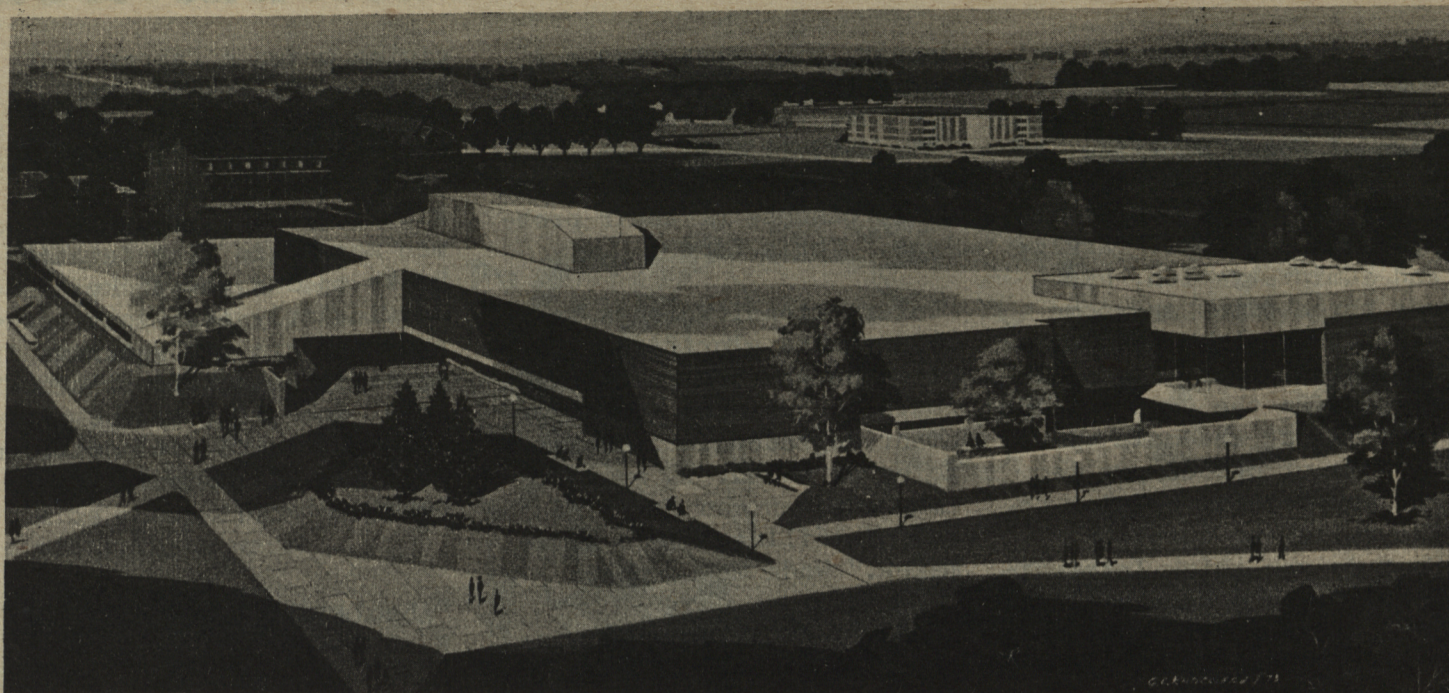


## Does This Building Look Familiar?

### Stat Can Student Survey Now In The Mail

Ottawa (CUP) About 70,000 university and college students will receive a Statistics Canada questionnaire in the next few weeks.

According to Statistics

Canada, these students represent a "mathematically selected sample of 10 per cent of the post-secondary student population" and their response is necessary

if the survey data is to be of use.

The reason for collecting the data is to provide information to government, students and administrators on a range of student concerns.

The survey asks questions on why students selected to study at their university,

why they chose a particular program, and about their revenue sources and expenditures.

The survey which will update similar information collected in 1968, will also include questions for part-time students.
