Dalhousie Convocation.

Island Lads and Lasses Head of Their Classes.

HALIFAX, April 27. The convocation took place yesterday afternoon, at 3.30 p. m., in the Academy of Music.

On the platform were the professional staff in arts and law as well as a number of clergymen and other gentlemen. The prizes were distributed as follows:—

An All Night Session. QUEBEC, April 27. There was an all night session of the Local Legislature last night and, in fact, in session yet. Speeches are being made to kill time. The crew abandoned the wreck, and the vessel immediately after leaved over and sank. The men remained on the ice all night, and in the morning were taken off by a Newfoundland schr.
