MOSCOW (CP) — Windsor Bulldogs ended their six-game exhibition hockey tour of Russia Sunday with a walloping 9-2 defeat from the Central Club of the Red Army.

"They sure taught us a hockey lesson," said playing coach Joe Klukay. "They play the way the game should be played." Klukay said the Russians' body-checking was not much better than the Bulldogs' but that they were in excellent condition and has mastered hockey fundamentals.

Red Army scorers were Alex Ragulin, Victor Kurkin, Alex Almetov, Anatole Firsov, Leonid Volkov, Anatole Janov, Vaseili Semashkin, Evgeny Michalok and Victor Balak. 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Lions Crush Rough Riders To Enter Grey Cup Game

VANCOUVER (CP) — British Columbia Lions crushed Saskatchewan Roughriders 36-1 Saturday with a mighty, muddy paw and took the West's berth in the Grey Cup football classic.

The rubber match in a bitter Western Conference final was played most of the way in rain. It drew 25,000 fans, ironically the smallest crowd of the season at a time when Lions were capturing their first title in 10 seasons of play.

Roughriders made three touchdowns in the first 17 minutes, Lions snapped at them for a quick 9-1 lead and the trend was set.

After two crippling games—a 19-7 win by B.C. last Saturday and a 13-8 Rider comeback Wednesday — Riders did not have another resurgence tucked away.

You can only go so far on emotions," said Saskatchewan coach Bob Shaw after the game.

A helicopter tried to whip water out of the turf before the game but the Empire Stadium field remained in its worst

condition since drains were dug a quagmire in 1955.

To win, Lions played some of their best defensive football of the year, picked off four Ron Lancaster passes and mounted a 35-yard attack. Willie Fleming scored one of their four touchdowns and personally accounted for almost half the total gain with 51 yards rushing and 12 as a pass receiver.

Fullback Nub Beamer and halfbacks Ron Morris and Bill Lasseter scored the other touchdowns and place-kicker Peter Kempf picked up 10 points.

Three field goals and three converts.

Martin Fabi's 45-yard first-quarter punt was conceded in the end zone for Saskatchewan's only point.

Lions scored opening on a

field goal by Kempf and pulled away steadily with period leads of 24-16 and 23-10.

They held Roughriders to 13 first downs, 75 yards rushing and 23 yards passing. Lancaster completed only nine of 26 pass attempts.

Joe Kapp quarterbacked Lions until Canadian rookie Pete Oiler took over in the last two minutes and completed 15 of 26 passes for 230 yards. Lions gained 124 yards rushing, including 77 yards by Beamer on 15 carries, for a total of 21 first downs.

B.C. may have lost flanker Sonny Homer, who tore a knee cartilage and could be lost for the Grey Cup game.

Fans and players observed a minute's silence before the game in memory of President

Kennedy and Fleming played with black arm bands on his uniform.

Ottawa Rough Riders Win But Ti-Cats Take Series

HAMILTON (CP)—Hamilton Tiger-Cats steam-rollered to the Grey Cup final Sunday afternoon with a 63-33 margin over Ottawa Rough Riders in their two-game total-point Eastern Football Conference final. Ti-cats won the opener 45-0 at Ottawa a week ago and, with this cushion, played it cosy as the Riders won 35-18.

Tiger-Cats, who now have represented the East against the best in the West six times in the last 10 years in the annual classic, more or less went through the motions Sunday. They let the desperate Riders carry the play and capitalized on Rough Riders mistakes to score their two touchdowns.

The Tiger-Cats, who have been able to win the cup only twice in the fast decade—in 1953 and 1957—next saw their opponent, British Columbia Lions who disposed of the battling Saskatchewan Roughriders 36-1 in the third game of the best-of-three Western Conference final at Vancouver Saturday.

It was obvious from the opening kickoff that Rough Riders had no chance of sweeping past coach Ralph Sazio's Ticats.

And, with Ottawa ahead 21-18 on 22 first downs against 13 for Hamilton, 313 yards along the ground a gain at 1:08. Ottawa completed 10 of 23 passes for 190 yards and Hamilton seven of 14 for 74 yards.

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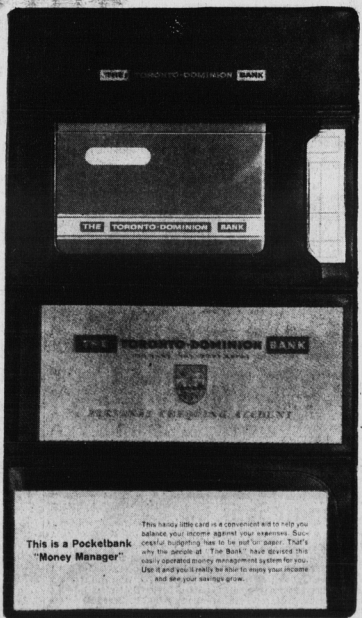
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
