Durelle, one of the top ranking contenders for the Canadian middleweight boxing crown, will be facing a stern test when he meets Warrington. Durelle will be giving away more than 10 pounds and years of ring experience to the veteran Nova Scotian. The 20-year-old Bale Ste. Anne, N. B. slugger, has been showing up well in training.

Working with him have been three sparring partners, Billy Lashley, former Maritime light heavyweight champ, Lucky Abraham, Truro, N. S. light heavy and Johnny Harvey, Moncton lightweight.

"Why worry about following the ball in its flight," he said. "You can feel the shot. A good shot feels good; a flubbed shot feels poor, and you instinctively feel where the ball is going to come to rest."

## Pitcher Houtteman Wins 10th Game As Detroit Defeats White Sox 6-2

The Island Physical Fitness Baseball League schedule took another beating from "old man weather" at both Charlottetown and Summerside again yesterday, when the local clash between Falcons and Curran and Briggs over Memorial Field and the Western Capital meeting between Abies and R.C.A.F. were rained out. It is getting to be a habit, but there isn't anything one can do about it—unless some kind benefactor builds an indoor stadium.

This is the third time in 10 days that double features have been rained out, and with the exception of one postponement at Summerside, leaves five games to be made up somewhere during the schedule. The R.C.A.F.-C. and B. game, rained out on June 21st, was played the following day with the C. and B. boys the victors by an 8-3 count. Strange as it may seem, the City Junior Baseball League, who play twice weekly the same as the senior squads, have yet to suffer a postponement in six scheduled starts, although they had a near miss Tuesday. The Kinsmen and Victorias played in mist and drizzle before empty bleachers to keep their games up to schedule. Incidentally, the Vics won 8-2.

Horse racing too, took it on the chin yesterday. The opening Wednesday afternoon meet of the season was washed out at Riverside Raceway at Vernon. The meet was postponed until this Saturday afternoon (Dominion Day). Unlike the baseball circuit, however, it is the first postponement for the horsemen and racing fans. The first two Saturday night meets at the Exhibition track were on the borderline both times, but managed to run them off without dampening the ardor of racing fans, although there were a few damp feet and wet necks, particularly on the opening night.

It is an ill wind that blows nobody good, however. The land needed the rain badly. This "fair tale" depends on the land for its livelihood. If the farmers don't have crops, we don't eat; and who wants to go to a ball game or a horse race on an empty stomach anyway.

Contained in a publication entitled "Knotty Problems of Baseball," put out by The Sporting News and compiled by Billy Evans, General Manager of the Detroit Baseball Club and an American League Umpire for 22 years, there are some unusual and interesting problems which should be of much value to local players and enthusiasts of the game. If space and time permit, it is hoped that some of these might be used here from time to time. For the time being, anyway, here is one for you to figure out.

Quoting the author he states: "Baseball abounds in freak plays. In an unique and unusual inning in which four batters stepped to the plate, the first man up getting on through a single, the side was retired without any player in the field taking part in the three outs. How could this happen, you say? Listen.

"The first batter hit safely and reached first. Desirous of playing for a run, the second batter was instructed to bunt with the hope of advancing the runner from first to second, where he would be in position to score on a base hit. The batter's effort to bunt seemed perfect, but, while the ball was in fair territory, his own throw hit the ball for the second time, thereby deflecting the course of the ball. On such a play the umpire must call the batsman out because of the bat's interference and no runner's advance. The ball becoming dead, the runner on first returned to that base.

"The third batter was given the signal for a hit and run play. Despite a healthy swing, his effort resulted in nothing more than a slow bouncer down the first base line. Unfortunately, the batsman was hit by his own batted ball in fair territory and was declared out as a result. Again the ball became dead and no runners could advance. The fourth batter of the inning sent a drive between first and second that seemed certain to go safe. The runner, off with the pitch, had the tough break of running directly into the batted ball, on which a play would have been impossible. The umpire must call out the runner for being hit by the batted ball, while the batsman was credited with a base hit.

"Thus, all three outs were made

Other big league pitchers may, and probably will, chalk up more victories this year than Art Houtteman. But the Detroit Tigers' classy right hander will always have the honor of having been the first 1950 10-game winner.

