—Mrs. Kenneth Macdonald and daughter Anne of Borden, left on Friday, May 22nd, for Portland, Maine, where they will visit relatives.

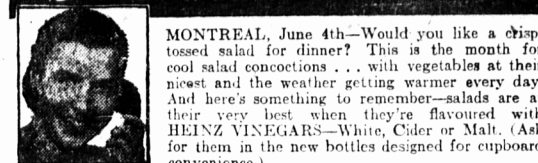

AFTERNOON SIESTA

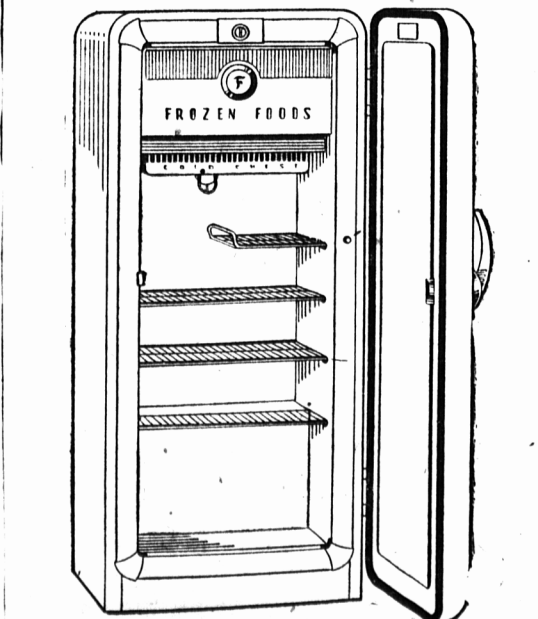
