

Devilish Malignity.

NEW YORK, July 22.—Francisco Muzzo, a young Italian, was convicted to-day on a charge of compelling Sanria Felitti, a boy of thirteen years, to beg. The prosecution was conducted by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. One of the boys feet was hideously misshapen and Muzzo's right arm had been amputated in an unskillful manner, presenting a horrible appearance. It was shown that the boy's father, Nardo Felitti, was a padrone, and had imported Muzzo, his own son, and eleven others similarly deformed, to this country from Naples. They arrived in Philadelphia on the 19th inst., and Muzzo, young Felitti and another were sent to this city, while the remainder were taken to Chicago by Nardo Felitti. Muzzo was remanded for sentence.

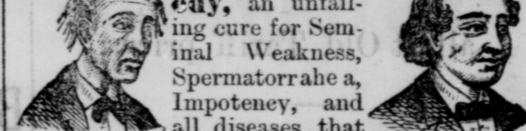
