Future Hopefuls Sod To Rangers

TORONTO (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs bought a bulk of the present during the week-end by selling his of the future.

Stafford Smythe, president of the National Hockey League club, said it was junior hockey legend Andy Bathgate from New York Rangers.

"After years of trying to entice the talented right winger away from New York with big money, we finally got it done," Smythe said in an interview. "The Rangers at least agreed to relinquish their most important point-getter when Toronto gave up Rod Seiling, a young star who was a way man with Toronto Marlboros of the Ontario Hockey Association Junior A League.

The package deal sent Don McKinnon, a 29-year-old center and left winger, to Toronto with the 31-year-old Bathgate in exchange for winger Steve Duff and Bob Nevin of the parent Leafs, defenceman Arnie Brown, of Rochester Americans of the American Hockey League, center Bill Collins of Denver Invaders of the Western Hockey League and — perhaps most important — Seiling.

"It was Seiling that did it for us," Smythe said. "They (the Rangers) were not interested in talk about Bathgate if we weren't willing to give up Seiling."

The 19-year-old Seiling, a defenseman who takes turns up front, played with Rev. David Bauer's Olympic team that finished fourth this winter at Innsbruck, Austria.

Bathgate, a play Saturday night when the Leafs overpowered the Rangers here 5-2, wound up on the short end of the stick.

"I was who had scored 272 goals in 12 seasons with the Rangers, filled in on Toronto's first line and kept his feet in but then he teamed up with centre Ron Kelly and left winger Frank Mahovlich to dazzle his old team mates, and he set up Kelly perfectly for Toronto's fifth goal.

McKenney, a 16-year NHL player traded by Boston Bruins last season for Dean Prentice, was even more devastating to his former New York teammates. He scored his 10th goal of the season and assisted on another.

Duff and Nevin, on the other hand, looked even more inept than they had during their recent slump with the Leafs.

The 20-year-old Duff, one of the favorites with Leaf fans since he graduated from St. Michael's College in the 1954-55 season, looked uncomfortable and out of place wearing Bathgate's old sweater with the No. 9 and the big C signifying captaincy. He looked anything but a captain, and during part of the third period he was replaced on the newly formed line with Nevin and center Eastgarfield.

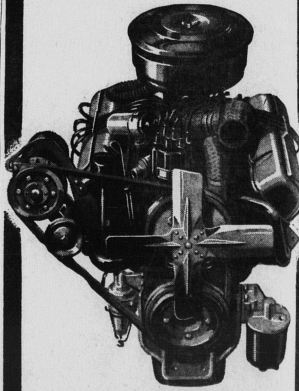
