Hon Charles Young, LL. D.

THE HONORABLE CHARLES YOUNG, LL. D., Judge of Probate, passed away on Saturday evening, in his eightieth year. He had been in good health until about a fortnight ago, when he was seized by influenza. The deceased was a native of Glasgow, a son of the writer of the famous letters of "Agricola," and a younger brother of Sir William Young and the Hon. George Young. He was educated at Dalhousie College, and called to the bar of Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island in 1838. He practised for a short time in the office of his elder brothers, and removed to this Province, with the history of which he has ever since been more or less identified. He was successively a member of the House of Assembly and Legislative Council, and he was for several terms Attorney-General. He was an advocate of Responsible Government and Land Reform. As a barrister and politician, alike, he was the tenants' friend. In 1852 he was appointed Judge of Probate, and in 1863 Judge in Bankruptcy. As a member of society in Charlottetown he was a generous promoter of religious and moral movements. His name was usually at the top of every subscription list. He took an active part in the establishment of the Mechanics' Institute, he was a leading son of temperance, a Royal Arch Mason, and one of the most active and prominent members of the Methodist Church. For many years he was President of the P. E. Island Auxiliary of the Bible Society and one of the most generous contributors to its funds. A gentleman of the olden school—courtly in manner, strong in principle, religious and charitable—has passed away. We shall not see his like again. His wife—a daughter of the late John Stairs, of Halifax—who has been an invalid from her youth, has after all outlived him.

Water Commissioners' Abolition. We are not of those who censure the Mayor because he delivered a speech at the meeting held last Friday evening. The important point to which His Worship directed attention was a legal one, within his competence. That it must be fatal to the change proposed, unless the holders of our water debentures should be induced to formally consent to it, is a sufficient reason why His Worship should deem it to be his duty, as our chief citizen and a lawyer, to refer to it at the beginning of the discussion. The fact may be regretted. But if the Waterworks Commissioners cannot be abolished without a technical breach of faith on the part of the people of Charlottetown and the Legislature of the Province, we must, of course, retain them. The honor and good faith of the corporation must be maintained—no matter how the majority at a public meeting may vote.

Those who ignorantly and hastily criticised the action of His Worship, and subjected him to coarse insult, cannot be too severely censured and rebuked. The essential vulgarity of their conduct, and the discredit which it reflects upon the community, as well as the folly of it, are, indeed, patent. What must the respectable strangers who were present have thought of it? And what effect is the decision of a public meeting, in which such conduct was possible, likely to have upon the minds of members of the Legislature who were present to hear the discussion and to come to a conclusion as to the course of procedure the Legislature ought to pursue? Every one must see that the effect is disastrous to the hopes of those who desire that the duties and powers of the Water Commissioners shall be vested in the City Council. But apart from the impolicy of the insults and jibes referred to, the position of Mayor as nothing if not honorable and to be respected. Even though a person should dislike or even despise the man who occupied the Mayoralty, he should respect the high position to which the man has been elected by the citizens.

On the other hand, His Worship ought not to have assumed that the proposal of Councillor McKay and Hogan involves an attack upon the character, ability and management of the Water Commissioners. His elaborate "puff" on behalf of the Chairman of the Water Commissioners was wholly unnecessary. The proposal to abolish the Commissioners was made in the belief that a saving can be effected. There was no hint or suggestion of a charge against the Commissioners. If two thousand dollars a year, or one thousand dollars a year, can be saved without impairment of the water service, the proposal is, on its merits, worthy of consideration. But it is unfortunate that the promoters of the Bill have not demonstrated clearly that a considerable saving can be effected, or that the waterworks are likely to be well and fairly administered by ward politicians. If each of the Councillors were elected by all the ratepayers and were representative of the whole town, the case would be different—though the point raised by the Mayor would, in any case, be fatal to the proposed change unless agreed to by the holders of water debentures.

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Behring Sea.

In view of the eminently reasonable and definite propositions of Lord Salisbury, reported by THE EXAMINER to-day, there ought to be no further misunderstanding about the Behring Sea matter. The sensation which has been created throughout the United States on account of it, would, indeed, be inexplicable, if the parties there were not preparing for a presidential election. Great Britain and Canada demand nothing more in respect to the seal fishery than that which the universally-recognized law of nations grants them, and they are quite willing to enter into a mutually beneficial arrangement providing against the extermination of seals in Behring Sea. But they do not propose to be scared by Uncle Sam's pre-election sparring, into yielding concessions which are inimical to the interests of the British people.

Supreme Court.

In Chambers this morning judgment was delivered by His Honor the Master of the Rolls in the matter of the application of the Sheriff of Queen's County for an interpleader order to protect him against the adverse claims of the attaching creditors, Horne and Forbes and the Bank of Nova Scotia, claiming under a warehouse receipt, and the assignees of Fenton T. Newbery, the judgment debtor. An execution was issued out of the Supreme Court by Horne, and an absent debtor attachment by Forbes, against Fenton T. Newbery. The sheriff seized certain goods, claimed to be defendants in the warehouse of David Small. The Bank of Nova Scotia claimed these goods under a warehouse receipt. The Sheriff after having taken a partial inventory of the goods, left the warehouse, locked the door, and handed the key to Small, who, he claims, was to act as his agent in the protection of the levied goods. The Bank of Nova Scotia claimed an abandonment of the levy by this act. Several affidavits were read on both sides. The Judge granted the interpleader order, which protects the Sheriff. The judgment and attaching creditors will have to fight the Bank of Nova Scotia and the assignees on the merits.

Salvation Army Notes.

Captain McLean, of the Salvation Army, has been absent for ten days or so, but returned in the Stanley on Tuesday. He accompanied a young man well known in Charlottetown to one of the Army institutions in Hamilton, Ont., and has placed him under the care of Benjamin Archibald, who has charge of the P. O. Home. This is the second case taken in hand by the Salvation Army. A few months ago, another young man, whose love for strong drink had brought him very low, was taken to a similar home in Toronto. He is doing well—has learned to be a baker, and at the present time is in charge of the Salvation Army Bakery, turning out 2,000 loaves every week. He has also learned to play on a brass instrument. The officers who have been in charge of the Salvation Army in Charlottetown farewelled Friday night. They have been here eight months. During that time 390 meetings have been held, 100 souls sought salvation, 75 souls sought sanctification, 1,285 houses were visited, 800 hours spent in visiting, 2 men went to Salvation Army P. G. Homes, in Hamilton and Toronto.

Personal.

Speaking of Mrs. Hunt, who will lecture here on April 5th, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., the Journal of Commerce says: "The greatest statesmen of our country in state and national legislatures have enacted into laws the proposed statutes that she wrote. Our great men of science have paid tribute to her learning by submitting their books to her revision and gladly accepting her mendations and eagerly seeking for them her endorsement. And what, this unique woman is thoroughly a lady, refined and womanly in her manner, and although commanding in her presence, has a face in which the home virtues sit enthroned."

Judge Young was a man of strong temperance views. In fact he was a teetotaler all his life. Upwards of forty years ago he started a temperance society composed of young people entirely. This society he called "The Cold Water Army." Every year the army would march out to Spring Park and have an annual tea. The pledge taken was as follows: Trusting for help from Heaven above We pledge ourselves to works of love, With hearts and hands united stand To spread a blessing o'er the land. We now resolve we will not take, Nor give, nor buy, nor sell, nor make Those drinks which cause pain, woe and strife— Rum, brandy, whiskey, cordials fine, Gin, cider, porter, ale and wine.
