

Canadian Marksman Cops Bisley Honor

 BROOKWOOD, England (CP) — Richard Hampton, 34, at 1,062 marksman Saturday to take the Queen's Prize and title of the Commonwealth's best marksman.

It was a dream-come-true for Hampton, a retired member of the Royal Canadian Regiment and a contestant for 10 years in the annual Bisley competition of the National Rifle Association. A borrowed rifle brought him a spectacular change of luck.

The 32-year-old Alliston, Ont., sharpshooter barely made it past the first-stage elimination in the three-part event because his own rifle was misbehaving. He borrowed a renovated 303-calibre rifle from a teammate and shot his way to Bisley's premier honor with a final score of 280 out of 300.

Hampton, shooting in his seventh Queen's final, clicked by a single point to take the gold medal and the Queen's personal prize of £250 (\$750).

"In past years, I have been a bit excited shooting in the final," Hampton said. "This time I felt I had control. But it did take me by surprise when everybody came crowding around to congratulate me."

NEARED ELIMINATION
 The tall, 240-pound redhead narrowly escaped elimination on his way to becoming the 10th Canadian to win the Queen's Prize. Hampton is the fourth Canadian winner since the Second World War, following Norm Beckett of Annapolis, Ont., in 1961; Gunnar Westling of New Westminster, B.C., in 1960; and Gil Boia of Toronto in 1951.

In the first stage of the Queen's last Wednesday, shooting at ranges between 200 and 600 yards, Hampton managed only 25 out of 105 and was assigned to a shooter with almost 100 points to fill the last 49 places among the 300 advancing to the next stage.

May Colin Brown, a native of Hamilton based now in Salisbury, England, on exchange duty, loaned Hampton a rifle that had just been tidied up in the armorer's workshop.

Using the borrowed rifle in the shoot-off Thursday evening, Hampton fired five bullseyes in five shots and advanced into the Queen's second stage. In that shoot Friday, Hampton came out with second-highest score—145 out of 150 against a top score of 146—to carry over into Saturday's final.

After the 900-yard shoot, Hampton's total was 212 out of 225 and six Britons were ahead of him.

At 1,000 yards, shooting under overcast skies, Hampton pinned off nine bullseyes, five inners and a magpie for 68 out of 75 and a 280 total.

Other winners were Swift Byrd (2:15 3/4), Pay Chuck (2:12 2/5), Noble Wickham (2:11 4/5), Sugar Trick (2:16), Snappy Wick (2:14 4/5), Rhythm Time (2:13 3/5), and Burgess Express (2:14 4/5).

Plays were small.

The 14-year-old bay gelding, Ripover, swept both dashes.

The daily double on races 1 and 2 paid \$48.00 on a combination of Fast Way and Ripover, the exactor on race three, \$38.60, and the quinnella on race 5, \$13.30.

Island Track, Field Club Cops Antigonish Honors

In the bonny years that I Groom pupil "De Small, came up with the best performance of his career before he gave way to an injured back. He placed second in the juvenile boys vault at the British Empire Games in 1954. Those words were spoken by Dave Boswell, head of the Provincial Department of Physical Education following the completion of the two-day track and field meet held in the mainland center over the weekend.

Bob Simmonds captured the award for the high aggregate competitor in the open men's meet while Heather MacLean was named as the best female participant in the open women's class. Chris Annett was named as the high aggregate recipient in the Junior Men's class.

The Islanders Track and Field Club, extremely strong in all classes both boys and girls, swept to top honors in the first day of the meet by capturing 101 points in the age class competition and then proceeded to take the best club award in the open bracket, where these same age class performers were thrown with the best performers of all ages in the Maritimes. In all the Islanders captured some 56 medals and the quality of the team can be shown by the fact that 26 of these were first place finishes, 18 for second and only nine for third.

Had Andrew Arsenault attended the meet for the Island the men would not have gone down to defeat in the race for the overall men's competition. As it was they did but won the meet by a large margin when both the Men's and Women's points were tallied.

The Island entries shattered four meet records and dominated the relay events as well as running away with just about every honor in the Junior Men's class.

Joe Cheverie was the first of the four Islanders to crack a record at the meet when, competing as a juvenile, he leaped 35.25 to set a new mark. Jane Johnson, a midget forced to compete in the open class, showed her elders just how to go about broadjumping as she flew 16' 10" to break the old mark held strangely enough by another Islander, Rhoda MacLeod. Johnson also led all participants in the Open-Women's triple jump and came third in the Midget 50 yard dash.

Robert Waugh of Summerside was the third Islander to break a meet record in this case it was an example of a pupil learning his lessons well. Waugh, who is coached by Alfie Groom, shattered the old Junior Pole vault mark which was set by Groom way back in 1956 by clearing a height of 11' 8". Waugh also entered in the Open Men's pole vault in the afternoon and placed second in this event. Another

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Roberto Clemente tripled across the tying run and scored the go-ahead run on an infield out as Pittsburgh Pirates whipped San Francisco 7-1 Sunday, completing a sweep of a doubleheader and taking a one-game lead over the Giants in the National League pennant race.

Pirates won the opener 7-4 as Donn Clendenon collected a clutch single and triple.

Pirates trailed 6-0 into the fourth inning of the second game, but Gene Alley beat out a slow roller for a single. Clemente chased him home with a triple, then scored himself as Jim Hart threw out Jose Pagan.

Alley twisted his left knee on the play when his spikes caught in home plate and was replaced by Gene Michael, who added a run in the fifth with a double that scored pitcher Tommie Sick.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — An error by second baseman Tony Taylor opened the door for a three-run eighth inning that carried Los Angeles Dodgers to a 3-1 victory over Philadelphia Sunday and a split of a doubleheader.

