A TRAGEDY FOR HALIFAX

Sad Death of Nine Halifaxgonlans

WHO LEFT THERE LAST APRIL FOR KLONDIKE.

And Perished on the Hay Mountain, B. C.

HALIFAX, June 10.—On April 12th, 1898, a party of nine Halifax men, led by Louis Dixon, left here bound for the Klondike gold fields.

They were heard last heard from in November last.

Yesterday word was telegraphed from Victoria that one of the party had reached there by steamer bringing the sad tidings that nine of the party had perished on Hay Mountain, B. C.

The names of the lost are John Brown, S. S. Dimock, Louis Dixon, W. H. Dunsworth, Thomas Gibbons, Arthur Longard.

Dixon was a prominent man in military circles, being a captain of the 63rd Rifles.

Respect For Persons.

OTTAWA, June 7.—An amusing incident occurred on McKay Street yesterday, in which Lord Minto figured. The Earl and his little daughter were riding on the sidewalk at a point where the sidewalk is bad and the bicyclists have got into the habit of using the sidewalk, police being scarce. McKay Street is near Rideau Hall. The Earl's daughter became nervous and said to a woman with a couple of children who were ahead: "Get out of the way; get off the sidewalk." The woman, who did not know the Earl or his daughter, replied: "Get off the sidewalk yourself. You have no right on it. 'I'll not get off for you, you husky.' She however, moved to one side. The Earl only smiled. Further down the street a little girl who was playing with a number of children, cried out: "Here, you big man, get off the sidewalk, or we will have you pulled."

The steamer Empress of Japan has brought news to Victoria, B. C., of the capture and execution of 11 Japanese, alleged to be spies, on Laotung Peninsula by the Russians. The Japanese Government is wrought up, and it may lead to war.

A Cairo despatch to the news agency reports that the gipsy husband of the Princess Caimay, Janos Rigo, died from the bubonic plague. Twin sons had been born in his household the day previously, and he had been entertaining friends all day. When he was stricken suddenly with this disease not only his companions, but also the servants, died. The English physicians did what they could to save Rigo's life, but the plague is fatal. The Princess has not been informed of her husband's death. She herself is being watched very closely for symptoms of the plague. The house has been quarantined. Rigo is the first European to be stricken with the plague here this year.

Special despatches from Manila say it is reported there that Aguinaldo has dissolved the Filipino Congress and has proclaimed himself dictator.

CADET CORPS FOR CANADA

Lads Between Fourteen Years

MAY ENLIST IN VOLUNTEER CADET BATTALIONS

To be Attached to Existing Infantry Battalions.

OTTAWA, Jun 10.—An important change, implying quite an extension of Militia quarters, is specified in to-days, militia orders.

It provides for the formation of Cadet battalions or Cadet companies to be attached to the existing military battalions of infantry or rifles, upon the recommendation of district officers commanding.

In very special cases Cadet battalion may be formed independently of the existing military corps.

They will consist of youths of not less than fourteen nor more than eighteen years of age.

An establishment will be fixed for each battalion on its formation.

A battalion shall consist of not less than four companies except in very special cases.

Each company shall comprise not less than forty nor more than one hundred boys. Officers will not be granted substantive commissions, but honorary appointments will be made on the recommendation of a general officer commanding.

Officers may be adults. No drill or other allowances can be entertained. The Cadet battalions will provide their own sergeant instructor.

FITZSIMMONS LOSES TO JEFFRIES.

The Cornishman is Rendered Unconscious

IN THE ELEVENTH ROUND—JEFFRIES IS CHAMPION

The Fight By Rounds—Scenes at the Ringside.

CONEY ISLAND, June 9.—(Ringside at 6 o'clock.)—When the ticket offices of the Club were opened, a long line of enthusiastic sporting men sheered clear to the avenue to be among the first to secure seats. The bulk of the money was offered at odds of 2 to 1. The far West, in particular California, favored Jeffries, whose weight will be 210 pounds.

Fitzsimmons will leave his training quarters late this evening. He declares that he is in the finest shape he has ever been in, and is confident of victory. His weight on entering the ring will be 170 pounds.

Many heavy wagers were laid, and at Jim Corbett's saloon, which it appears is headquarters for Californians, Jeffries' backers are not so great as are those of Fitzsimmons. But he has many admirers.

8.20 p. m.—The building is filling.

Jeffries and his advisers are now near the club house resting till the hour arrives. He is in a perfect condition and feels confident.

11.09.—A monstrous round applause greeted Fitz, a monstrous floral horseshoe was carried in, with the emblem "good luck to our champion" and was proudly held aloft by Julian. "Fitz," who received a rousing reception, bowed gracefully before taking his seat.

Jeffries came in immediately after. As he climbed the ring, Jim Corbett spoke to him encouragingly.

Inspector McLaughlin and Captain Kenney are in charge of a large force of police. No interference is anticipated.

THE FIGHT BY ROUNDS.

Round 1—Fitz dances as Jeffries' feints. Jeffries crouches and Fitz leads left. It goes over Jeffries' shoulder and a light clinch follows. They break instantly, and Jeffries is short on a left jab for the head. More dancing, and Jeffries touching chest with left then reaches mouth lightly with the same glove. Fitz grins, Jeffries then tries his left, Bob stopping and reaching Jeffries' neck with his right. Jeffries is short with left, he is short with left again but touches wind with left in next two tries. Just as the bell sounds Bob ducks under Jeffries' left for jaw. They are evidently feeling each other.

Round 2—Jeffries misses a left for the head, Bob rushes and puts his left on the neck and right over the heart, dancing away from a return. Jeffries closes into a light clinch, then crouching pushes his left to the stomach; but his right swing only grazes Bob's shoulder. Jeffries pushes two lefts to the wind and chest then jabs Bob's face twice with left. He pushes right to shoulder and Jeffries taps his ribs with right. Jeffries rushes to a clinch. They break and Jeffries lunges wildly with left. Jeffries shoots a straight left to the jaw and Bob goes down squarely. He is up and starts to rush, but his left and right drives for the head are tearfully blocked and the bells find them locked. Fitz's face wears a surprised expression as he walked to his corner.

Round 3—A clinch to open. Fitz missed left and Jeffries comes back with a left on nose and the claret shows on left facers. Fitz hooks left to neck and Jeffries comes back hard on the ribs with left and a right to the stomach. Jeffries jabs his left twice to the face. Jeffries puts in a stiff one on the stomach with left and repeats it a second time. Fitz hooks left to ear. Fitz's right goes over Jeffries head and an instant later Jeffries ducks into a stiff left catching it on the mouth. They were sparring at the bell.

Round 4—Jeffries misses a left, but ducks. Fitz right swing. Fitz sends left to stomach and Jeffries puts a good right over the heart. His left for the wind is stopped, but he shoots a hard left to the neck. Fitz smiles and hooks right to ear. Jeffries planks a sledge hammer right over the heart. Another miss of Fitz's draws Jeffries right to his ribs. Fitz puts a light left to the mouth and brings his right to the ear. Jeffries ducks

ENGLAND WILL NOT INTERFERE

In the Government of China.

AS SUGGESTED BY LORD CHARLES BERESFORD.

Statement Made in House of Commons By Mr. Broderick.

LONDON, June 10.—In the House of Commons the Right Honourable William St. John Broderick pointed out the difficulties in the way of meeting Lord Beresford's desire that Great Britain should take control of the Government of China, adding that he thought His Lordship was over sanguine in believing that the United States would follow the lead of Great Britain. Germany, he continued, had great interests in China, but she had a thousand times greater interests in Europe.


