**Report Growth of Girl Guides**

REGINA, July 3.—Growth of the Girl Guide movement under the banner of the Catholic Women's League of Canada was reported at the 18th annual convention here.

Mrs. J. Coffey, of Montreal, national president, who is provincial representative of the C.W.L. Girl Guides for Quebec, remarked that the movement was sweeping Canada. The Girl Guide movement was the foundation of the Catholic Youth Movement which was going to be the platform of Catholic Action all over Canada, she said.

A report of Girl Guide activities was sent by Mrs. Harriet O'Brien, Victoria, national convener, and read by Mrs. J. A. McCabe, Ottawa, honorary secretary.

A report of the organization committee under three divisions, East, West and Central Canada, was read by the honorary secretary.

A report from Mrs. D. A. Harquail, of Campbellton, N.B., of the East Division showed 10 dioceses with six new sub-divisions organized, a total of 134 active sub-divisions and a membership of 7,200. The East Division covers Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island.

Central Division is composed of 11 dioceses including Hamilton, Kingston, London, Ottawa, Pembroke, Peterboro, St. Ste. Marie, and Toronto, according to the report of Mrs. R. E. Fox, Sudbury.

The West Division consisted of 10 dioceses. Five sub-divisions had been reorganized, 12 new sub-divisions had been formed and the increase of membership in the past year was 397.

Reports from the immigration and travelers aid committees told of the work done in assisting immigrants, or in aid to travellers in Canada. Mrs. P. G. Cardigan, Peterboro, is convener of the immigration committee, and Mrs. P. J. McGarry, Kitchener, is convener of the travellers aid committee.

A report sent by Mrs. J. W. McCrae, Alexandria, Ont., told of activities of the child welfare committee in the past year. Phases of the work in various dioceses, sponsored by the committee, included instruction of prenatal care for mothers, instruction in health and hygiene, early education in the home, education of the school child, and the supervision of movies, libraries and news stands.

Miss Amelia Haley, Saint John, convener of the study club committee, sent a report of studies undertaken by the various clubs of the diocese. The committee directed and advised on subjects studied and often supplied literature for the work, the report showed.

Mrs. Paul Doyle, of Jacques River, N.B., gave a report of activities of the Chatham, N.B., diocese for the year.

**Rev. J. Fuller Named Provincial For All Canada**

SAINT JOHN, June 30.—It was learned from St. Peter's rectory last night that Rev. James Fuller, C.S.S.R., for the last six years novice master in the Saint John branch house of the Congregation of the Holy Redeemer otherwise known as the Redemptorist Fathers, had been appointed Provincial of the English-speaking Province of the Order in Canada.

Father Fuller is now in Toronto where he will enter upon his new duties in a few days in succession to Rev. P. M. Costello, C.S.S.R., also formerly of Saint John, who has served his full term as Provincial. The office is occupied in terms of six years. Occasionally incumbents are re-appointed for a second term, but no longer.

The honor conferred upon the comparatively young clergyman is considered a signal one and again the Saint John branch of the Redemptorists enjoys the distinction of supplying a premier priest to a section of the church that extends from Cornerbrook, Nfld., to Vancouver.

The newly-appointed Provincial was born in Quebec City. He received his boyhood tuition in the schools of that city and studied as a novice at Ichester, Md. His classical course were taken at the order's college in North East, Pa. He passed in philosophy and theology at the Redemptorist Seminary at Esopus-on-Hudson, N. Y. and was later a teacher in a novitiate at Montreal, the novitiate now located in Woodstock, Ont.

Ordained in Ontario

Father Fuller was ordained in St. Mary's College, Brockville, Ont., where he taught for three years and occupied the position of rector. From Brockville he was sent to Saint John as novice master, to have supervision and spiritual oversight of the young men in primary preparation for holy orders.

Very Rev. Peter O'Hare, C.S.S.R., rector of St. Peter's parish, North End, stated last night that Father Fuller's jurisdiction in the Canadian English-speaking branch of the Redemptorists embraces branches in Cornerbrook, Nfld.; Charlottetown, P. E. I.; Saint John, Quebec, Montreal, Brockville, Ontario, Toronto, Woodstock, Ont., and in western Canada, Winnipeg, Saskatchewan, Yorkton, Edmonton, Calgary, the Peace River district and Vancouver.

The Redemptorists are essentially a missionary branch of the Church "It is only accidental so to speak, that Saint John had a parish administered by the Order," the St. Peter's rector explained. "Our stations or Houses are chiefly educational and are considered as such."

**Canzoneri And McLarnin To Fight Aug. 27**

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 3.—Jimmy J. Canzoneri, Madison Square Garden matchmaker, announced today that Tony Canzoneri, lightweight champion, and Jimmy McLarnin of Vancouver, former welterweight king, have agreed to a 15-round return bout, to be held in the Garden's Long Island City Bowl, Aug. 27.

The bout will be held whether Canzoneri wins, loses or draws in his 135-pound title encounter with Lou Ambers, July 30.

Canzoneri defeated the Vancouver Irishman in a spectacular 15-round in the Garden last May.

**Representatives of Legion Sail On Ausonia**

**Jury May Get Case Today**

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) DORCHESTER, N. B., July 3.—With the jury excluded from the courtroom all day, admissibility of a statement allegedly made by Daniel Bannister to Inspector H. V. Harris of the Moncton City Police last January engaged the attention of the Westmoreland circuit court today at Bannister's second trial on a charge of murdering Philip Lake.

Six witnesses were called by the Crown in an attempt to prove the statement had been given freely and voluntarily. P. J. Hughes, K. C., and H. Murray Lambert, prosecutor and defence counsel, then addressed the court in argument for and against admission of the statement, which was excluded from evidence at the first trial of Bannister.

Mr. Justice J. H. A. L. Fairweather announced he would give his decision in the matter tomorrow morning. Barring further unexpected delay, the case may go to the jury tomorrow afternoon.
