

Local and Other Items.

NINE HUNDRED sheep were exported from Summerside last week.

HON. H. J. CALLECK has been appointed Vice-President of the Sunday School Workers Convention of the Maritime Provinces.

JAMES HUTT, of P. E. I., was lost overboard from the schooner "Maggie," which arrived at Port Hawkesbury a few days ago.

DR. HERBERT A. BAYNE, of Halifax, has been appointed Professor of Chemistry in the Kingston Military College. He enters on his duties in that capacity this week.

A GLASGOW despatch says: "The pig iron market is active and prices higher than at any time during the past eighteen months. The revival is almost solely due to the large orders from America."

QUEBEC affairs are still in a state of confusion. The latest rumor respecting Mr. Joly's intentions says that he has resolved to demand a dissolution at once, if the Legislative Council, at its next meeting at the close of this month, shall persist in refusing supply.

ON Saturday night the garden of Mr. R. Inman, on Malpeque Road, was raided by thieves, and a bee-hive, containing about fifty pounds of honey, stolen therefrom. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the thieves.

ALBERT ALLIN, who was, on the 21st inst., arrested on suspicion of having burned a barn on the estate of the late William Allin (his father), was discharged from custody to-day, there being no evidence to prove that he committed the act.

THE steamer "Princess of Wales" took from Summerside last week the following freight, viz: 16 bbls pelts, 17 rolls leather, 8 bbls potatoes, 3 bags oatmeal, 4 tubs butter, 100 boxes boneless fish, 1,051 bbls oysters, 105½ do mackerel, 900 sheep, 9 horses, 1 wagon.

CITIZENS were surprised on Saturday night by the statements of the *Patriot* under the heading, "Around Town." No such reports had previously been heard "around town"; and (it is, perhaps, unnecessary to state,) not one of them contains any truth whatever.

ANNIE WHELAN, who was charged with the larceny of a quantity of ladies' underclothing from Mrs. Liddell (who is now absent from the Province), was to-day acquitted by the Stipendiary Magistrate. The Magistrate said that as the things she was accused of stealing were all small, he had no doubt that they were given to her by Mrs. Liddell.

JOHN McCABE appeared at the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court this forenoon, on a charge of insulting and striking inoffensive people as they passed the street. John denied the charge on the whole; but the Magistrate, thinking his denial too thin, fined him \$3 and costs or 14 days.

INTELLIGENCE from Montreal relative to business affairs is becoming more and more encouraging. Business men there say that the outlook is more promising than at any time since the great depression began, and that, in fact, nearly all branches of trade are experiencing a revival that bids fair to prove lasting.

ON Tuesday morning last, His Grace the Archbishop of Amalida (Bishop McKinnon), had an attack of paralysis, from which he never rallied. The last sacrament he received from his confessor, Rev. H. Gillis. His physician, Dr. McIntosh, was in constant attendance. His Lordship the Bishop of Arichat, during the four days previous to his death, never left the bedside of his Grace. At 3.45 p. m. on Friday, surrounded by a large concourse of his priests whom he loved so well, he breathed his last. On Tuesday forenoon his remains will be deposited in the crypt prepared by himself, under the sanctuary of the new cathedral.

SERIOUS ASSAULT.—John Wise, caulker was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon on charge of assaulting J. H. G. Murphy, barber. On Wise's name being called the Court was informed that Murphy was so seriously affected by the assault that he was unable to appear in Court. The history of the assault, as far as we can learn, is:—Murphy was struck with a stone while on Water street about half-past seven on Saturday evening. The location of the wound inflicted by the stone was exactly between his eyes. It bled profusely but, for a short time, he did not think it anything serious. He walked to his father's residence on Euston street. Here the bleeding continued with very serious effect and towards eleven o'clock the services of two physicians had to be procured. They dressed the wound but blood continued to ooze alarmingly, and it was thought the unfortunate young man would expire before Sunday morning. The outward flow of the blood was stopped but it continued to flow inwardly all day yesterday. To-day there are slight indications of his recovery although blood continues to trickle down his throat with an injurious effect. The young man Murphy made complaint at the police station on Saturday night and the prisoner Wise was arrested. This morning after the examination of a witness whom Murphy told "it was Wise struck him" Wise was remanded to jail for further examination.

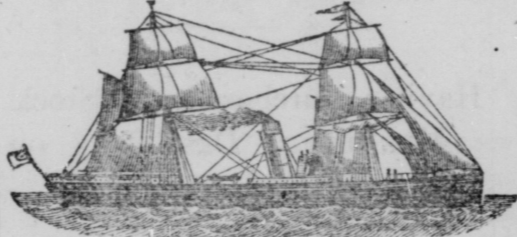
