### PWC Dept. Head Resigns To Accept University Post

J. Ivan Dowling, B.Sc., M.Sc., head of the mathematics department at Queen's University for the past five years, has resigned his position and has accepted an assistant professorship at St. George's University in Montreal.

Mr. Dowling will leave a next week for Montreal where he will take up permanent residence. He also plans to continue studying towards his doctorate in mathematics.

Mr. Dowling has had a distinguished teaching career since graduating from Queen's University magna cum laude in 1950. He obtained his earlier education at Prince of Wales College where he was awarded the Governor General's Medal and a gold medal in his first year.

Mr. Dowling holds a commission as a lieutenant in the RCVR, returned to PWC for three more years and taught mathematics at RMCS Ven-

BIRMINGHAM, England (Reuters)—Harry Breeze, 22, who answered a newspaper advertisement offering an "out of the ordinary job," was asked to murder another man's wife, a court was told Wednesday.

The prosecution said the advertisement in a Birmingham evening newspaper read:

"An opportunity to earn £250 (US\$1,000) a month. A man of average intelligence with a tearaway disposition, willing to take the chances, wanted for one of the ordinary jobs which can be performed once only."

Breeze telephoned the advertiser and when he did, a man told him he wanted Breeze to get rid of someone.

A meeting was arranged and Breeze informed the police.

Albert Hawkins, 54, charged with inciting Breeze to murder his wife, Edna Hawkins, was alleged to have told Breeze he wanted him to murder Mrs. Hawkins either by shooting or strangulation.

When they had another meeting Tuesday night police arrested Hawkins.

Hawkins was ordered held in custody until Sept. 6 pending a medical report on him.

### Speedy Scot Winner Of Hambletonian

DU QUOIN, Ill. (UPI)—Speedy Scot, the 2-5 official favorite, rallied after a first heat loss to Florida and captured the Hambletonian for three-year-old trotters Wednesday by sweeping the second and third heats.

In taking the decisive third heat, the Castleton Farm's powerful colt, driven by Ralph Baldwin to his first Hambletonian triumph in 18 starts, was timed in 1:58.25.

Florida, owned by Arden Kromstedt and trained by 60-year-old Harry Downall, was second after a vain attempt to overhaul the heavily favored Speedy Scot.

Speedy Scot won the second heat in 1:58 and Florida was second by three-fourths of a length.

Florida nipped Speedy Scot by a head in the record smashing first heat with a blazing time of 1:57.83—fastest by any three-year-old trotter either in competition or against the clock.

The fastest field in Hambletonian history proved to be the first two heats when 10 of the 14 starters were clocked under two minutes.

**TIMES SET RECORD**  
The fastest winning times of 5:54 established a new record for a divided three-heat start in the Hambletonian. The 1951 record of 5:58.15 set in 1948 at Du Quoin.

### Wood Furniture Sales To U.S. To Be Studied

OTTAWA (CP) — Prospects for selling Canadian wood furniture parts to United States furniture manufacturers will be studied next month by a seven-man Canadian trade mission, it was announced Wednesday.

The trade department said the mission will leave Ottawa Sept. 15, returning Oct. 5 after visits to Los Angeles, Chicago, New York City and High Point, N.C.

The department said specialization in the American furniture industry has meant supplying manufacturers with fully-machined components, Canada's raw materials are not in the market. The object of the mission is to increase sales.

### Former Athlete Dies Suddenly

SUMMERSIDE — A Summerside athlete of a bygone era, Ralph Silliphant, 60, died suddenly yesterday morning following a heart attack at his home.

Mr. Silliphant, who gained his reputation as an outstanding hockey player during the 1910s and 1920s, was a member of the famous Summerside Crystals in the 20's and 30's, was a lifelong resident of Summerside and had been employed with the Dominion Experimental Fur Farm since 1925.

Following his retirement as a hockey player, Mr. Silliphant became a keen student of the current game and was closely associated with the organization and activities of the Summerside Curling Club.

Surviving relatives are his wife, Mrs. Mabel Silliphant, and one son, David R., of St. Stephen, N.B. Also surviving are a brother, Harry, and two sisters, Mrs. Gladys MacQuarrie and Mrs. Mildred Lewis, all of Summerside.

### Housing Starts Show Increase

OTTAWA (CP) — Starts on new housing units in Canada in the first half of this year were running about the 1962 figures.

However, the figures released Wednesday by the Bureau of Statistics cover only the period up to the end of June and thus do not reflect the full impact of the June 13 budget announcement of a sales tax on building materials.

Starts on all units — apartments and duplexes and 97 per cent more than offset the dip in first family houses — rose in the first half of 1963 by 2.6 per cent over 1962, the same period last year.

Completions in the same period were up 2.2 per cent to 187 from 184.4. The second quarter increase of 17.1 per cent more than offset the dip of 6.3 per cent in the first quarter of the year.
