VATICAN CITY (Reuters)—**The Vatican said Pope John's condition improved further Monday but press reports painted a black picture.

The improvement in the condition of the 81-year-old leader of the Roman Catholic Church following a severe relapse and a hemorrhage last weekend was announced in the Vatican City newspaper *L'Osservatore Romano*.

However, the Milan newspaper *Corriere Della Sera* reported that a few days ago the Pope, rumored to have cancer, said: "I know what I have. And I also know that I have only three or four more weeks to live."

The Pope's personal physician, Antonio Gasbarri, also said: "The Pope, officially described Sunday as again suffering from a 'state of anemia,' was reported to have hemorrhaging during the night from Saturday to Sunday and received a blood transfusion."

## HEAVY PILOTS TOLD TO REDUCE Break Appears In Prices

**LONDON (AP)—**The aviation ministry today ordered all overseas pilots flying British airlines to reduce or "round off" their fuel consumption.

A pilot spokesman said: "Medical experts have discovered that airline pilots are as susceptible to coronary thrombosis as business executives."

An airline doctor commented: "A pilot drives to the airport and is driven to and from his plane. There is almost no exercise in his working day."

"Linked with the mental strain of responsibility and short bursts of tension, he is involved in takeoffs and landings, an airline captain's problems are very comparable to the captain of commerce."

The ministry said the principal target would be the 1,000-mile flyers who are used and used more prone to put on weight, few already have been told to shed pounds.

At least one British Overseas Airways pilot has been grounded and put on a reducing diet.

Britain gave special attention to the possibility of pilot suffering heart attacks after an incident earlier this year. A postmortem on a British jet pilot in his late 40s, who had crashed his private sports plane, revealed an essential raw material in the air of a heart attack.

## Admiralty Judge Appointed

**GORDON RAY HOLMES, QC,** 61-year-old Charlottetown lawyer has been appointed judge in admiralty of the Exchequer Court of Canada, the justice department at Ottawa announced yesterday.

Mr. Holmes, who succeeds retired James Augustus Macphail, Charlottetown, will have jurisdiction in and for the admiralty district of Prince Edward Island.

A native of Hampshire, he was educated at Prince of Wales College, for a while taught school at Clyde River. Later he went into the employ of the law firm of Mackinnon and MacNeil, with whom he acted for five years.

Other phases of his law studies were taken at Dalhousie University and in Boston. He was admitted to the bar of P.E.I. on July 4, 1927. He then went into partnership with R.N. MacNeill, KC, until 1929, when he opened his own law office in the city.

In 1944 he was honored with the title of King's Counsel, and that same year was appointed crown prosecutor for Kings and Queens Counties. During the period he held this office, 1944 to 1949, he served under three attorneys-general. They were present Chief Justice Thorne A. Campbell, Mr. Justice Mark R. McGuigan and F.A. Larze, QC.

On Feb. 15, 1949 he was appointed to the post of presiding officer for the province, and has held that position since.

In his new appointment Mr. Holmes will continue to carry on the duties of prothonotary.

He is married to the former Margaret Nicholson of Valleyfield, P.E.I., and resides at 23 Park Terrace. They have one son, John James Holmes, as practicing attorney in Charlottetown, who was admitted to the bar on June 11, 1959.

## Letter From Ambassador Said 'Outright Forgery'

**OTTAWA (CP)—**A letter purporting to be a pledge of American support to Prime Minister Pearson from U.S. Ambassador Pearson from U.S. Ambassador Butterworth before the April election was read into the Commons record Monday by Hon. Gordon Churchill.

In the heated debate that followed, Mr. Pearson denied that he had received any such letter, said Mr. Churchill was "aware of that and suggested that Mr. Churchill knew the forgery" had been discovered both by him and Mr. Butterworth.

The ambassador later issued a press statement branding the letter as "a complete forgery."

## Two Mt. Everest Climbers Recount Tale Of Being Lost

**KATMANDU, Nepal (AP)—**Painfully frostbitten, two members of the U.S. Mount Everest expedition returned to Katmandu Monday with a tale of being lost on the "roof of the world" and kicking each other with spiked boots to keep body circulation going in 18-below-zero cold.

