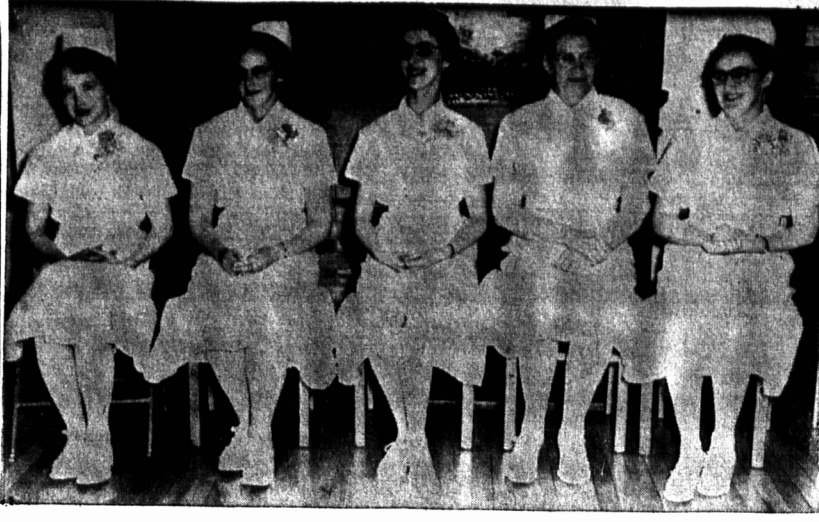
EPILEPTIC FREED

Graduation Ceremony At Provincial Sanatorium

Yesterday afternoon the graduation exercises of the seventh class of Nursing Assistants took place in the auditorium at the Provincial Sanatorium. The ceremonies were presided over by Col. G. Elliott Full, Chairman of the Sanatorium Commission. Col. Full welcomed the graduates, (shown above) and outlined the program for the training of nursing assistants. He also pointed out that they are valuable assets to the Sanatorium in helping patients to rehabilitate themselves to a new way of living.

In his final remarks to the graduates, Dr. Howatt, expressed a hope that their services would still be available to the sanatorium, or to any other institution requiring their services. He then concluded by wishing them success and happiness in their chosen profession.

DR. CREELMAN

Due to the unavoidable absence of the Hon. Dr. M. L. Bonnell, Minister of Health, Dr. P. A. Creelman was then called upon for a few remarks.

Dr. Creelman reviewed the progress through the years, of research and treatment of tuberculosis. He reminded everyone that the search for new uses is a continual one, and requires a great deal of cooperation from the public, to obtain this public must be educated regarding this type of ailment, and that the educating process should start at an early age. He also pointed out that due to the great advances made, in the last half century, the death rate from tuberculosis has been reduced from 200 to 10.3 per 100,000. "I believe the day is near," Dr. Creelman stated, "when no person will die of tuberculosis." He also pointed out that no antibiotics or vaccines were sure cures, but that they do play a great part in retarding the progress of tuberculosis.

One of the biggest jobs, Dr. Creelman said, is to convince patients to carry on with their proper rehabilitation program after leaving the institution. His closing remarks were, "optimism must not be allowed to develop into complacency."

The exercises were then closed with the "Queen," after which the guests were invited to tea in the classrooms. The pianist for the occasion was Miss Marion Ryan.

NURSING SHORTAGE

With this inability to obtain enough girls to train and qualify as Registered Nurses, the Canadian Nurses Association realized that many of the bedside and rehabilitation duties, could be carried out by girls trained to work with R.N.'s. This would leave the latter free to carry on with the more technical side of nursing.

The association proposed that a school be set up across Canada to train Nurses Assistants. At present there are three of these schools operated in Government institutions in P. E. I., the Provincial Sanatorium, Falconwood Hospital and the Provincial Infirmary.

MacDonald reported that 150 pine trees had been procured from the Gotton Memorial Nursery to be planted in Victoria Park. He also reported that a number of bulbs had also been procured and planted in the Park.

Coun. MacDonald said that complaints were being heard continually from tax payers regarding the climbing of stairs to make pay the ground floor of the Provincial Market is vacated that this part of the Market Building be used as a tax office or in lieu of this, have the water and sewage office removed to the Market Building and the tax office situated on the ground floor of City Hall. His Worship agreed with Coun. MacDonald and expressed the opinion that this change would eventually take place.

Coun. MacDonald referred to the recent work completed on the War Memorial and expressed appreciation of the assistance lent by E. K. Kennedy of the Provincial Department of Public Works; Lt. Col. Keith Johnstone, Army; Lt. James Clapton, Navy; Stewart Chandler, Air Force Association and Mr. Costello, City Works foreman.

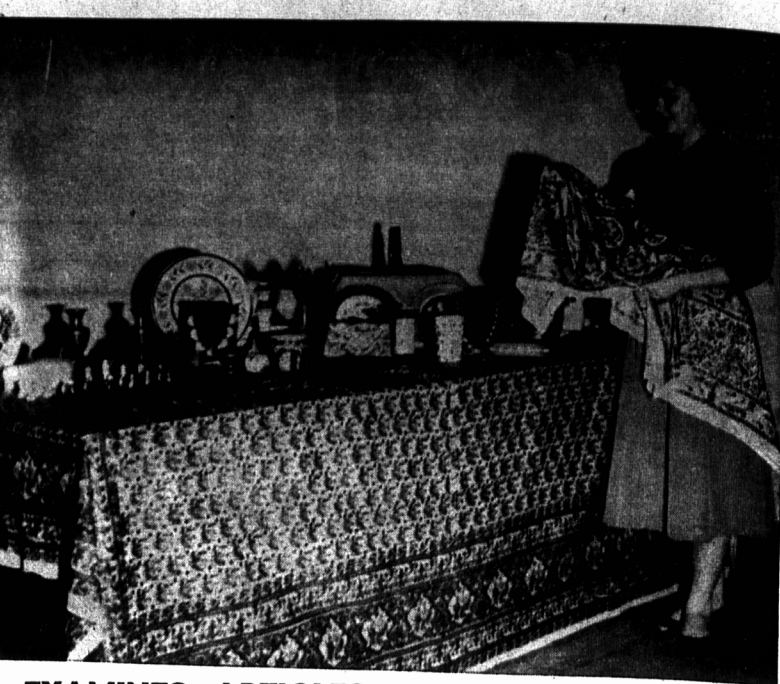
