## Industrial Establishments Promotion Act Regulations Are Now Published

Regulations prescribing the operation of the Industrial Establishments Promotion Act and the duties of the committee set up to administer it have been published in the most recent issue of the Royal Gazette.

Members of the committee named last month were Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources, chairman; Hon. Mr. E. M. Gorman, Director of Fisheries, secretary; and Messrs. Peter G. Clark, Summerside; Louis H. Poole, Montague; and Leo P. MacIsaac, Charlottetown. At that time provision was made for the addition of two other members at a future date.

The regulations state their appointment will be for a period of three years, unless sooner revoked, and that a majority of the committee shall constitute a quorum. They shall receive such remuneration and allowances as may be determined by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council.

Their duties will include the study of the economic needs of the Province and to recommend a broad policy for development based on sound, scientific, economic and social considerations. They may employ personnel necessary to develop promotional policies.

**Purpose Of Act**  
 The Act which provides for loans for development of agricultural, horticultural and fisheries projects carries the sum of \$500,000 for the purpose voted at the past session of the Provincial Legislature. The committee will receive applications for loans under it and make necessary recommendations to the Minister.

They will also conduct necessary investigations as to the economic soundness of each project and employ such technical assistance as they deem advisable. No application will be approved unless the committee is satisfied that all applicants in the business have knowledge of it or are capable of succeeding in it and that the provision of assistance in their case will assist in the expansion of the capacity for processing agricultural, horticultural or fisheries products.

**Loans Will Bear Interest**  
 The loans will bear interest at the rate of four per cent per annum and all fees in connection with mortgages shall be borne by the applicants. The fees chargeable by solicitors for all services in connection with loans are also set. Allowable is one per cent on loans up to \$3,500 and over that an additional one-half of one per cent. Registration fees are additional.

## Island Yorkshires Shipped To Quebec

The regard with which Island type Yorkshire hogs are held was again demonstrated this week when another carload of top breeding stock was shipped for Quebec buyers. The purchasers were assisted by officials of the Marketing Service, Dominion Department of Agriculture, here.

In recent years a large number of hogs have been shipped to Quebec as breeders became increasingly aware of the quality due to frequent winning of top awards at the Royal Winter Fair, Toronto, where Island bred hogs have captured both the Todd and Brethour trophies on several occasions.

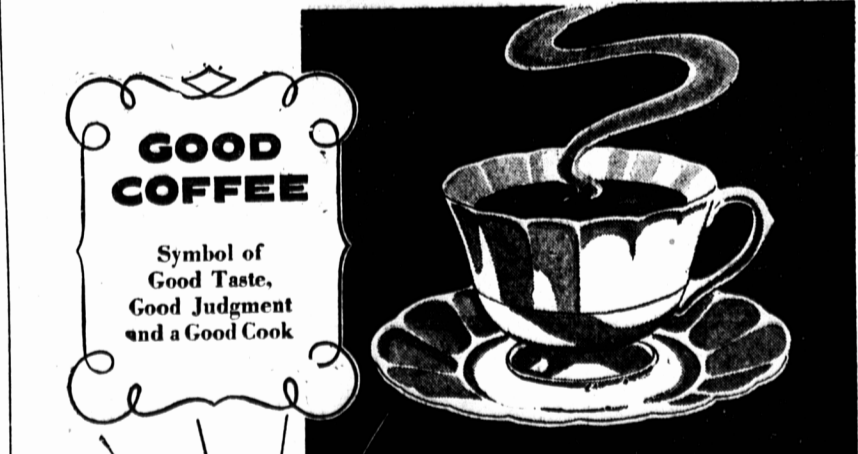
