Rookie Goal Gives Bruins 3-2 Win Over Canadiens

BOSTON, (CP)—Rookie Doug Mohns fired a goal over prostrate goalkeeper Gerry McNeil at 15:23 of the third period Sunday night to give the Bruins a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over the second-place Montreal Canadiens before 10,635 fans.

The Bruins were putting on a strong offensive when Mohns broke a 2-2 deadlock by forcing goalkeeper Gerry McNeil to go down as the Boston youngster connected and took Leo Labine's forward pass. Defenceman Bill Quackenbush kept that winning rally alive by intercepting a long Montreal clearing shot and relaying to Labine.

Johnny Pearson notched the first Boston goal from the edge of McNeil's crease late in the first period. While the Bruins played short-handed in the second session, Joe Klukay took a pass from Quackenbush and fired past McNeil from point-blank range.

Canadiens, who gained a 2-1 victory over the Bruins in Montreal Saturday night, were given their first marker by Paul Masnick. Floyd Curry was set up for the second goal by Dick Gamble.

Islanders Fined \$1,000 For Missing Miners Game May Be Forced To Quit

GLACE BAY, N. S., (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders have been given until Wednesday to pay a \$1,000 fine for failing to play Glace Bay Miners here Saturday night in a scheduled Maritime Major League game.

If they don't, they will be suspended. League President C. Roy MacDonald said Sunday night. Islanders must also pay \$150 by the same time to cover the Forum's expenses.

Miners were awarded the game, which put them in third place one point ahead of Charlottetown. The cancellation of the game had the largest advance ticket sale of the season.

Charlottetown coach Bucko Trainor informed Mr. MacDonald that his team was at the airport when told that their flight to Sydney was cancelled because of icing conditions over Northumberland Strait.

At a recent league meeting, the other three clubs agreed that they weren't against Charlottetown travelling by air providing they completed their schedule commitments and appeared on time for games.

The above report was received at an early hour this morning. Contacted by the Guardian shortly before two a.m. today Club President Smith MacFarlane stated he had not received a notification but that he was awaiting word from the League President MacDonald.

He stated the Islanders could not pay the \$1,000 and would probably be forced out of the League. MacFarlane stated he couldn't understand the severity of MacDonald's sentence and added that the Islanders would appeal the decision immediately.

Rangers Win 1st Game In Almost Year

DETROIT, (CP)—New York Rangers won their first National Hockey League game in almost a year on Detroit ice Sunday night when they clung to an early lead to edge the Red Wings 3-2. It was their first Detroit victory since Jan. 22, 1953.

Johnny Bower, New York's freshman goaltender, turned aside 41 Detroit drives as the Rangers scored their second victory of the season over the Wings against six defeats and two ties. Terry Sawchuk was called on to make only 17 saves at the other end.

Only two shots by Gordie Howe his 19th and 20th goals of the season, eluded Bower. Each came while the NHL champions were fighting to overcome a Ranger lead.

Edgar Laprade, veteran New York centre, scored his first goal since he emerged from retirement to rejoin the Rangers early this month to give the visitors an early lead. Paul Ronty and Wally Hergeheimer were the other New York marksmen.

Defenceman Expected To Arrive Here Today

Defenceman Don Busch, who is coming to the Islanders from New Westminster of the Western Hockey League, is expected to arrive here today, it was stated last night by coach Bucko Trainor.

Busch is flying here from the west coast. He wired Trainor yesterday from Ontario, stating he would be in Charlottetown early this morning.

The Islanders rested over the week-end when they were unable to make the trip to Glace Bay for a scheduled game with the Miners on Saturday night. The Islanders planned to fly but bad weather suddenly moved into the Maritimes grounding planes Saturday evening.

The team went to the airport before learning of the flying conditions.

The Islanders were at the airport ready to go when M.C.A. officials announced the weather was unfit for flying. One plane which left here Saturday evening was unable to land at Halifax and was forced to return to Charlottetown.

Coach Trainor immediately got in touch with the Glace Bay officials and informed them of the Islanders plight. He stated the Miners were disappointed as they had a big sale of tickets.

There will be only one game in Charlottetown this week. The Tuesday night game scheduled for here between the Islanders and Miners will be played at New Glasgow.

Negotiations were underway last night when Club President Smith MacFarlane and the Miners agreed for a re-scheduling of the game. It won't be played this week.

Reports Baseballs Used in 1953 Had Touch of Rabbit

NEW YORK, (AP)—The baseballs used in the major league in 1953 may have had more than a touch of "rabbit" in them, says the civil engineering department of the Cooper Union, an institution which specializes in scientific studies.

An ordinary 300-foot fly in 1952 might have become a 324-foot homer in 1953. The difference shown in the Cooper union tests was approximately eight per cent and that is just about enough to make the difference between an out and a homer in most major league parks.

The tests were run off last fall on a batch of American League baseballs taken from the stocks used in 1952 and 1953. The results were reported Sunday in "The Transit of Phil Epsilon," official publication of the national civil engineering fraternity, by Joseph S. Ward, assistant professor in the college's civil engineering department.

"Our tentative engineering conclusion is that the '53 baseball was a jackrabbit," says Prof. Ward. "This is based on the greater rebound characteristics and the smaller compressions observed for the 1953 baseballs. Both would indicate that the ball would travel further than the '52 ball with the same applied force. The increase in distance would probably be about eight per cent."
