U. Elects Pro-West President

Reds Heat Propaganda On Berlin

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet government shifted its propaganda campaign on Berlin into high gear Tuesday with a charge of military collusion between France and West Germany "for revision of the result of the Second World War."

A 2,000-word statement issued through the official news agency Tass said results of the recent visit of French President de Gaulle to West Germany Chancellor Adenauer show an urgent need for the conclusion of a German peace treaty and normalization on this basis of the situation in West Berlin.

Again the Russians threatened to sign a treaty with the Communists if the Western Powers do not go along, the Soviet Union and its Communist partners will sign a treaty with Communist East Germany, with all the ensuing consequences.

URGENTLY HIGHLIGHTED
The statement said the urgency of the situation has been emphasized by the establishment of a Bonn-Paris axis with the "secret hope that they would be able to take a leading place in this military alliance, to secure a leading role for France in the capitalist world."

Whatever the plans of the Bonn-Paris axis, it added, "their lot is to trail behind their stronger and more predatory West German partners, to follow in the wake of the revenge-seekers from the Rhine."
