## Proposal Is Expected On Electric Plant Sale

SUMMERSIDE — Reporting that a "good proposal" had been made by Maritime Electric Company for the purchase of the lines owned by the town, Councillor W.E. MacAuland last night told the regular monthly meeting of the council there were several minor matters to be ironed out yet.

He stated he believed a full report on the matter would be available to the light committee within a week.

The council meeting was delayed over an hour in the absence of Mayor W.A. Currie while a caucus was held. It finally started with Deputy Mayor MacAuland presiding. Mayor Currie arrived shortly after 9 o'clock and took the chair. Apologizing for being late he said he favored a causeway after being eighth in line left at Caribou and then racing to Tormentine to be first in the line left there.

In a relatively short business session council approved a resolution granting a license to Howard Waite to establish a retail drug business in his residence at

61 Central Street as a convenience to the people of the area. Dr. H. E. Clark was named civil defence Co-ordinator for Summerside on motion of Councillor Dewar, seconded by Councillor Wood and supported by Councillor MacAuland.

J. C. McKenna and Walter Peters were appointed fence-viewers for Summerside.

Councillor Dewar reporting for the street department while opposing the tending of the town's heavy equipment to contractors and that in a recent instance he had agreed to such a move because the town received in exchange 300 loads of clay for the town dump in addition to being paid rental for the machine.

In the monthly police report Chief Peter White stated during the lobster carnival last month the town experienced the heaviest traffic ever to take place here. His report showed fines and costs of \$813.50 collected while parking meter collections were \$588.50 in the month of July.

## Labor Relations Board Personnel Announced

The personnel of the provincial Labor Relations Board was announced this morning by Labor Minister A.A. MacIsaac. The five member board containing three men and two women will represent both management and labor.

Chairman is Gilbert A. Gaudet, Q.C., Queens County Magistrate. For management, the representatives are William Smallman, president of Smallman's Limited Summerside and Mrs. Milton Bell of Old Spain Restaurant, Charlottetown.

Representing labor on the Board are Jack Brown, president of the CLC in Prince Ed-

ward Island and Miss Eleanor Hennessey, secretary of the Civic Employee Union, Local 501.

Mr. MacIsaac said he felt that the establishment of the board would fill a long felt need both from a management and labour standpoint.

The board which was established through the passing of the Labour Relations Act passed at the last session of the Legislature will have to do with such matters as certification of unions, conciliation matters and other things pertinent to labor as they affect both management and the employee.

## Potato Blight Said Serious

SUMMERSIDE — Belief that the potato blight situation in Prince County is becoming serious was expressed here by dealers yesterday. They feel the continued wet weather will cause the disease to spread rapidly due in large part to failure of growers to provide sufficient spraying earlier.

Up to a week ago the crop was reported looking excellent, but the spread of blight could easily cut the yield by one third to one half spokesmen said. Acreage planted is smaller this year by approximately 10 to 12 percent due in part to low prices prevailing generally during the winter with the greatest reduction reported in seed potato plantings.
