S. G. Peppin, Potato Pioneer, Dies At Daytona Beach, Fla.

S. G. Peppin, a district seed potato inspector here from 1917 to 1950, died at Daytona Beach, Florida, on Saturday. He had been in failing health the past few weeks and had undergone an operation in Florida which was not successful. Mr. Peppin came to this province as chief seed potato inspector in 1917 and saw many changes as he literally grew up with the seed industry before retiring in 1950.

The Sebagoes continued to increase in popularity until they completely dominated the seed potato picture, so far as acreage was concerned. An advocate of "one-desk selling" he told those gathered to pay him honor on retirement that "the federal minister of agriculture is determined that the shipping should be taken charge of by the potato people."
