Dies From Burns Received In Fire

SUDBURY, Ont., (CP) — Mrs. Graetienne Gravelle, 24, one of three women flown here for treatment Wednesday after a fire at Gogama, died today.

Mrs. Gravelle who was expecting a baby within a month suffered burns to 90 per cent of her body. The baby was delivered dead today by Caesarian section.

Other victims of the fire at Gogama, 150 miles northwest of here, Ida Gravelle, 26, and Mrs. George Constant, 30, still are under treatment. The fire at the woman's home was believed to have started from a gas stove explosion.

Death Rate In Canada Down For 1953; One of Healthiest Countries

OTTAWA, (CP)—The death rate in Canada dropped in 1953 to a new low of 8.6 deaths for each 1,000 population. This is lower than that of the United States and about the third lowest in the Western world. The bureau of statistics, in reporting this and other health trends Thursday, estimated that Canada is one of the world's healthiest countries, with the death rate dropping by 15 per cent in the last 10 years.

While Canada's population increased to 14,756,000 in 1953 from 14,405,000 in 1952, the number of persons who died edged ahead only to 127,381 from 125,950.

This showed a death rate of 8.6 persons for each 1,000 population, a decline from 8.7 in 1952 and nine in 1951 and 1950. This compared with a death rate of 9.6 in the United States and 11.4 in Britain.

NEWFOUNDLAND LOWEST

Among Canadian provinces, the lowest rate of 7.1 was recorded by Newfoundland and the highest of 9.9 by British Columbia.

While the death rate declined, the Canadian birth rate increased. The number of live babies born rose to 416,825 in 1953 from 402,527 in 1952 and the rate of birth per 1,000 population edged ahead to 28.2 from 27.9 in 1952. This was the highest rate since the 28.9 in 1947. The birth rate in the U. S. last year was 24.5 and in Britain 15.7.

The number of marriages also increased last year but the rate was about the lowest for the war and post-war years. A total of 130,337 Canadians went to the altar in 1953, up from 128,311 in 1952 and the highest since the 137,155 in 1946 when many of Canada's soldiers returned from the war.

INFANT DEATHS DROP

Though marriages increased in 1953, infant deaths dropped to a record low of 14.764 from 15,303 in 1952, resulting in a low infant death rate of 35 per 1,000 live births, compared with 38 in 1952 and 102 back in 1926.

Mothers who died giving birth dropped to a low of 324 from 374 in 1952, cutting the rate to 8 per 1,000 live births, down from 9 in 1952.
