Canadian Army Casualty List

OTTAWA, March 22 — (CP) — The army today issued its 96th casualty list of the Korean war, reporting one man—Pte. Roch Marcel Beaudoin of Montreal—wounded in action.

It was the first casualty list issued since Feb. 21 and brought to 703 the number of casualties suffered by Canadian troops in Korea, including 130 dead, 506 wounded, 60 injured, four missing and one prisoner-of-war.

Pte. Beaudoin is with the 2nd Battalion, Royal 22nd Regiment. His wife, Mrs. R. N. Beaudoin, lives at 1196 St. Georges Street, Montreal.
