Startling Changes Seen In Husband-Wife Status

By CAROLYN WILLET Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — A sociologist has predicted "startling changes" in the husband-wife relationship along with changes in the status of women.

Dr. Frank Vallee of Hamilton's McMaster University said in a panel discussion Tuesday at the National Human Rights Conference that a shorter work week might mean a husband will be only "winning bread half the time."

STARTLING CHANGES

Perhaps a husband would try to hold down two jobs — or his

wife could go out to work half a week.

If the three-day week becomes commonplace, he said, "there are some startling changes in store for the husband-wife relationships."

Woman's status was changing and was bound to change more. Dr. Vallee said a group of British housewives is campaigning for definite wage and minimum work standards.

Housewives don't have workers' rights at home, he said. But if a housewife left her home to do the same work somewhere else, she came under provisions for

pay and work standards.

"Some day a housewife may have pay and holidays. It seems faintly terrifying but the ground-work is there in the universal declaration of human rights."

Dr. Vallee used the housewife as an example of the fact that "rights" are attached to role and status. Human groups granted, exercised and enforced rights and also limited and violated them.

CONFLICTING RIGHTS

Rights held to be individual sometimes conflicted with those of the group, and power usually was in the group.

Parents had "prior rights" to choose their children's education, but there was a "narrow range of alternatives" because education was state controlled.

At the same time, in ensuring state-defined rights to education,

the fundamental rights of families could be abridged when children were forced to take advantage of education rights. This was a problem for the Sons of Freedom Doukhobor sect, Dr. Vallee said.

The right to own property also could be restricted because a dominant group defined rights. He used property — purchase restrictions on Hutteners in Alberta and Manitoba as an example.

COMPENSATION TALKS BONN (Reuters) — West Germany Monday announced it is ready to begin talks on compensation for the citizens of eight countries who suffered under nazism. The countries are Denmark, Belgium,

and the Netherlands. The compensation will be paid in the form of bonds, Dr. Vallee said.

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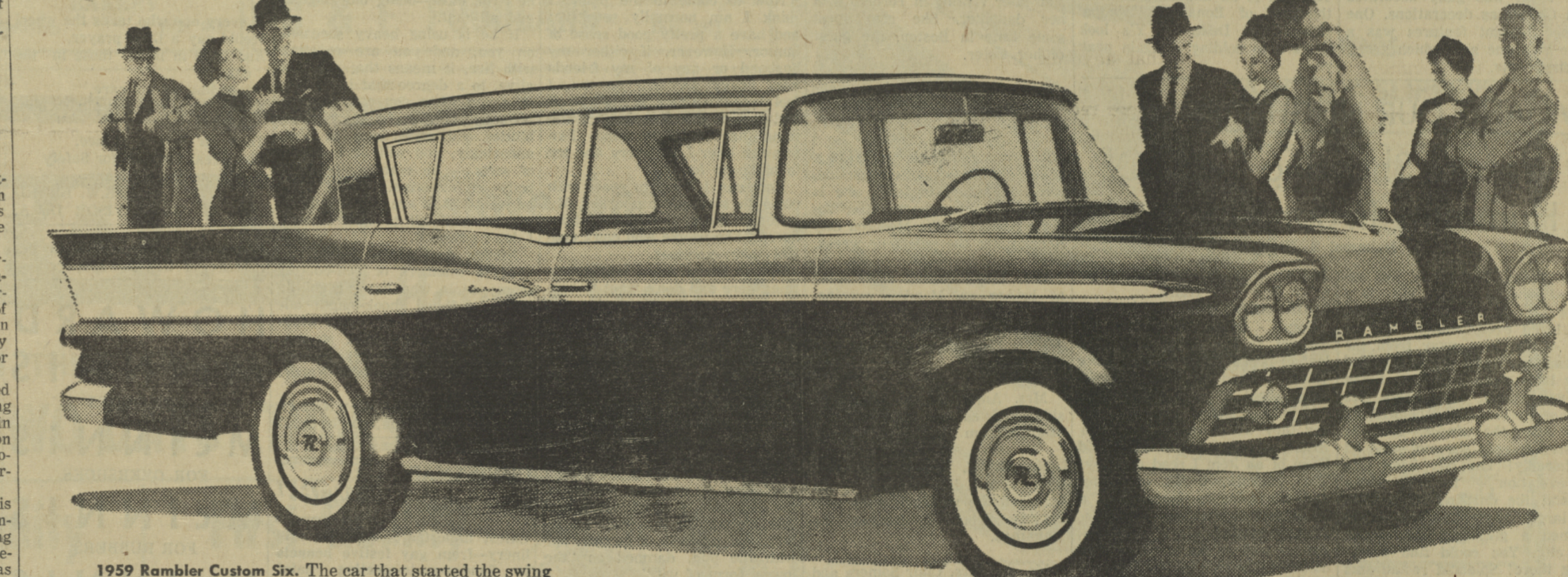
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
