Local and Other Items

—Loyal Crusaders meet every Monday at 6.30.

—The Greetlands is expected here this afternoon.

—Meeting of Messrs. Paton and Jenkins' canvassers at Committee rooms to-night.

—The regular monthly meeting of the B. I. S. will be held on Monday evening, Dec. 3rd, at 8 o'clock.

—The following schooners arrived this morning coal-laden for C. Lyons & Co: Stanley Mac, A. S. Townshend, A. S. Hardy, Lifeboat and Tarquin.

—Canvassers for Messrs. Paton and Jenkins, who have not yet made returns, will please report at committee rooms, Brown's Block, to-night.

—The three-masted schooner Lure cleared today for Sydney with a cargo which included 10,000 bushels oats, 50 tons hay, 5 tons straw, 100 dozen cabbage and other produce. Mr. Walter Matheson was the shipper.

—The outward freight of the City of Ghent to-day included 100 drums of fish and 100 cases of canned meats. The fish were shipped to Havana by J. H. Myrick & Co., and the meats to Liverpool by Piggott Bros, of Mount Stewart.

—The members of the Ladies' Aid of the P. E. Island Hospital desire to express their sincere thanks to Prof. Watts, the choir, Mrs. Watts, Miss Dawson, Rev. Mr. Williams, the press, and all who in any way contributed to make their concert such a brilliant success.

—The steamer Elliott has arrived from Sydney with a cargo of coal for Captain McMillan. She will be loaded by Carvell Bros. for St. John's, Nfld. Her cargo will consist of 15,000 bushels oats, 15,000 bushels potatoes, 200 boxes cheese, 100 tubs butter, and a quantity of eggs, vegetables and other produce.

—This week Messrs. Dillon & Spillet shipped 2,500 boxes of cheese to Liverpool. Next week they will ship 1,000 boxes to London. There are about 2,000 boxes yet to ship, which will close the season's business. The total value of the cheese output this year is estimated at \$420,000 against a valuation of \$360,000 last year.

—There will be a meeting of the Charlottetown Branch of the Dominion Temperance Alliance in the Y. M. C. A. parlour on Monday evening, the 3rd inst., at 8 o'clock. In view of the provincial election, and the desirability of ascertaining the views of the several candidates on the question of prohibition there should be a full attendance of all persons interested in the question of temperance.

—The Interdenominational Sunday School Association of the Eldon District met in the Hazelbrook Baptist Church a day or two ago. A number of delegates were present and Rev. G. P. Raymond, who gave a helpful address on Sunday School work. He showed the great need of better organization everywhere. Rev. Mr. Raymond outlined Hurlburt's idea of what the Sunday School and the teacher should be. The next meeting of the Association will be at Vernon River.

—The home of I. F. Holland, Esq., at Bedeque, presented a fairy-like scene on the occasion of the marriage of his daughter Alice to Mr. Lewis Mowatt, of Tryon. Upwards of seventy invited guests were present from all parts of the Island. After the knot had been tied by the Rev. F. A. Whitman, the wedding march was played by Miss Florrie Hartz, of Charlottetown. The bride's wedding costume was much admired. Miss Susan Holland and Miss Blanche Howatt made very charming bridesmaids. The happy couple are followed to their new home in Tryon by the best wishes of a host of friends.
