TWO AND A HALF YEARS have passed away since the first number was issued; and still the DAILY EXAMINER persists in making its daily round of the city and its daily tour of the Province, with its daily "abstract and brief chronicle of the time." It has hung on to life so long, and through so many difficulties that, somehow, people are beginning to have increased confidence in it; and, of late, the volume of its business transactions has increased fully a half. If this increase continues (and we hope it may) we shall soon be enabled to print a larger paper at a smaller cost. In fact, we now offer to all our readers who advance payment before the 31st day of December next, the DAILY EXAMINER throughout the coming year, for four dollars. The Hospital for Insane Persons.

We are informed that the report of the Patriot of yesterday, respecting the Lunatic Asylum—that "its horrors almost rival the black hole of Calcutta," etc.—is a tissue of unmitigated misstatements. And if so, it is a libel upon Dr. Blanchard and upon the trustees of the institution. These gentlemen will, we doubt not, take the proper measures to rebut the statement. This community is too deeply interested in the care of the insane to permit the false statement of even the Patriot, in respect to the Asylum, to pass uncontradicted. We are informed and believe that the Asylum was never cleaner, better ventilated or better kept than it now is.

With regard to the delay in removing the patients to new hospital, we are informed that it is due to the fact that some articles required in the institution—part of which have been ordered from abroad—have, through no fault of the officials concerned, not yet been obtained.

Sir Leonard Tilley at Guelph.

In Guelph (Ont.) a few evenings ago, Sir Leonard Tilley was entertained at a banquet at which he, of course, made a speech. The speech, though confessedly an impromptu one, is pleasant reading. It is full of assurance and hope for the future of Canada. Sir Leonard very happily showed how it is that Sir John McDonald is a lucky man to lead a Government; and dwelt at length upon the results of the tariff, the re-opening of the West India Trade, and the new life inspired into manufactures, without any material increase of prices. He said the great centres of trade, such as Montreal and Toronto, had been the first to feel the benefits of the new policy; improvement has been manifested in nearly every part of the Dominion, and the manifestation would be more marked in the course of a few years.

An Impudent Charge.

We learn, on closer enquiry, that the account from which the Patriot says the Engineer's certificate was torn off in the Public Works office, never was in the Public Works office at all! This is a fair specimen of the charges to which the Commissioner of Public Works is subjected by the organ of all the Grits in this Island. There is no truth in them. The Patriot is inventive, unscrupulous and reckless—hardly worth noticing.

School Books.

The answer to the charges of the Argus and Patriot that the Superintendent of Education is about making another change of the books in the public schools is: no change will be made, nor has a change been intended. 'Tis a great pity the opposition press couldn't manufacture some facts to tell against the Government.

That the Dominion Government will re-appoint some of the gentlemen whose silk gowns have been taken off by the late decision of the Supreme Court, we take for granted. It was proposed to re-appoint them in 1872. But that there will be a number of exceptions to the rule of re-appointments, we certainly expect. There are men bearing the rank of Q. C. in several parts of the Dominion who are not fitted for the position of Crier.—Ottawa Citizen.

The Royal Princes at Sea.

A writer in the "Whitehall Review" says: Prince George never seems so happy as when rushing up and down the ladders, carrying orders from deck or reporting the time; and on the first day of his watch-keeping at Portland he declined to go on shore to the athletic sports of the "Warrior" in the afternoon, on the ground that he preferred his "4 to 6," and he kept it. Prince Edward has endeared himself to all; he has a peculiarly gentle, winning manner; indeed, both lads are rare examples of the excellent results of careful training and judicious management, thoroughly obedient to orders, most studied in respect to their seniors, both on and off duty, and never forgetful of the fact that on board the "Bacchante" they are naval cadets, and nothing more. The strictest orders have been given that they are to be treated in every respect like the other gun-room officers of similar standing—no difference whatever is to be made. They are not allowed to go aloft at present, but then none of the naval cadets are; there is to be no partiality, favor, or affection shown, either between the Princes and their brother officers, or between the Princes themselves. While there can be no doubt in the minds of anyone as to the inestimable value of the life of one upon whom so much may hang in future years, it can hardly be denied that it would be inadvisable, circumstanced as they are at present, and with such comparatively small difference between them in point of age, to make any distinction in the instructions issued concerning them. In common parlance, it would not do to make fish of one and flesh of the other.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Dr. Wagner, of Hamburg, is bringing out a new edition of Shakespeare in thirty sixpenny parts, with English introductions and notes.

Bishop Colenso is printing in Natal a complete digest of the Blue-Books on the Zulu War. This work is described by those have seen it as a monument of patient and conscientious industry.

Dr. Scheiellen, says the "London Medical Record," has proved that Homer sang of a real Troy and an actual war. Recent critics concede him to have been a true poet, and not a myth or a mere collector, as Wolfe taught. And now another Wolfe, this time a surgeon, and of Glasgow, has published a pamphlet, in which he is pretty successful in showing that the singer of the Iliad certainly had an ocular defect, not color blindness, as Mr. Gladstone thinks, but amblyopia, from Egyptian ophthalmia. The evidence is gathered from the treatment of colors in the poem.

A Swiss workman named Rapin has exhibited at Chaux de Fonds a clock which indicates the day of the week and month, the signs of the zodiac, the moon's phases, and the hour of sunrise and sunset. The pendulum is a barometer. The clock strikes the quarters, and at every hour it plays one of eight tunes, for any one of which it can set.

Another small planet has just been discovered by Director Pajisa, of Pola. It is of the twelfth magnitude, and makes the thirtieth discovery within the present year. The number of asteroids which have been found between the planets Mars and Jupiter amounts, with this latest addition, to 204, of which 134 were discovered by observers in Europe, 65 in North America, and five in Asia.
