vessels to carry immense quantities of oil, cotton, lumber, and agricultural products to all important world ports. Houston, named after General Sam Houston, was the first capital of the Republic of Texas.

The first cane sugar factory west of the Mississippi was built at Sugarland. It has a capacity of 1 1/2 million pounds per day. From Sugarland the railway starts climbing more rapidly. It rises from 32 feet to 850 feet in altitude at Luling, the centre of an oil producing area, and 661 feet at San Antonio, the third largest city in Texas. In that city the San Antonio river winds so that it is crossed by 42 bridges within the city limits. Nearby is Fort Sam Houston, the Lackland Air Force base and Randolph Field with their large military establishments. In the heart of the city is the famous Alamo, where 182 Texans, in 1836, withstood for 11 days, 5,000 Mexican regulars. There were no survivors, but the battle-cry of Texas liberty became: "Remember the Alamo."

The Sunset Limited continued west, crossing many tributaries of the Rio Grande River and through villages and towns with Spanish names. This area has many low hills where there are herds of sheep and Angora goats. The rainfall is light and the ranches are large, except where irrigation water can be obtained. Such irrigated areas are a deep rich green and can be seen for miles. At Spoford, a centre for livestock, wool and mohair, the railroad rises above the 1,000 foot elevation and a branch line extends south to Eagle Pass and connects with the National Railways of Mexico. The Southern Pacific swings toward the Rio Grande at Del Rio. At that point there is an international bridge; the Sunset Limited followed near the international boundary from there to the Devil's River. This river originates in a great spring, and is one of the clearest rivers in the world and for miles after it joins the Rio Grande, loaded with desert mud, there appear to be two rivers in the one channel side by side in this part of Texas.

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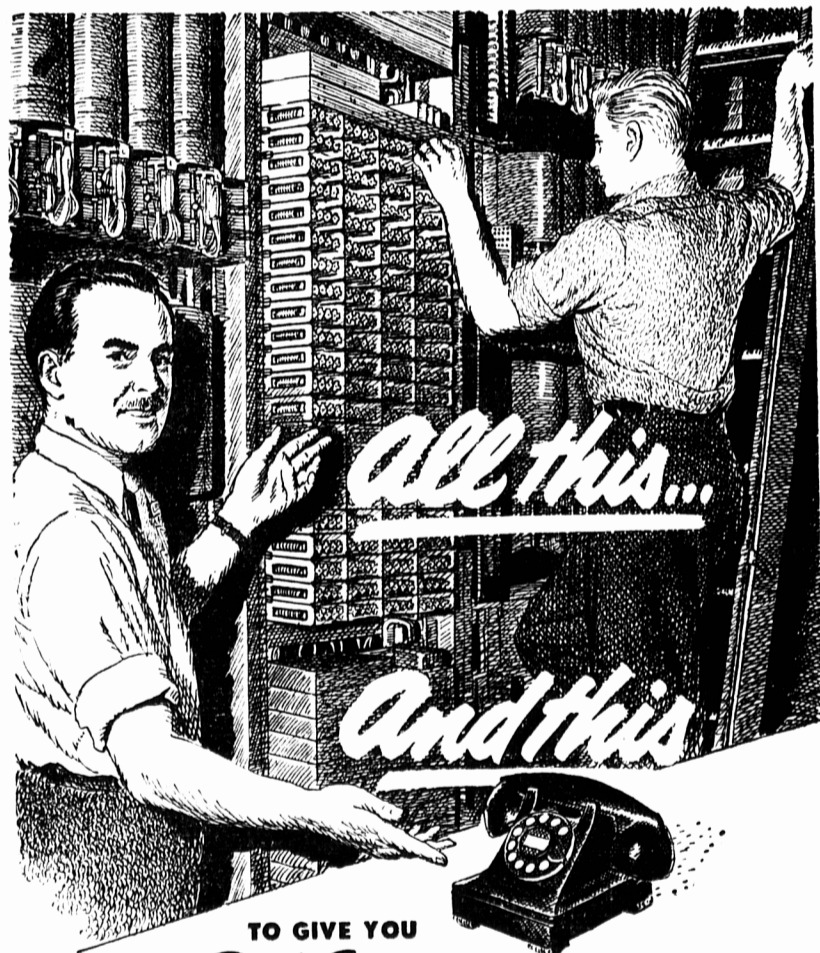
