

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

MISCELLANEOUS TEA—today.

Picnic—A very pleasant private picnic was held at Stanhope yesterday.

COMING—The steamer Palms, of the Doherty Line, will be due here this evening.

NAVAL—H. M. S. Blake will arrive at this port on the 17th August and remain three days.

A. O. H.—Special meeting to-morrow, (Wednesday) evening, to consider the proposed picnic. A full attendance requested.

The S. S. Colan sailing from Montreal Thursday, the 27th inst., for Charlottetown, Sydney and St. John's, Nfld., will be due here Monday, the 31st inst.

DEATH—No. 2 Battery will be paid for their annual drills at the shed tonight. Their shooting match was postponed yesterday on account of the storm till Monday next.

IN DANGER—A large barkentine was observed drifting toward the shore near Tracadie during yesterday's storm. We have been unable to learn whether she finally succeeded in getting clear.

THE RIFLE—No. 3 Company, 82nd Battalion, propose having a series of shooting matches on Kensington ranges, the first of which will be fired on Thursday afternoon at two o'clock. The company medal will be awarded to the highest aggregate score of any non-commissioned officer or private.

BUSINESS IS IMPROVING.—The Chronicle is glad to learn that there are indications of an improvement in business in this country. One of our business firms had over seventy letters in their mail this morning, twenty-one of which contained remittances.—Halifax Chronicle.

ISLANDER INJURED.—The Montreal Transcript says: A man named Finlayson, while engaged working in the woods at Andover, Me., one day recently accidentally cut his right foot completely through the instep with an axe. He passed through town today en route to his home in Prince Edward Island.

THE SUMMERSIDE RACES.—The races at Summerside on August 9th promise to be very successful. There has been a slight change in the programme as already announced. There will be no 250 class, but instead there will be a 240 class for which the purse will be \$100. The other race will be a free for all, with a purse of \$200.

CANADA INVITED.—Canada has been invited to participate in the International Exposition, to be held at Antwerp next year. Mr. Vanbrysel, the Belgian Consul General, says that if the Dominion makes a representative display her resources will have a beneficial effect from an emigration standpoint. The principal visitors to the exposition will be Dutch, Germans and Belgians.

THE MARKETS.—The market to-day was rather poorly attended, with a slight change to note in prices. Inside, butter, fresh, sold at from 18 to 20 cents per pound; butter, (tub) at from 17 to 18 cents per pound; fowl, at from 55 to 60 cents per pair; strawberries, at from 20 to 25 cents per quart; and cherries at from 20 to 25 cents per quart. Outside, new hay sold at from 50 to 60 cents per cwt; old hay, at from 70 to 80 cents per cwt; oats, at from 45 to 48 cents per bushel; potatoes, at 27 cents per bushel. Cod and mackerel sold at usual prices.

A SEVERE SENTENCE.—A few days ago, a sixty-year-old man named Samuel McGregor, living at Hintonburg, near Ottawa, was accused before the County Magistrate, a Mr. Harvey, of stealing some cucumbers from a market wagon. McGregor pleaded guilty, but prayed for the clemency of the court, stating that his wife had quite recently gone out of her mind and there was no one at home to take care of her, except his fifteen-year-old daughter. The magistrate sentenced him to a month in goal.

SWEDISH COMING.—Mr. Swanson, Dominion Immigration Agent in the New England states, passed through Montreal a few days ago with a party of ten or twelve delegates from New Hampshire and Vermont on a visit of investigation to the Northwest. These delegates are mostly Swedes, of whom there are a considerable number who have grown weary of wrestling with the stumps and stones of New England, and who are desirous of immigrating to the fertile fields of the Canadian Northwest if their delegates report favorably.

THE HAY TRADE.—The Montreal Gazette says: Cables to-day reported a further decline in hay, London being quoted at £5 5s per long ton, a decline of 3s in three days. Shippers say there is no money in it for them at these figures, and the shipments now on the way will lose lots of money. The farmers and holders in the country, however, have come to the conclusion that there was nothing in the recent boom, and that the cables sent out from London were ridiculously high. In consequence, they are offering at lower figures, any quantity of good No. 2 being obtainable at \$13 or under.

