Sweet Adelines Quit Because Of Racial Issue

RED DEER, Alta. (CP)—At least seven of the 39 members of the Sweet Adelines have resigned from the international singing organization because the charter says all members must be white. Mrs. Joyce Boyer, publicity director for the group, said the group was formed in the fall of 1958 and received 400 members in March, 1959. Britain, U.S. Security Deal Is Unaffected

LONDON (AP)—The British government said Wednesday that security co-operation with the United States has remained unaffected by Britain's espionage difficulties.

Informed officials said the same thing in Ottawa at least one aspect of British-American cooperation in the field of spy-hunting was discussed when President Kennedy was Prime Minister last week.

This apparently denoted a U.S. concern in the problem.

It was also reported that a tipped intelligence cooperation agreement helped Swedish authorities track down and arrest a spy in the U.S. Col. G. W. Wennerstrom who has been accused in Stockholm of spying for the U.S. government.