Western Swimmers Merit Games Berths

HAMILTON, B.C. (CP) — Competitors took more than half the berths on Canada's swimming team going to the British Empire Games at Ottawa.

Led by Vancouver's Elaine Tanner, B.C. dominated the 60th annual Canadian Amateur swimming championships and games trials, winning 24 of 30 swim finals and setting 15 Canadian and open records.

Miss Tanner, 15, 115-pound schoolgirl, shattered five Canadian records and won six of 12 women's berths. She also won two Vancouver Dolphin Swim Club relay teams that set Canadian marks.

Miss Tanner took part in 15 individual events including freestyle and won 14 of them. Her only loss was to Marion Lay of Vancouver in the 110-yard freestyle final. Miss Tanner was second.

The men's events turned into a two-man show involving Sandy Gilchrist and Ralph Hutton, breaking the mark of 1:07.3 set two years ago by Vancouver's Mary Stewart.

Earlier in the week, Miss Tanner set records in the 220-yard butterfly in 2:33.1, the 220 backstroke in 2:34.1, the 440 freestyle in 4:46.4 and the 440 individual medley in 5:27.2.

She also swam the anchor leg for the Vancouver Dolphin Swim Club team that Saturday broke its own Canadian open and native 440-yard freestyle relay record of 4:28.2 with a time of 4:27.6. With Miss Tanner were Pat Gibson, Elaine Clark and Miss Hughes. The night before, Miss Tanner swam the leadoff backstroke for the Dolphin team that set a Canadian mark in the 440-yard medley relay in 4:57.3.

Hutton broke two Canadian native and open records Saturday in winning the 1,650-yard freestyle. His time for 890 yards, 9:14.0, also broke the record. Earlier he broke a native and open mark with a time of 1:03.0 in the 110 backstroke.

Jerome's Record Sprints Highlight B.E. Games Trials

EDMONTON (CP) — Harry Jerome of Vancouver turned in his second brilliant performance in two days Saturday, flashing to a Canadian native and open record of 20.9 seconds for the 220-yard sprint at the 1966 Canadian Track and Field Championships and British Empire Games trials.

The 220 mark followed by just 24 hours a 100-yard performance in which Jerome sped to a 11.1 second clocking and a share of the world record.

Jerome, 26, tied the record set by American Bob Hayes in 1963 in St. Louis. Hayes, now plays flanker for Dallas Cowboys of the National Football League and is no longer eligible to compete in track. Hayes and Jerome also share the 100-metre record of 10 seconds flat.

Whether Jerome goes or not, track officials are optimistic the team will be a strong one.

Besides the world record, four Canadian open and seven native records were set.

Jan Maddin, 17, of Winnipeg, upset Irene Piotrowski of Vancouver in the 220-yard dash. Miss Maddin's time of 23.6 seconds shaved a second from the Canadian open record set last year by Edith McGuire of Tennessee, an Olympic gold medalist.

The performance also wiped out a native mark of 23.8 established earlier in the day by Marjorie Turner of Lockport, N.S., who failed to finish the final because of an injury. She pulled a groin muscle while achieving her 23.8 clocking in a semi-final and aggravated it in the final.

Although painful, the injury probably did not hinder Miss Turner's position as a BEG team member. She and Mrs. Piotrowski took turns lowering the Canadian open and native women's 100-yard record to 10.5 from 10.7.

The previous record, shared

by Mrs. Piotrowski, Miss Turner and Yvonne Breeden of Vancouver—first was reduced by Mrs. Piotrowski in a heat. Miss Turner regained her piece of the honor by nipping her rival, a Vancouver housewife, in the final.

ABI CONTINUES PACE
 Other women's records were set by Abi Hoffman of Toronto in the 880 and Jenny Winger son of Toronto in the long jump. Miss Hoffman lowered her own native record to 2:07.2 from 2:09.9 and Miss Winger son soared 19 feet 7 3/4 inches to extend the former native record of 19.7, held by Diane Gerace of trail. Both records were set Saturday.

Strongmen Dave Steen of Burnaby, B.C., and Zenon Andrusyshyn of Oakville, Ont., completed the record performances. Steen managed a 62 feet 8 3/4 inches in the shot put to exceed his own Canadian native record of 60 1/2 and the open mark of 62-1 held by John McGrath of Pasadena, Calif.

Andrusyshyn, 19, heaved the javelin 235 feet 8 inches to exceed the former Canadian native record of 231 feet, set by Hans Mok of Toronto in 1958. Andrusyshyn's performance was virtually certain to send him to Jamaica, because Mok's display was good enough for a third-place bronze medal in the British Empire Games at Cardiff.

One record also was tied. The 400-metre mark of Toronto matched, Miss Winger's record of 1:12.1 in a heat of the 300-metre hurdles, then came back in the final to edge Miss Winger in 1:09.2.

Yanks won the first game 4-2 on homers by Lou Clinton, Horace Clarke and Joe Peptonne.

Twins' Andy Kosco hit a three-run pinch-hit homer in the seventh to narrow New York's nightcap lead to one run. Relief pitcher Pete Ramos got the next two out, then put runners on first and third before working out of the tight spot.

Boyer doubled in Roy White to score one run in the second. He belted in two more runs batted in with a base-loaded single in the fourth, when New York scored four runs. Boyer drove in his fourth run with a double in the seventh.

CHICAGO (AP)—Brooks Robinson scored two runs and drove in a third, leading Baltimore Orioles to a 3-2 victory Sunday after Chicago White Sox grabbed the first game of a doubleheader, 5-1 behind southpaw Gary Peters.

Robinson led off the second and sixth innings with doubles.