There was a time, too, when the men who conquered the 29,028-foot summit lost their tempers.

This was the account of William Unsoeld, 36, of Corvallis, Ore., and Barry C. Bishop, 30, of Washington, D.C. They were taken to hospital in Katmandu by helicopter for emergency treatment of badly frostbitten feet and frost-blackened fingertips.

They looked tired and obviously in pain, but still able to hobble.

Dr. Robert Berry of Alden, Pa., the American surgeon attending them, said after an examination that no surgery is contemplated now for either man.

Unsoeld and Bishop were assaulted after the double U.S. assault on the world's highest peak last Wednesday.

Unsoeld and Thomas Hornbin, 32, of San Diego, Calif., made the historic climb by conquering Everest from the rugged, untraveled west-northern ridge. Bishop and Luther Jerstad, 28, of Eugene, Ore., made it by way of the previously travelled South Col.

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## 1,000 Patients Evacuated As Fire Damages Hospital

**CHICOUTIMI, Que. (CP)—**Nearly 1,000 patients and staff members were evacuated Monday from Hotel Dieu Hospital here for more than five hours after two of the three wings were under attack.

Dr. Gilles Tremblay, associate medical director of the hospital, said the fire was under control in early evening and that the evacuation had been carried out in perfect order.

All ambulances in the district were called out, along with fleets of trailer trucks, taxis and private cars, to transport and to other hospitals in the Lake St. John area.

Canadian National Railways made a number of sleeping cars available to hospital authorities.

Dr. Tremblay said the evacuation was carried out in less than three hours. Only patients who had been operated on earlier in the day remained in the undamaged wing, a section more recently built.

He said it will be four or five days before any patients can be re-admitted.

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## Cholera Toll Is Climbing

**KUALA LUMPUR (AP)—**Cholera toll climbed to 12 Monday and the number of suspected cases approached 400 amid reports more vaccines is on the way from neighboring countries.

Malaya's health minister reported in Malacca town, the southwest coast city where the disease has been spreading since 1959. One person also died in Singapore, off the southern tip of Malaya.

Efforts continued to vaccinate Malaya's 7,000,000 people. More than 1,000,000 already have been inoculated in Malaya and Singapore and thousands pass through government inoculation centres every day.

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## Settlement Made In Bug-Bite Case

**CLEVELAND (AP)—**Lawyers here reached a settlement in the bug-bite case in which a court jury awarded the late James J. Gallick a \$625,000 judgment against the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for the loss of his legs.

One guess placed the amount of the settlement at \$750,000.

Alexander H. Hadden, a lawyer for the railroad, confirmed Monday that a settlement had been reached. When questioned about the \$475,000 figure he said he was "not in a position to deny the accuracy of it."

Gallick, 61, died last March in hospital. He had been a patient since 1958.

Total amount due from the railroad would have been about \$750,000—the amount for Gallick's leg.

Gallick claimed the railroad was negligent in having him work near an adjoining two-story supply store and wooden boardwalks that were destroyed in the August 1958 fire. He claimed the bite caused an infection which resulted in the amputation of his legs.

## Two Killed Four Injured In Accident

**SARNIA (CP)—**Two youths were killed and four injured Monday when the car in which they were riding knocked down two telephone poles and rolled into a ditch 15 miles south of here.

Joseph Roger L'Acuyer, 18, of Berlinville, Champlain, and William James Carroll, Stephentown, N.Y., were killed.

Peter Woods, 23, of Stephentown; Edward Hawgood, 21, of Wallaceburg, Ont.; Larry Brown, 17, and Victor Carron, 19, both of Dover Township, Ont., were injured.

## Fire At Corner Brook Levels Girls' Academy

**CORNER BROOK (CP)—**St. Bernard's Academy for elementary girls was leveled here Monday by a fire that for a time threatened a whole convent of Roman Catholic buildings.

Three-story wooden school shed an adjoining two-story supply store and outdoor boardwalks were destroyed in the Monday night fire, but the building was saved. There were no injuries.

Mr. Gerald Hill, the parish priest here, said it would take about \$500,000 to replace the school and auditorium. A nearby cathedral and the regional high school for boys escaped damage.