He hit the mark yesterday as he turned back Chicago White Sox 6-2 in an American League game.

The victory protected Detroit's 4-1-2-game lead in the American League race as second-place New York also won today.

It was the fourth triumph in a row for the 22-year-old Houtteman who has lost five.

Powerful batting support from Hoot Evers and Don Kolloway broke up Houtteman's pitching duel with Ken Holcombe and sent the Tigers on their way to their third straight over the Chicagoans.

Evers' 14th homer, a 420-foot inside-the-park wallop, drove two runs across in the fifth to break a 1-1 deadlock.

Kolloway added two more in the sixth on his third homer into the left field stands.

Allie Reynolds, veteran New York right-hander, pitched a three-hitter as the Yanks defeated Washington 5-1 at New York to even their series at one victory apiece.

But for wildness in the fifth, Reynolds would have pitched a shutout. A single and three straight walks forced in the only Senator run. Washington had a good chance to break the game wide open but Sam Mele popped out with the bases loaded.

Gene Hermanski's first home run of the season broke a deadlock between Preacher Roe and Sheldon Jones in the seventh and gave Brooklyn a 5-3 National League victory over New York.

## Outfielder Injured

Brooklyn outfielder Carl Furillo was injured by Jones in the eighth and was carried off the field on a stretcher. He was not believed to be seriously injured.

Furillo has been hitting 500 since the Brooks returned home and in his two previous trips to the plate he batted out a two-run homer and a single.

Chicago Cubs rolled up their biggest scoring total of the season. They massacred St. Louis Cardinals 16-3 before a Chicago Ladies-day crowd of 25,062 that included 12,100 paid.

While Doyle Lade went the route, scattering nine hits, the Cubs walked George Munger, Cloyd Boyler and Jim Hearn for 15 hits. They included three homers, a triple and four doubles for a total of 30 bases.

Roy Smalley topped the assault with his 12th homer, a triple, double and single in five times up. The other homers were No. 7 for Phil Cavaretta and No. 10 for Andy Pafko. The first eight Cub runs were powered across on home runs.

Houtteman's 10-win mark was equaled in a night National League game at Boston when Johnny Sain whipped Philadelphia, 3-1, and knocked the Phils back into second place behind Brooklyn.

Pittsburgh Pirates rallied for two runs in the eighth to edge Cincinnati Reds 6-5 before a sparse crowd of 12,040. The payoff blow was Stan Rojek's run-scoring double with two men out.

## Noor Wins Race From Citation

ALBANY, Calif., June 28—(AP)—Swift-running Noor, the four-legged wind splitter from Ireland, took the measure of a mighty Citation Saturday for the fourth time in winning the \$50,000-added Golden Gate handicap in world-cracking time of one minute 58 1-5 seconds for the 1 1-4 miles.

The invincible Irisher, after running last for nearly a mile, moved up on the outside, followed by the Cucumber Farm pride.

As they charged into the stretch they picked up light-weighted On Trust which had led from the start and at one time held a lead of nearly 10 lengths.

Noor's winning margin was three lengths over Citation. Citation was a length ahead of On Trust.

It was Noor's second world record performance within a week. The previous Saturday in defeating Citation by a neck, he hung up a mark for 1 7-8 miles of one minute, 46 4-5 seconds.

Noor was flying in the stretch while a Northern California track record crowd of 32,900 cheered the five-year-old son of Nasrullah on. Jimmy Longden one-time Taber, Alta, minor was riding easily in the saddle while Steve Brooks whipped Citation furiously in the closing strides.

## Canada Completes Davis Cup Team

MONTREAL, June 28—(CP)—The Canadian Lawn Tennis Association today completed its 1950 Davis Cup team with the selection of George Robinson of Montreal, a recognized doubles star.

Canada's four-man representation against Australia in the first-round American zone tie here July 14-16 will be made up of Robinson and two other Montreals—Henri Rochon and Brendan Macken—and the young Vancouver star Lorne Main.

The three already chosen are competing now in tournaments in the United States. The full team will gather in Montreal next week for training.

Robinson, a newcomer to international competition, is a ranking doubles competitor. He teamed up with Rochon to win both the Ontario and Quebec Provincial doubles championships last year and has figured as a winner in lesser tournaments.

