Plans Visit To Egyptian Wounded

LONDON (AP)—Dr. Edith Summerskill, Labor member of Parliament and a former government minister, left Thursday by plane for Egypt to visit Egyptians wounded in the British-French assault on Port Said.

"I think my journey is more necessary as a result of Sir Anthony Eden's resignation," she said. "I think the first thing the new government should do is to try to re-establish confidence in the Middle East."

Dr. Summerskill's trip has been criticized by right-wing newspapers as ill-timed. She said she is going "as a doctor" to visit the Port Said hospitals.

Publish Mad Bomber Lette.

NEW YORK (AP)—The Journal American published a letter Thursday attributed to the "mad bomber" in which he said his work is not yet finished.

The newspaper printed an open letter to the bomber Dec. 26, asking him to give himself up and promising to print his side of the story.

The bomber, blamed for planting 32 homemade bombs in the city in the last 16 years, scorned the suggestion he surrender.

"I read your paper of Dec. 26," the letter says. "Where were you people when I was asking for help? Placing myself in custody would be stupid. Do not insult my intelligence."

"Before I am finished, the Con. Deison Co. will wish that they had brought to me their teeth what they cheated me out of."

"My days on earth are numbered. Most of my adult life has been spent in bed. My one consolation is that I can strike back—even from my grave—for the dastardly acts against me."

"Calling me names is just frustrated stupidity in action."

The letter, printed in block letters, is signed "F.P."

It was mailed "special delivery" from Mount Vernon, a city in Westchester County, just north of New York City, at 9:30 p.m., Dec. 27. "It's authenticity," says the newspaper, "has been carefully checked by the most competent authorities."

Toy-Testing Committee Chairman Makes Report

OTTAWA (CP)—Play is the serious business of childhood and selecting playthings for children should be a serious business for parents, say toy experts here.

Probably every family has already found that some of the Christmas toys are steady favorites while others are neglected.

But nowadays parents and manufacturers are listening more closely to suggestions that toys be selected according to the child's age and individuality, says Mrs. A. L. KASSIRER OF Ottawa.

She is chairman of the Canadian Association of Consumers' toy-testing committee. This committee has had "wonderful responses" to its studies and tests of children's playthings from parents, retailers and manufacturers, Mrs. Kassirer said in an interview.

FOR DIFFERENT AGES

More parents now try to determine their child's play needs and then find toys to interest them, she says. Many toy manufacturers now are also supplying toys suitable for various age groups—safe and durable toys, stimulating to a child's imagination and helpful to emotional and physical development.

Latest step taken by the committee to help parents select the right toys came in the form of a toy guidance program kit.

The compact blue folder includes instructions for setting up a toy-buying guide and display. It includes booklets about children and lists of playthings which interest various age groups to help display planners select examples of good toys.