UNDER THE NEW LAW.—High Sheriff Horne has given notice to Judge Alley that William Larter, Michael Power and William Power are in his custody in Queen's County Jail, having been committed for trial. This notice, we understand, is required by the new criminal law, which provides that a prisoner may be brought before a Judge of the County Court and asked whether he desires to be tried before him or whether he prefers to be tried by a jury, in which latter case the prisoner would be sent back until the Supreme Court meets. Judge Alley has not yet made any order for the prisoners to be brought up.

A CELEBRATED CASE.—The St. John Sun says: On Saturday morning there was a new development in the case of Nae v. Stevens. One of the pleas put in by the defendant is that he was insane at the time of the commission of the wrongs charged against him in the plaintiff's declaration, and avers that the plaintiff was aware of the fact. L. A. Curry and A. P. Barnhill for plaintiff accordingly applied to Judge King to set aside this plea on the ground that it was false, frivolous and vexatious, and that even if true it was not a defence to an action of tort. His honor granted a summons calling on the defendant to show cause why this plea should not be struck out.

HERE AND THERE IN SPORT.

Aquatic.

The great single-scull race between Hanlan and Jake Gaudaur, for \$1000 a side and the championship of America, three miles with a turn, was rowed on Lake Couchiching, Orillia, Ont., on Saturday morning. Ten thousand people were present and were greatly disappointed at the result. At the start, Hanlan got away first, and at once hit a fast stroke and gained slightly on the Orillian. The latter, however, let out a little reserve, and was even with the Torontonian before the mile was reached. People along the banks remarked how dangerously near the men were keeping and a collision seemed imminent. The inevitable happened at the mile flag, when the oars of both men became entangled. They soon got clear of each other, and Hanlan continued on his course. Gaudaur turned back, and entered a protest of "fool." Hanlan paddled home in 21 min. 12 sec. Referee Douglas heard each man's version of the affair, and ordered the race to be rowed over again yesterday. There was very little money wagered by the admirers of either man.

Petersen, who won second place in the Austin regatta, accepts Teemer's sweeping challenge to any man in the world, barring champion Stansbury. Weid has been received at Chicago that the pick of the Henley winners have been secured to compete at the Columbia International regatta at Chicago in a few weeks.

Five thousand people witnessed the Bankers' regatta at Halifax on Saturday. The ten-oared large race was won by a crew from the Royal Engineers, the Italian ship's crew being second; the four-oared race was won by the Wanderers; the Royal Engineer crew won the six-oared gig race; McNab and Patterson won the open double scull, and March and Duhan won the canoe race.

Some of the "boys" seem to have caught the racing fever, and much loud talk is being indulged in. What'll be the next race?

Lacrosse.

The Truro and St. John will play a match at the latter place on Saturday next.

The Capitals beat the Shamrocks on Saturday at Ottawa, by 6 to 1.

All doubts as to the high flight have been set at rest. A despatch says Mitchell has signed with Dominick O'Malley's Club, and as Corbett has already signed there, the battle will take place at Roby, Ind., this fall.

Corbett has been ejected from the Midway Pleasance at the Fair by order of the courts. Jack Dempsey and Billy Smith have been matched to box at Roby, Indiana, shortly.

Athletic.

Four athletes, viz. Gustav Koegel, Fritz Meyer, Ludwig Blocker and August Jacobi, have started from New York to San Francisco for a pleasant little pedestrian tour. They are bound to see the country on foot, and there is no water connected with the feat. They expect to reach the Golden Gate in 171 days.

Duncan Ross and McDougall, the hammer throwers, were both intoxicated when the latter accused the former of robbing him. The giants, Sandove and Sampson, will likely be brought together in a contest in Boston in a short time.

August 3rd will be "Canadian Day" at the World's Fair. The events include an international tug-of-war between the great Zorra team of Oxford and the American champions, for a silver trophy; also a lacrosse match between the Shamrocks and Torontos.

Caspar Whitney, the great writer, considers that Canadian athletes stand a fine chance to capture the coming big games in Chicago.

Moffatt, the great Canadian runner, has again appeared, and is winning half and quarter miles quite handsily.
