ASSAULT.—This morning three young men named Terrence McAtee, Richard Thorne and Charles Thorne were arraigned before Mr. R. R. Fitzgerald, J. P., on complaint of a Rustico Frenchman named Peter Peters. The complainant alleged that yesterday afternoon, while on his way home from town, he was accosted by the three young men in question near Mr. Ball's premises on Lower Spring Park Road and after using threatening language towards him they took possession of his team. A passing countryman gave him a drive to town, where he informed the police of what had taken place. The officers lost no time in starting out after the Frenchman's assailants, whom they met driving leisurely into town, and took them in charge. The Magistrate sentenced each to one month's imprisonment with hard labor, without the option of a fine. In giving judgment he said that complaints had reached him as to the prevalence of ruffianism along some of the roads leading from the city; he had even heard that ladies had been insulted, and he said he only wanted to get a chance at the guilty persons to punish them as they deserved.
