THE MANITOBA SCHOOL QUESTION.

It was understood that Separate Schools were guaranteed the minority in Manitoba as they are guaranteed the Protestant minority in Quebec and the Roman Catholic minority in Ontario. But the Grit Party in Manitoba enacted a law under the operation of which separate schools could not be maintained; and the Privy Council declared this law to be ultra vires, or, in popular English, "all right." Then a question arose as to the right and duty of the Dominion Parliament to grant the minority deprived of separate schools a remedial legislation. This question was carried to the Privy Council, which has recently decided that the Dominion Parliament has this right. It is now stated that if the Dominion Parliament should dare to assert this right, "Manitoba will resist."

In the course of his great speech at Galt, Ontario, Hon. Mr. Foster said: When Mr. Laurier and the leaders of the Opposition put in their pleas to be admitted to the Government of the country, they always carried out their threats to be given a chance to carry out their policy, they always pretenthat by attempting to show that the state of the country is so deplorable and so bad that perforce it is necessary they should be called to take hold of affairs in order to extricate the country from its perilous position and in order to save it, if not from present, certainly impending ruin. The whole basis of the claim they make for a change of Government and a change of policy is that the country's condition is bad and that it needs to be remedied. MINISTERS IN THE WEST.

EXTRACTS from the speeches of Hon. J. C. Patterson and Hon. George E. Foster will be found in THE EXAMINER of to-day. These will be found very much to the point. A clear statement is made of the latest negotiation concerning reciprocity, and it is shown that the terms rejected by the Canadian commissioners were, admittedly, nothing short of discrimination against all other countries (including Great Britain) in favor of the United States! That the Canadian commissioners were right in rejecting such terms, even if it were not also required that the tariff of Canada should be uniform with that of the United States, is now patent to every one. Suppose that the Canadians had been false to the Mother Country and accepted the United States terms of reciprocity, what would our position now be? We should have done a much larger trade with the United States and a much smaller trade with Great Britain and the rest of the world, the result being that our merchants and dealers would have been so deeply involved in the affairs of the merchants and dealers of the United States that Canada would have been involved in the wide-spread commercial disaster and ruin which overtook the United States last year. More than that, we should now be making up by direct taxation the loss of revenue resulting from free trade with the States and greatly reduced trade with the rest of the world. It is indeed fortunate that we have loyal and sagacious men at the head of Canadian affairs, instead of those who clamor for reciprocity at any price. Reciprocity upon fair and reasonable terms would be a good thing; but reciprocity on the terms proposed by the United States and the grits would be the ruin of Canada.

(Cheers) These railways are for carrying people and carrying freight. Now, in 1878 they carried 6,500,000 passengers, but in 1893 they carried 13,000,000, an increase of 100 per cent. In 1878 the railways carried 8,500,000 tons of freight, and in 1893 the amount carried was 22,000,000 tons, and increase of 160 per cent. (Cheers) Going to the canals, I have not the figures before me for 1878, although they can be got. But there has been a measurably proportionate increase in the tonnage of freight carried in canals in the same time.
