PWC Montgomery Hall Hosts Large National Educational Conference

The conferences of Learned Societies which are this year being held at Prince of Wales College comprise what is probably the biggest gathering of convention-goers in the history of the province, 1800 scholars and officials from all parts of Canada are meeting at the College from June 6 to June 20 and they include leaders in many fields of science, literature, and professional studies.

The occasion marks the first time this event has taken place outside one of the larger universities in a large city and it has therefore been a special privilege for Prince of Wales to be the host institution.

The work of organization has been enormous and has gone on for many months. Montgomery Hall is the headquarters for the conference. It holds only 110 people so that the College has booked its visitors into Charlottetown's hotels, motels, tourist homes, and into the north shore hotels which opened a month earlier for the occasion.

Up to twenty-five meeting rooms operating simultaneously had to be provided in the college and the new Confederation Centre. Twenty-two banquets and thirty-two receptions had to be arranged. Special continuous bus service had to be provided by the College between the airport and the city and between the college and the north shore hotels. Meals and hospitality at all hours are necessary. The registration of delegates, the dispensing of literature, invitations, mail, and the billeting of 1800 people requires much preparation, continuous round-the-clock staff work during the conference period.

Special features were provided for the visitors. H.M.C.S. "Fort Erie" came to Charlottetown to the Royal Society on a cruise. The Hudson and the Acadia, two scientific ships, arrived to entertain delegates. A play, "John A. Beats the Devil," was staged in the new theatre. The Centennial Fashions Show was put on by the P.E.I. Hospital Ladies' Aid for the Royal Society and the Canadian Historical Association. A book fair was exhibited in Confederation Centre by the Book Publishing Council of Canada. Collections of art are attracting visitors to the new gallery.

Charlottetown's citizens and storekeepers are welcoming numerous delegates bearing names. The planes, trains, buses, and taxis have been working overtime to transport them. And meeting places are echoing the learned discourses on every topic from nuclear theory to language teaching. With the Conference now in its second week, Prince of Wales is humming with activity and Charlottetown welcomes its biggest gathering of the year.
