

LYC, Dairymen And Angels Win Ball Games

The Sunshine Island Dairy, Ligonier Youth Club and Guardian Angels squeezed out wins yesterday evening in three closely contested City Softball League games.

The Dairymen protected their margin on first place as they edged past the improving Junior Chamber of Commerce 12-10. The LYC took over second place by edging out a 10-9 win over the B.Y.C. and the Angels moved in to a third place by blanking the Packers 20-0.

Left-handed Dick Doyle, the notable first of a month ago, hurled a three-hitter at Canada Packers yesterday as the Angels defeated Jimmy Dowling's red team 12-0. Gauthier on the mound for the Packers, also pitched a gem as he held the Angels to six hits.

Marvyn Carmichael hit the only home run of the game, a long drive to centre field in the eighth inning. Gauthier kept the Packers in the fourth but was thrown out when he attempted to stretch it into a four-batter.

Phil Mace and Garth Campbell added triples for the Angels. Mace's North Dalzell home run led to a three-run eighth inning.

McIntosh and Ed Ballen of the Dairymen made the best of the play of the game with a home run in the eighth. Mace's second home run in the eighth won the fourth straight League game last night as the LYC came from behind to win over their youth club rivals, the B.Y.C.

The Juniors went into the last of the ninth inning leading 3-1 as Don MacLeod held the heavy hitting intermediates to three base knocks during the first eight frames. Pitcher John Sneyzek leading off for the Intermediates in the ninth rapped out a single and started the older players finally.

MacLeod struck out pinch hitter "Funnell" MacLean but big Joe Coyle followed with another single sending Sneyzek to second. MacFarlane then pulled MacLeod in favor of his ace left-hander Benny Carson but an error and an infield out enabled the Intermediates to score Sneyzek and Coyle. Carson ended the inning by forcing Charlie Ryan to fly out.

The teams played through a scoreless tenth inning and umpire Cecil Ward called the game at the end of the frame.

Had the Intermediates not rallied in the last of the ninth the loss would have been a tough one for pitcher John Sneyzek. The big Mountie pitched superb ball as he held the juniors to six hits and didn't allow an earned run.

He struck out thirteen batters and never got himself into trouble. The three runs that the Juniors scored on him in the fifth inning were the result of infield errors with two men out.

Sneyzek allowed only one extra base knock and that was a double by Sweet. Oddly enough four of the six hits he gave up were obtained by the top batters in four of the innings.

Don MacLeod, although very wild in the middle innings, also pitched topnotch ball. From the first to the eighth inning MacLeod held the Intermediates hitless while giving up six walks and hitting four batters.

MacLeod showed great clutch pitching as he hurled himself out of trouble in the eighth. Four times he left two men on base and once he retired the side with the

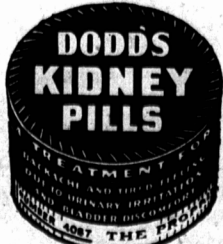
