

Jennie Kalmuck Wins Free-For-All Trot

Four Horses Get New Marks In Keen Battles At Afternoon Race Meet

Upwards of 4,000 people crowded into the stands and grounds of the Exhibition Raceway yesterday afternoon where they witnessed a fine card of close, keen racing that saw the standing records of four horses go by the boards when they came roaring home to set new ones.

The 10-dash card, which was interspersed with an excellent vaudeville show, produced changing battles in practically every event, and although the favourites held true to form in the majority, these decided upset added extra interest to pay off well at the parimutuels.

The first four events on the card saw the winning horses in three of them set new records.

Ann's Boy, a brown gelding owned and driven by George Callbeck of Summerside, flashed to the wire for three straight wins in the second division of the 2:25 pace, lowering his mark to 2:14.25 in the first dash. Winning two of the three dashes of the first division 2:26 trot, Lusty's Queen, owned by Hines and Nicholson, Halifax, sheared 2-5 of a second off her standing mark when she trotted the first mile in a time of 2:14.

Tyndall Semple, owned and driven by George Woodside of Fredericton, N. B., pulled a major upset in the final dash on the card, the first division 2:26 trot, outstripping Lusty's Queen and Jandale to the wire for a new time of 2:16.15, a large 1-5 second off his previous mark of 2:18.5.

Abbelland, owned by J. S. Watts of Gaspé, Quebec, shaded his previous mark of 2:10.4-5, the fastest time of the meet, by a matter of 1-5 a second in winning the opening dash of the second division 2:10-2:20 classified.

Hooper's Billy McVey, driven by Harvey Cormier, scored with the biggest upset of the day in the second dash of that event, to pay \$7 ticket holders \$43.80.

The other longshot to come to the wire ahead of the favourites was Prince Budlong, owned and driven by Harold Cudmore of Frackley, when he went to front at the first turn to stay on top a winner all the way, despite repeated challenges from the rest of the field. Rusty Hanover, owned and driven by Paul Woodcock, St. Stephen, N. B., won the first heat of the class in 2:11.4-5.

IN THIS CORNER

The annual Maritime track and field championships will be held at Columbus Field, Antigonish, N. S. on Wednesday, August 22nd. It was learned here yesterday that the announcement was made by the Antigonish Highland Society which will sponsor the meet. It will be the fifth post-war championship meeting. The day's competitions will include both senior and juvenile events, the latter feature being the first official Maritime juvenile meet.

In conjunction with the competitions, a get-together of representatives from all Maritime Provinces is being planned by the sponsoring amateur athletic club. The purpose of the session will be to form a new Maritime Track and Field Association to foster track and field in these regions. Formerly, the cinder games came under the jurisdiction of the Maritime Amateur Athletic Union but since this no longer exists, a new organization must be formed. The union was disbanded at a meeting of the Highland Games, when delegates felt that the M.A.A.U. was not serving its purpose, and that "there was a seeming lack of interest in amateur sports in the Maritime Provinces." Newfoundland, Canada's newest Province has been invited to send representatives to the track and field competitions.

Conditions of the meet require that both juvenile and senior competitors must present their amateur cards prior to participation, but they may be procured on the field the day of the meet. In juvenile competition birth certificates must accompany all entries or be available on request the day of the meet. The stipulations for juvenile athletes are as follows: "Athletes who have not reached their eighteenth birthday on the day of the meet are eligible." All entries must be received by the secretary, John Kyte, Antigonish, N. S., not later than midnight August 15th. Post entries will not be accepted.

Events to be held in senior competition, as laid down by the officials of the meet, will include the 100 and 220 yard dashes, 880 and one-mile runs, and one-mile relay in the track division, while in the field events, the running high and running broad vault, high step and jump, pole vault, discus, hammer throw, 16 pound shot put, javelin throw and six-mile run. The juvenile events will consist of the 100, 200 and 440 yard dashes, 880 yards and one-mile runs, 440 yard relay, running high, running broad and high step and jump, 6-pound shot put and pole vault.

