### TORONTO SCENE PERKING UP

## Tunney Wants To Match Moore-Wallace In Title Go

TORONTO (CP) — The Toronto fight scene, practically at a standstill since the late 1920s and early '30s when fans saw world champions — or leading contenders — come and go, has perked up in the last couple of days. Rival promoters talk of staging world championship bouts as casually as the weather.

The latest diversion cropped up Friday. Frank Tunney, who also dabbles as wrestling promoter here and in various other Ontario cities, announced he has offered Archie Moore, world light-heavyweight champion, \$45,000 to defend his title in Toronto. His opponent would be Gordon Wallace, the Brantford, Ont., boxer who recently won the British Empire title.

It would be, said Tunney, a world-title fight over 15 rounds and the site would be Maple Leaf Gardens, home of the Toronto National Hockey League team. All that is needed to clinch the bout is the okay from Moore; Wallace is agreeable to a percentage of the gate.

PARKER BOUT FIRST

Tunney said the fight would take place "as soon as possible." But there's a catch. Moore is scheduled to arrive here next Tuesday to sign for a 15-rounder in July with another promoter. That bout would be with James J. Parker of Barrie, Ont., the No. 1 contender for the vacant Canadian heavyweight title.

Moore is the top contender for the world-heavyweight title, vacated by Rocky Marciano, Parker isn't listed in the first 10.

Promotion of the proposed Moore-Parker scrap would be a truly international deal between Jack Kearns of New York, Jack Solomons of London, England, and Vic Bagnato of Toronto. Fred Rush of Toronto, manager of Parker, has offered Moore a contract calling for \$40,000.

It is unlikely any state in the U.S. would recognize the winner as champ and in this country the Canadian Boxing Federation has no authority to sanction a world title fight.

Gene Letourneau of Quebec, national commissioner of the CBF, said Friday the federation could only go so far as to recognize the winner as the "best uncrowned heavyweight fighter in the world."

The Tunney offer didn't excite Rush.

"Tunney positively cannot get Moore," he said. "Archie will be in town Monday night. Tunney can talk to him then if he likes, but it won't do him any good."

What's more, Rush said the fight would be recognized as "being for the heavyweight championship of the world." But that is hardly likely.

### 24 Swimmers To Try Channel

LONDON (AP) — Twenty-four swimmers from 20 countries, including Tom Park, a native of Hamilton, Ont., will set out from France Aug. 12 in an attempt to cross the English Channel.

The first man and woman to step ashore in England each will receive £500 and a trophy.

Park, now a resident of Lake-wood, Calif., last Monday swam the Catalina channel from the California mainland in nine hours, 10 minutes and 30 seconds. His time was about 21 hours less than the previous record for the swim from the mainland.

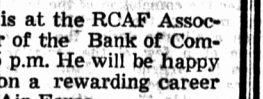

### IN OHIO DERBY

Canadian Champ Second Choice

CLEVELAND (CP) — Canadian Champ, second choice in today's \$40,000-added Ohio Derby at Thistledown Park, has a good chance of becoming the third Canadian-bred horse to win \$100,000 in purses. The Toronto-owned three-year-old colt has earned \$83,250 in his two-year racing career.

The Champ, winner of last week's \$25,000-added Queen's Plate stakes at Toronto, probably will go to the post at 5:50 p.m. EDT at 4-to-1 odds. The favorite for the 1 1/4-mile event is Fabius, a fast colt who has placed in the money at all three events of racing's triple crown — the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont stakes.

Fabius bred a half mile in 50 seconds flat Friday and trainer Jimmy Jones said he was well satisfied with the workout. Canadian Champ covered the distance in 48.3 Thursday.

HARTACK TO RIDE FABIUS

Willie Hartack will return from a 10-day rough-riding suspension to ride the Calumet Farm's horse and Hedy Woodhouse, native of Vancouver, will be aboard Canadian Champ.

Only two Canadian-bred horses have topped the \$100,000 figure in purses. They are Kingarvie, bred by R. S. McLaughlin of Oshawa, Ont., and Canadiana, bred and owned by Toronto industrialist-sportsman E. P. Taylor.

The Champ and Fabius are two horses who like to rush into the lead and stay there all the way. The Champ, winner of his 10 starts in Canada, hasn't been extended as a three-year-old and this will be his big test.

The Champ ran three races in the U.S. as a two-year-old and lost them all. He was second to Renegead and Career Boy and placed seventh in his other American outing.

A's Recall Spook Jacobs

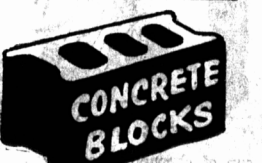

The Jets said the club will get a replacement from Pittsburgh, but that the name of the player has not been announced.

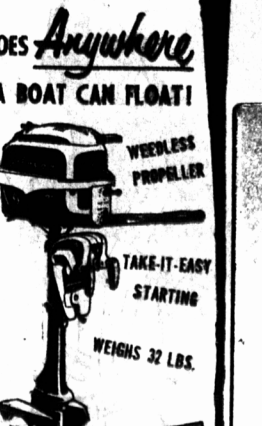
