Mr. MacNaught lost to Prince County candidate David MacDonald who polled an unofficial 8,900 votes, 923 more than Mr. MacNaught.

Outlines Project To Fight Hunger

Speaking of the Young World Mobilization Assembly which she attended in Ottawa, Mary Power of Souris High School, who represented the P.E.I. Junior Red Cross at this meeting, told the 64 delegates to the annual high school Red Cross conference held at the Basilica Recreation Centre in Charlottetown on Saturday, how proud she and the 12 other youthful Red Cross delegates were to belong to an organization which has always carried out international assistance programs.

She referred particularly to the "Stamp Out Hunger" project which the Canadian Junior Red Cross has been carrying out with great success in the Sudan for the past two years in conjunction with F.A.O. (Food and Agricultural Organization) of the United Nations.

Miss Power described the "Young World Assembly" as a conference to discuss the participation of members of all youth organizations in Canada in the "Young World Mobilization Appeal" which was launched at this assembly and is to go on for a period of 21 weeks until March 21, 1966. This Appeal calls for all young people from 16 to 24 years of age to dedicate one hour per week for 21 weeks to give their time and thinking towards a solution to stamp out hunger, disease, and illiteracy in the world.

Miss Power said: "This is not just a matter of 21 weeks devoted to fund raising, but of spending a portion of the time in studying the needs of the world, and discussing how help can be given to young people in the developing countries to help themselves."

Saturday's high school Red Cross conference, arranged by

Mrs. W.W. Reid, director of Junior Red Cross for P.E.I., heard reports on the activities carried out by the high school Red Cross councils in the province, and made plans for the present year's projects.

Dr. K.A. Parker, chairman of the Junior Red Cross advisory committee for the province, who was the key-note speaker, told the young people how desperately the leadership of youth is needed today in helping to solve the complex problems facing a world in which two-thirds of the population is starving while the other one-third lives in affluence.

Pearl Greenan of Kinkora expressed the appreciation of the group to Dr. Parker.

REPORTS ON CENTRE
Nancy George of Charlottetown reported on the American Red Cross training centre which she and George Mitchell of Tracadie attended at Grove City in Pennsylvania, and which was geared to cultivating leadership among high school Red Cross members.

Community and provincial activities were dealt with during the morning discussion groups.

while international understanding and assistance projects in connection with ICY (International Co-operation Year) and the Red Cross five-year development program occupied this period in the afternoon. These discussion groups resulted in suggestions being made by the delegates, and were led by several of 15 young people from this province who had attended the Red Cross high school training centre for the Atlantic provinces at Mt. Allison University during the past summer.

This group of 15 also met separately to give their views on the overall program of the training centre, the highlights of which were given earlier in the day by Michael Gallant of North Rustico.

Alan Gallant of North Rustico extended the gratitude of all present to Mrs. W.W. Reid and all those who played a part in making the conference such an outstanding success.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says that while skies were still clear over the Eastern regions late Monday evening, snow was falling in western New Brunswick.

A storm in the St. Lawrence Valley will cross the district overnight and this morning. It will bring snow and rain to all three provinces. Precipitation will be mostly rain in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island and southern New Brunswick but two to five inches of snow may accumulate in northern New Brunswick.

OPPOSE MARRIAGE

AMSTERDAM (AP) — Nearly 66,000 persons have signed a petition asking the Dutch parliament not to pass the bill approving Crown Princess Beatrix's marriage in March to West German diplomat Claus von Amsberg, the petition committee announced Monday. It said more support is expected. The petition says von Amsberg, 39, is not acceptable as a prince consort to the Netherlands' future queen because of his Second World War activities as a soldier and Hitler Youth member.
