

Mac Offers Famine Aid

LONDON (AP)—Prime Minister Macmillan said here his Conservative government would be glad to help relieve famine in Communist China if there is a famine and Peking asks for help.

Philip Noel Baker, a member of the opposition Labor Party, raised the question in the House of Commons.

He suggested that Macmillan "propose to the United States and Canada that Western governments should jointly initiate United Nations action to provide food for millions in mainland China now threatened by famine."

Replied Macmillan: "I have no precise information about the extent of the threat of famine in China."

"There is certainly a food shortage and I have been thinking of any way we can help. But if food is to be got to the Chinese people it can only be with the willing co-operation of the Chinese government."

"So far the Chinese government have made no request for a contribution."
