The motion was rejected. Frightened into Dumbness. CANTON, Ohio, Feb. 1.—Dr. Lindsay, of Salineville, a mining town in Columbiana county, is treating a very peculiar case at Hammondsville. The thirteen-year-old daughter of Frank Phillips, a coal miner, was taken ill with malarial fever, but recovered. A short time afterward she was frightened into convulsions by the sudden appearance of a negro who accosted her on the road, and had another attack of fever. She has recovered from this, but is deaf and dumb. Although possessed of every other faculty, she is unable to utter an articulate sound or hear any noise however loud. Her case is attracting wide attention, and physicians are unable to account for her affliction.

Neither side will give way, and the strike will very likely be at once proclaimed. These conductors are earning from \$85 to \$75 a month, but are not satisfied. It is said they are assisted in their demands by a number of conductors at the Stat. Mr. Shaughnessy has refused to make public the offer he made the conductors. Dairy School for P. E. Island. LONDON, Feb. 6.—The London Chronicle says "it hopes the times rapidly approaching when Canada and the United States will see the folly of damming up the stream of friendly intercourse." Evening Condensations. Sir Charles Tupper has arrived at Montreal. The limit of savings banks deposits per individual has been raised from \$300 to \$1000. Those wishing to exceed this amount can secure 31 per cent government stock in sums of \$100 and multiples thereof, redeemable in five years. Bishop's College school, Lennoxville, Quebec, was burnt yesterday. A son of Judge Alley was among the students of the school. It is reported that Senator Howland has left Ottawa for home to contest Prince County in the coming election. Pastoral Call Cancelled. OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—A despatch received from Detroit says: "Jefferson Avenue Presbyterian church organized a call to the Rev. W. W. Carson, of Kingston, Ont. Mr. Carson accepted the call and agreed to withdraw from the Methodist church, and arrangements were made to have him examined by the local Presbytery for admission to the ministry. Last Sunday Mr. Carson preached what was supposed to be an inaugural sermon. On Thursday night at the annual meeting of the church a committee reported that Mr. Carson's call was apparently in opposition to the Alien Contract Labor Law. The committee recommended that the call be cancelled and the report was unanimously adopted. Mr. Carson has returned to Kingston. The congregation are hopeful he will become a citizen of the United States, in which event he will be once more asked to accept the call to the church." The Current Fashions. The Paris in Wall Street several weeks ago, writes a New York correspondent, had its effect everywhere, for the toilettes of the season have not been magnificent as of yore. At the Parthenon of all the dresses showed unmistakable signs of last year's campings and were recognized as old favorites. The en-ruis corsage bouquet has gone to the wall, and a single large rose with a stem about two feet in length is the proper thing. The long-stemmed flowers are expensive, and Gentlemen's bouquets are simply enormous and immense flaunting chrysanthemums, very large roses or bunches of violets are the proper thing. The artificial French flowers delicately perfumed, are used for ball garters, long ropes of lilies, cowslips of roses being wound about the neck and hips, a big reaching being at the foot; some of the garters are made of single rose petals strung upon a heavy cord and thickly massed together with charming effect.