In scoring for the events, the following system has been laid down: 1st, 5 points; 2nd, 3 points; 3rd, 1 point. Relay: 1st, 15 points; 2nd, 6 points; 3rd, 1 point. There will be no limit as to the number of competitors in each event.

As regards Island representation at the forthcoming meet, the local Abegweit Club will send a small, four-man senior team it was stated here yesterday by team captain George Walters. Due to the loss of a number of leading Abegweit performers they have been restricted to a small team this year. They will not enter a juvenile team.

Those who will represent the Abegweits will be Wendall Barrett, Ronnie Atkinson, Russell Doyle, and team captain George Walters. Although a small band, they can be depended upon to make a creditable showing in individual efforts in keeping with the age-old tradition of the Abegweit Amateur Athletic Club.

Ontario Horse Owner Suspended For Life

TORONTO, Aug. 15 (CP) - G. W. Sharrard of Hamilton, owner and trainer of race hogs, today was suspended for life by the Ontario Racing Commission.

The commission said it took the action because Sharrard accepted a bribe to induce him to interfere with the running of horses entered in a race at Port Erie Track July 29.

Sharrard was the first trainer to receive a lifetime suspension in the investigation by the commission of suspected race-fixing on Ontario tracks.

However, six jockeys previously had been ruled off Ontario tracks for life, either for bribing or accepting bribes. Two of them—George Thompson of Hamilton and Robert Wankmuller of Newark, N. J.—have been arrested.

Sharrard had been under suspension since Aug. 9 when the racing commission announced his horses would be barred from racing in Ontario pending further investigation.

German Fans Boo Russians

BERLIN, Aug. 15 (AP) - Russia's athletes are being booed right and left by Germans in the Communist-sponsored World Youth Festival games.

It seems German fans won't take certain Russian tactics lying down as the Eastern Satellites are forced to do. They yell in protest when they see a Russian runner elbowing a rival.

The booping started last weekend. Fans howled when the Moscow Dynamo soccer team was helped to a 2-0 victory over a German eleven through the "family work" of a referee brought along from Moscow.

The latest incident occurred at an East Berlin field during the running of the 10,000-metre race. In the audience were nearly 30,000 blue-shirted German Communist youths.

In the late laps, a slim Hungarian named Penzes was running strongly and looked like the winner. But then, according to witnesses, three Russian runners boxed him in and ruffed him up so he nearly fell. When Penzes tried to run around them, the Russians bumped him and again boxed him so effectively that all three finished ahead.

More Than 7,000 See Keen Racing At Night Program

An entry from Springhill, N. S., Lorne Letcher's Jenny Kalmuck, was the big winner of last night's Old Home Week feature racing attraction, the free-for-all trot.

Witnessed by a huge crowd estimated to be between seven and eight thousand, Letcher piloted his own entry to three straight victories to top off the top honors in a very decided manner. Cobblestone, owned by P. J. Cadegan of Glace Bay and driven by Worrell Lewis, was the leading contender in all three dashes for the place position.

A perfect night for racing and the track in ideal condition, the 11-dash program came up with some stellar racing duels that provided a thrill a second for the overflowing crowd of enthusiastic racing fans.

Favorites were consistent throughout the nights events, with all but two of the five classes ending in straight wins. Billy Conn and New Look split the honors in the fifth division of the 2:10-2:20 classified, while Jerry Lee Volo and J.S.J. divided honors with a win and a place each in the fourth division of the same class. J.S.J.'s winning time in the second dash of that class was the fastest of the night, 2:11.4-5, a new record by 1-5 seconds for the Horace B. Willis owned entry driven by Harvey Cormier.

Winners of other events saw Harry Hirsch's Globetrotter, driven by G. Maguer, take the sixth division 2:10-2:20 classified in two straight wins, while Dale B., owned by George Hughes of Brackley, was a double winner in the third division of the 2:10-2:20 classified. Dale B. gave bettors their best win pay of the night, \$21.60 in the first dash of the class, the 2:10-2:20 classified, while Dale was driven by Claude O'Brien.

There were only two set-backs during the night's program, Richard Budlong being placed from second to fourth for interference on the first turn in the 10th race, and Friar from fourth to fifth for performing at a mixed gait in the third race.