## Reports Monster In African Hinterland

JOHANNESBURG, June 28—(Reuters)—Along the bushy banks of the Ingwempisi, not far from the borders of Swaziland, there lives in a secret lair in the lonely hinterland a black, snake-like monster, 70 feet long and thick as a man's body.

At least, that's the report of George Atherstone, described by police as a reliable business man, from the town of Piet Retief. He says he saw the monster's great head and the coils of its undulating body at a spot where it had frightened African women.

"The monster undulated through the water as if swimming," he said. "At one time the tail was on one bank and the thickest part of the body—thick as a man—was on the other, 40 feet across, and the head was swaying menacingly in mid-stream."

Police rushed to the Ingwempisi. They have seen no part of the monster, but they have seen the water boiling furiously "where normally it flows calm and deep," they said.

## Star-Studded Field For Canadian Open Golf Meet In August Is Predicted

MONTREAL, June 28—(CP)—Some of the Royal Canadian Golf Association brass took a new gander into the crystal ball today and saw bright prospects for the Canadian open at Royal Montreal Aug. 24-27.

There were high hopes that the American representation this year will be a star-studded invasion, more so than for some years.

There was some basis in fact for the optimism. The Canadian open now holds top billing with tournaments for which points are given for places on the United States Ryder cup team, the squad that annually meets Britain in the classic competition.

In addition, scores in the Canadian open will be counted for the Vardon Trophy, annually awarded the American pro with the lowest average over the tournament year.

There was expectation that the scramble for \$10,800 prize money this year will include at least two of the three stars who went into a playoff for the United States open a few weeks ago.

Little Ben Hogan, who came out on top, is the most doubtful entry at the moment. Hogan has been spacing out his tournament play carefully since his return to competition after an automobile accident.

Lloyd Mangrum, a top-money man in recent years, was a competitor at Montreal Beacomfield immediately after winning the United States open five years ago. He has been turning up pretty regularly for the Canadian open ever since.

George Fazio, last of the U. S. playoff trio, has been trying for a repeat performance since he won at Beacomfield.

Whether Slamming Sam Snead will compete this year is a matter of conjecture. Snead now is far out in front in Ryder Cup point accumulation and can afford to pass up a few tournaments.

Practically certain to be back is Dutch Harrison, the ambling Arkansas who hugely enjoyed kidding himself and the gallery at Toronto St. Georges last year. Harrison shot an amazing 77-under-par 371 to win the 1949 open there.

## Elect Dit Clapper To Boston Bruins Board of Directors

BOSTON, June 28—(AP)—The election of Aubrey (Dit) Clapper as a member of the board of directors of Boston Bruins was announced today by president Weston W. Adams of the National Hockey League club.

Clapper, who starred for the Bruins for 20 seasons after joining the club as a 20-year-old rookie in 1927, resigned as coach after the 1948-49 season to devote full time to his sports goods business in Peterborough, Ont.

A star right winger and defenceman, Clapper became the only active player to be elected to the International Hockey Hall of Fame in 1947.

The Bruins have been without a coach since George (Buck) Boucher severed his connections with the club at the close of last season and there has been much speculation that Adams and general manager Art Ross wished Clapper to return to their bench for the 1950-51 season.

## Harper Wins Pro Golf Title

COLUMBUS, O., June 28—(AP)—Chandler Harper, 38-year-old public course professional from Portsmouth, Va., today won the \$40,000 mid-century Professional Golfers Association championship, defeating Henry Williams, Jr., of Secane, Pa., 4 and 3 in the 36-hole final.

Harper led all the way and closed out the match on the 33rd hole with a seven-foot putt for a birdie three.

In 12 years of touring the tournament trail, Harper had won only one tournament up to today—the 1950 Tucson open. His victory here came as a surprise to everyone but Chandler Harper.

Today's match between the two dark horses was a draw one most of the way. Williams, nervous at the start, went over par on the first three holes to give Harper a 3-up lead, and Williams never got more than one of them back.

## 53 Entries For Sydney Race

SYDNEY, N. S., Sept. 28—(CP)—Officials at the Sports Centre said today 53 horses are listed to start here in the July 1 light harness racing meet. It will be the first day racing meet at the Sydney track this season.
