### BELIEVERS MUST GO ON TO CHRISTIAN MATURITY

Some years ago there was a South African sage and saint, Dr. Andrew Murray, who led the Christian world in studies of the deeper realities of the spiritual life. We had read several of his books with interest and profit, and when he visited Canada we went eagerly to hear him.

His theme that evening was: The Babe in Christ, or, as Henry Drummond put it in his scientific way: "The Case of Arrested Development."

He meant the Christian who has accepted Christ, and about the reality of whose conversion there can be no shadow of doubt, but who has never grown in knowledge, or spiritual experience or skill in Christian work.

A Canadian evangelist once remarked: "I would rather lead one such believer into the higher Christian life than win a dozen converts who are just converts and nothing more. It would mean a greater service to Christ's cause, because such one would go on from day to day leading many into the Kingdom of God."

Dr. Murray pointed out that there was genuine concern about these undeveloped Christians in the New Testament. For example, St. Paul deals with them in his first letter to the Corinthians. Of all the churches founded by St. Paul, the one in Corinth was the richest in its gifts and the poorest in its graces. He found many of them still in this state of prolonged babyhood, and sometimes

he calls them spiritual infants, and sometimes "carnal" or "men of flesh." And he describes their qualities in terms like these in 1 Corinthians 3:1-4. They can stand only a milk diet. "I fed you with milk, not solid food," he says. Their interest was only in the simple facts of the Christian salvation—repentance, faith, conversion, the last judgment and so on. We have many of the same type among us still, who are always calling for "the old Gospel" and the "old hymns," and who have no use for those who teach the profound truths of the Bible or the practical expressions of our faithful personal or social life.

### SECTARIAN STRIFE

Another of their characteristics is sectarian strife. There were three or four parties in the little church in Corinth, some calling themselves followers of Paul, others of Apollon and other of Peter. As if Christ could be sectarian!

These "men of the flesh" lived still in the old passions of their bodily nature and brought all the world's rivalries and spirit of faction into their religion. So they are men of today who magnify secondary issues to keep believers apart and to prevent the answer to Christ's prayer that all "people may be one."

This suggests another of the features of these immature believers: their dependence on man. It was Peter's presentation of the way of salvation, or Apollon's or Paul's that they accepted instead of building their faith on Christ alone. "Was Paul crucified for you?" St. Paul demands, "were you baptized into the name of Paul?"

The same question might be asked of many men of the sectarian spirit today. And in a time, many Christians win the faith to their favorite church leaders. If these stand firm and lead with vigor they follow with

enthusiasm; if they fall or fail, the fair of their followers is shaken to its foundations.

One of the most precious results of any spiritual revival is to move believers to "go on to maturity." Far too many members of our churches are satisfied with the beginnings of faith.

When they are sure that their sins have been forgiven and that they have entered into life through Christ, they think that the goal of their religion has been reached.

So many stress the fact that they have been "saved" or "born again" that we wonder if they have ever awakened to the fact that a babe is only the beginning of a man, and that Christ has endowments and opportunities for men of faith that will make them a power for both time and eternity.

The need of the hour is of religious people who will master the Word of God, who will accept responsibility for the work of Christ and His church, and who will personally share their faith and experience of Christ with those who do not know Him.

The church dare not forget that Christ regarded men as "lost" who were living without God and without hope, and that His mis-
