Sevigny Plans Political Book

MONTREAL (CP) - Pierre Sevigny, who resigned as associate defence minister in the former Conservative government prior to the 1963 federal election said here he will publish next month an "objective" account of his political experiences between 1956 and 1963.

Asked whether the publication time—shortly before the Nov. 8 general election—might cause the Conservative party some nervousness, Mr. Sevigny replied: "I've never been deliberately mean or deliberately destroyed reputations. I don't do that in this book."

He said the October publication time had been fixed long before Prime Minister Pearson called the election.

His resignation from the cabinet over the issue of nuclear arms for Canada was part of the events that forced then Prime Minister Diefenbaker to call the general election of 1963.

In that campaign, Mr. Sevigny lost his seat in Longue-Pointe. He will be 48 on Friday.



FIRST SNOWFALL HALTS HARVEST

Combine stands idle in the fields south of Regina Wednesday as a heavy snowfall hit southern Saskatchewan halting harvesting operations. Accounting Systems Confuse, Misinform Investing Public

VANCOUVER (CP)—A Vancouver accountant said Wednesday flexibility in accounting principles makes comparison between financial statements impossible, and confuses and misinforms investors.

D. C. O'Brien, a partner in Price, Waterhouse and Co., told the Canadian Institute of Chartered Accountants: "Notwithstanding the very prominent members who are on the side of uniformity."

Mr. O'Brien cited the example of the difference in accounting method used by two B.C. forest companies, MacMillan, Bloedel and Powell River Ltd., and B.C. Forest Products Ltd.

"If MacMillan, Bloedel had used the same accounting income method as B.C. Forest Products in 1964, its reported earnings would have increased from \$41,400,000 to \$47,000,000, an increase of approximately 13 per cent," he said.

"If B.C. Forest Products had adopted the same basis as MacMillan, Bloedel, its reported earnings would have dropped from \$11,400,000 to \$5,700,000, a reduction of 50 per cent."

"Surely this lack of comparison between the earnings of the two companies in the same industry constitutes a most unsatisfactory situation, and must be a source of embarrassment and concern to our profession."

Mr. O'Brien said accepted alternatives for handling an item two different ways should not be allowed.

"The alternatives make comparisons between financial statements impossible, and confuse and misinform investors," he said.

WANTS DISCLOSURE - C. W. Goldring, of Fry Investment Management Ltd. in Toronto, said every company should disclose what it earned and paid per share, and whether it was financially sound.

"A company does its shareholders a service if these key questions are answered early in the annual report clearly and precisely," he said, "rather than having the shareholder search out the answers in the financial statements."

The president's annual report, he said, "should be an intelligent survey, not a propaganda piece."

Robert H. Jones of Winnipeg told the convention the definition of "generally accepted accounting principles" has become so wide that "comparisons have become meaningless."

Mr. Jones, vice-president of the securities investment division of The Investment Group said a recent example was published illustrating four different methods by which finance companies can account for income earned on accounts receivable.

Stoiko said the United States and Russia might set up separate rescue services at first, but aim at an international rescue service including other countries. Pending the creation of an international service, he suggested the adoption of a "rescue code" under United Nations auspices.
