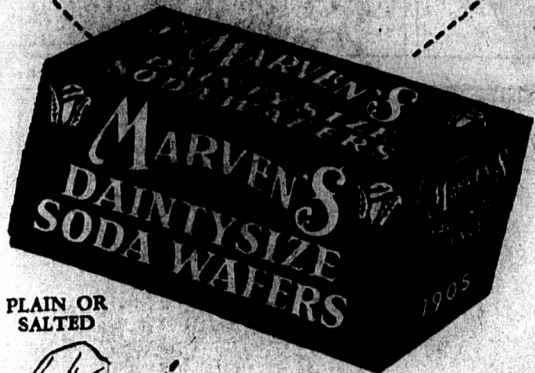


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Women's Institute Meetings

Next meeting to be held at the home of Mrs. James Nicholson, roll call to be answered with each member bringing a treat not to exceed 10c.

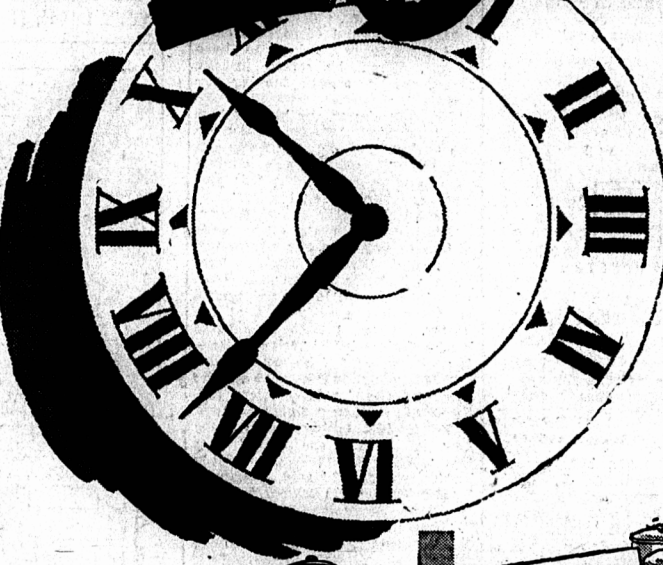

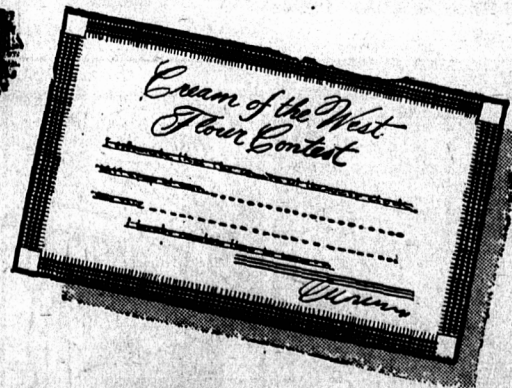
