Just read his breeding, it is exceptional. sire, Peter Astra 2:01 1/2, one of the greatest colt trotters that ever lived, sire of eight in 2:10, dam, Arion Girl 2:02 1/2, dam of Volaron 2:03 1/2, Mighty Boy 3, 2:05, Earlonite 2:09, Lady Arion 3, 2:10 1/2, by Arion Guy 1:59 1/2, granddam Walton Girl 2:14 1/2, dam of three in 2:10 and granddam of five in 2:10. The statement said: "This is a great green prospect. I trained him a little in my spare time and he has shown quarters in 32 seconds and should trot in 2:10." We hope that prediction will come true for Harold.

In the 4th dash Lou Kalmuck, owned by that enthusiastic horseman Edgar Bryenton and driven by Don McNeil, won in 2:16 2/5—a new record. Henry Day, given a splendid drive by Lorne Kelly, was second, and You'll See (Andrew) third, four other starters. In the 7th race with the same field You'll See paced around the field and although challenged several times went on to win in a close finish with Sister Vera (O'Meara) second and Miss Playfair (Kelly) third, time, 2:20 1/5. A bouquet to the trainer and driver of the winner, Blair Andrew of New Glasgow, who has brought this mare from practically nothing this season into good racing form. Also congratulations to her new owner, Longworth MacMillan of Calgary, Alberta.

Fredericton Exhibition races ended Thursday with four events raced. As usual they had a splendid attendance which was helped greatly by their vaudeville program, which is always one of the best. The many friends of Walter Craig of this city were pleased to see that he brought Rusty Hanover 2:07 3/5 through a winner in the Free For All with a summary of 1-1-3, Abbeland (Jardine) 2-3-1, Jo-Jo Spencer (Burt) 3-2-2, three other starters. Rusty Hanover is now owned by the Sunrise Stables of Calais, Me. The best time was 2:10 2/5 in the second heat. Another Island boy, Albert Harper, son of Thomas Harper of this city, drove a winner in the Class A—Hollywood Anna finishing 1-3, Bellini Mite (O'Brien) 2-1, five other starters. Hollywood Anna is owned by W. B. Nevers, Hartland, N.B., and Bellini Mite by the Donahoe Stables, Truro. Time, 2:20, 2:19 2/5. Harvey Cormier was also up behind a winner in Honan Crowl that won both dashes in the Class B with Annuncio (Collette) 2-2, and a former Island pacer, C. Albert Budlong (Burt) was 3-4, four other starters. Time, 2:15 4/5, 2:15 1/5.

And once again Henry DeWitt makes good with Just Lucky, winning the first heat of the Class C and being fourth in the second heat. The trotter Card Shark (Hamilton) was 3-1 and Cedric Hanover (Chase) 2-2, two other starters. Card Shark is owned by W. M. Stiles of Woodstock. Time, 2:15 4-5, 2:15. Card Shark has a trotting record of 2:06 on a mile track and 2:10 2/5 on a half-mile track.

Our friend John L. Read of Truro, always writes us when anything out of the ordinary occurs in racing in his vicinity. He has followed the horses during a long lifetime and we don't know of anyone in the Maritimes better acquainted with the stars of long ago. Mr. Read was very much impressed by the performance of Meg, a five-year-old pacer by Peter Astra, owned by H.E. Clowes of Derby, N.Y. and driven by Don McNeil in the second race last Monday at Truro when she headed a good field to win in 2:12 2/5, lowering her record from 2:14 3/5. The Free For All that afternoon was another victory for Iola Henley, that was not called upon to exert herself like she did some days previously when she took a new tab of 2:07 2/5. Her winning times were 2:09, 2:11 2/5. Victory Dale was second in the 3rd race and Hedgewood Chief in the 7th. Sonny B, an eight-year-old trotter that has been around a lot and has finally found an owner who knows how to hang him out,

me that he had to wear the same clothes for if he even changed his cap the bulk of the birds would shy off. Mr. Moore is a keen hunter but he told me he wouldn't shoot a duck on this pond for a fifty dollar bill. Once a man gains the trust and affection of the creatures of the wild he has no desire to betray it.

A few teal were mixed in among the blacks and one brood of Wood Ducks. Also a wild mallard drake, secured in Ontario, had mated with a black duck and a cross bred was the result. 15 Doves, limited wedges were swimming within a few feet of us and it was amusing to watch a family of young muskrats about the size of barn rats trying to shoo the geese and ducks away. The geese didn't take any chances but would swim off whenever the muskrats chased them but the ducks were inclined to play a game of tag. I took a great kick out of watching the young muskrats. They lie on the water with their tails cocked at a saucy angle and when the ducks came too close they'd try and jump at them. They were quite the play boys.

I inquired about the Grandview goose and Harvey pointed her out to me on the outside of the flock. She was a different looking bird from when I took her from a fox pen on a farm at Grandview last October a few days before the season opened. She had been picked up near the Station a week or so previously, by a couple of the local boys. She was suffering from a gunshot wound in one wing. I heard about the event over the 'grapevine' a day or so later and also learned from the same source that it was the intention of her custodians to keep her until the opening morning for goose and use her as a live decoy (incidentally this practice is prohibited by the Migratory Birds Act). If she performed satisfactorily they would keep her. If not her head was coming off and she was slated for the roasting pan.

Two days before the season opened I made a call and picked her up. She was thin, scraggly and scared to death. I handed her in to the keeping of the birds friend at Milltown Cross. She is a different looking goose today, fat, sleek and trim. She has gotten herself a boy friend from among the eligible bachelors in the flock and that, in

Every effort will be made to bring together the best trotters and pacers in the province and as the season is getting late all lovers of harness racing should endeavor to see one or both these meets. part, may account for her changed appearance. She was pretty nervous for a few weeks after her release.
