**CHURCH CONVENTION.**

**Interesting Meeting in Milton Church.**

There was large gathering in the beautiful new church at Milton last evening. It was particularly pleasing to see among those present such a large proportion of the youth of this thrifty and prosperous settlement. The occasion was a meeting of the Church Convention. Mr. Justice Fitzgerald, Vice President of the Convention, occupied the chair and conducted the proceedings. After a few introductory words by the chairman and of welcome by Venerable Archdeacon Reagh, in the course of which he referred to the fact the vacancies in the rectorships of Alberton, New London and Kensington are to be filled forthwith, to the proposed employment of Divinity students as lay readers throughout the holidays, and to other matters in connection with the extension of the Church of England in this Province.

Mr. John A. Millman, of French River, read a timely and excellent paper on "A Churchman's Duty to His Church." He referred to the care of the prudent farmer regarding the title deeds to his land, the fertility of his soil, the sufficiency of his fences, etc., and exhorted his fellow churchmen to careful and regular in their study of the Holy Scriptures, to build for Eternity upon the Sure Foundation,—to do something for the good of the church and the promotion of its work in the world, to work cheerfully, and not to rob God in tithes and offerings.

Ten minute speeches were then delivered in succession by Judge Warburton, Rev. Henry Harper, of Port Hill, Mr. F. L. Haszard, Q. C., the Rev. Leo Williams, Rector of St. Paul's, Mr. J. P. Millman, Rev. J. Withycombe, Mr. Percy Pope, Mr. W. L. Cotton, Mr. Horace Haszard and the chairman,—such topics as the claims and needs of the church, sociability in church life, etc., were ably and eloquently discussed. The Rev. Mr. Forbes, Rector of Crapaud and Springfield was among those who were present.

At ten o'clock the meeting was dismissed with the Benediction.

**THE ACCUMULATIVE VOTE.**

A BILL brought in on the strength of a resolution unanimously passed by a very large majority of citizens and on the petition of about two hundred leading and representative rate-payers, providing that the city councillors should be elected as their Mayor is elected, by an accumulative vote, has received scant courtesy from the Legislature. At the first clause, the Hon. Anthony McLaughlin moved that the Speaker take the chair. The adoption of this motion would have killed the bill outright in a many way. But this was not the way of some of the leading members of the Government party. So the motion was amended to provide that the committee might sit again. The motion, as amended was carried by the usual Pineau Party vote. In the last hours of the session it is highly improbable that the committee will get leave to sit again,—so that the bill has been practically killed at its birth. The most notable part of the business is that Hon. Mr. Rogers, who had the bill in charge, and Mr. L. E. Prowse, member for the city, voted with those who killed it. The reason why is well understood.

The Local Government has given a grant to the Charlottetown Driving Park and Provincial Exhibition Association for an exhibition to be opened to the Maritime Provinces this autumn. The association has fixed the dates for this exhibition from the 24th to 28th September next. The prize lists are now in the printer's hands, and will be issued as speedily as possible. All intending exhibitors should make their preparations as no doubt this will be the greatest exhibition ever held on the Island.
